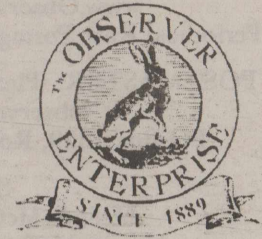

The Board of Directors of the West Coke County Hospital District met in regular session October 31, 2017.

President Pat Stephens called the meeting to order at 9:30 am and declared a quorum was present. Board members present were Sarah Green, Patsy Cason, Pat Carwile, and Noel Tinkler. Roger Alexander (WCCHD Administrator) Chris Martin (Interim RLCC Administrator), Janie Munoz (BOM), and Becca McGuire (DON), were also present at the meeting.

The invocation was given by Pat Stephens.

There were no visitors. One absent board member was excused from the previous meeting, and the board minutes from that meeting were approved.

There are 32 residents in the Care Center as of the meeting date. In the staffing update, social worker Stephanie Steager, has been hired to fill this vacancy at the facility. Accounts receivable were discussed in depth, and a bad debt write-off was approved. Roger is working to bring the financials up to date for the November audit.

Chris gave an in depth state of the facility report to the board and acquainted the board of some positive changes that

have been made. The leadership team at the facility and employees at the Care Center are all doing an excellent job.

Scott & White will be the medical insurance provider for the facility this year.

Other items on the agenda were addressed and tabled.

The bank account signature cards were updated and signed.

Future agenda items were discussed, and the board had a short Executive Session to discuss personnel.

The next regular meeting will be November 28. The public is invited and encouraged to attend.

On November 3, the Board interviewed local resident Houston McGuire for the position of Administrator of RLCC. Houston accepted the position and will begin his duties November 20. The Board welcomes Houston and looks forward to working with him in the future.

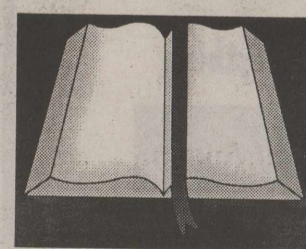
birthday guys! On Thanksgiving Day, the residents will enjoy a special meal and watch Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade.

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Seeking Gold Star Families

On Saturday, November 18, 2017, at 11 am, the Fort Chadbourne Foundation will be dedicating a Gold Star Families Memorial Monument, followed by a reception inside the Visitor Center. A Gold Star Family is any family that has lost a loved one while serving our country. WWII Medal of Honor recipient Hershel Woody Williams will be present at the dedication and reception to visit with guests. He was awarded the Medal of Honor for his actions on Iwo Jima.

A few years ago Woody Williams established the Hershel Woody Williams Medal of Honor Foundation to honor Gold Star Families. It was his desire to place these monuments all over the United States. The one being dedicated at Fort Chadbourne will be the first one in the West Texas area.

The purpose of the Gold Star Families Memorial Monument is to honor Gold Star Families, preserve the memory of the fallen, and stand as a stark reminder that Freedom is not free. This stunning black granite monument features two sides. One side bears the words: Gold Star Families Memorial Monument, a tribute to Gold Star Mothers, Fathers, and Relatives who have sacrificed a Loved One for our Freedom. The other side tells a story through the four granite panels: Homeland, Family, Patriot, and Sacrifice. The scenes on each panel are a reflection of each community's Gold Star Families and their fallen Heroes. At the center of this tribute is the most distinct feature of the monument, the cut out which represents the Loved One who paid the ultimate sacrifice in the name of Freedom.

Ann Paté, Fort Chadbourne Director, and Honorary Board Member of the Hershel Woody Williams Foundation said it is very special that Coke County has a memorial such as this erected in our county and at Fort Chadbourne. It honors our families that have paid the ultimate sacrifice and have lost a loved one while serving our country. If you are a Mother, Father, Grandparent, Sister, Brother, Aunt, Uncle, or Cousin who has lost someone, you are a Gold Star Family and this Memorial Monument is for you.

Although, the memorial pays tribute to all Gold Star Families across the United States, Fort Chadbourne would especially like to honor the Coke County Gold Star Families, and for them to be present at the dedication in November. The ceremony is open to the public and everyone is invited to attend. A reception will follow inside the Visitor Center. If family members would like to share a photo of their loved one on that day, they are encouraged to bring a photograph with them. If unable to attend you may email or mail a photo of your loved

one.

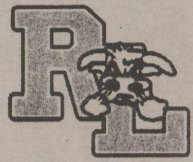

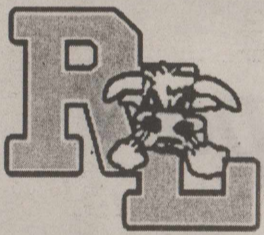

Fall into Good Planting Habits

Fall is the time for planting in West Texas! Tree roots and shrubs grow whenever the temperature is roughly 40 degrees. Planting in the fall and winter months give trees time to establish and ready themselves

for the harsh summer months. If cared for properly, your trees will be bursting with life in the spring!

It is very important to plant and care for your new trees properly. Trees can easily become damaged during transportation from the nursery to the home. If moving a tree by truck or trailer, make sure the limbs and leaves are wrapped with burlap or a bed sheet to protect them from the wind. An uncovered ride home can break limbs and cause leaves to drop after planting. During the first growing season it is crucial to make sure the tree has received proper watering; a new tree will need to be slightly watered every day for the first week after planting, every other day the second week, every third day the third week, and once a month thereafter. Trees do not need fertilizer after planting, spring is the time to fertilize but even then it is recommended to go light on the fertilizer to avoid burning the roots. Staking or tying down a tree should be a last resort; ropes can damage tree bark and will weaken a tree by not allowing it to strengthen itself against the elements.

It is very disheartening to have a tree die; these are the top 10 reasons trees don't survive:

10. Tree is not suitable to live in West Texas heat. Do some research to find the best trees for your area.

9. Not adapted to the local, clay soil. Clay soil can form a slick surface on the sides of the hole that will prevent root growth if not broken up properly.

8. Trunk was damaged during transport or planting. The vascular system of a tree is just below the bark. Young trees have thin bark and can be easily damaged.

7. Wire stake and tags were not removed from tree. Remove all tags from tree and avoid staking.

6. Tree was planted too deeply. The top of the root ball should be even with the surrounding soil.

5. Tree was not healthy when purchased. Check tree for splits, broken branches, insects or disease, and the root system. Do not purchase a tree with encircling roots because the root system will strangle the tree. If already purchased, spread out the roots and cut through them (new roots will grow where you cut the circling roots).

4. A weed eater or mower damaged the tree trunk. Be careful when doing yard work around trees.

3. Roots over dried while waiting to be planted. Make sure tree has adequate water if you are unable to plant after purchase.

2. Leaves dehydrated while being transported. Remember to cover limbs and leaves for the ride home.

1. Lack of water or over watering during the first growing season is the #1 killer of trees. Especially in heavy, clay soils. Use weekly soil wetness tests to ensure proper watering.

USDA announces 2018 farm safety net enrollment

Farmers and ranchers with base acres in the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) or Price Loss Coverage (PLC) safety net program may now enroll for the 2018 crop year.

The enrollment period will end on August 1, 2018.

"Since shares and ownership of a farm can change year-to-year, producers must enroll by signing a contract each program year," Farm Service Agency (FSA) Acting Administrator Steve Peterson said. "I encourage producers to contact their local FSA office to schedule an appointment to enroll."

Farmers who are not enrolled for the 2018 enrollment period will not be eligible for financial assistance from ARC or PLC programs for the 2018 crop should commodity prices or farm revenues fall below the historical price or revenue benchmarks established by the program.

Farmers who made their elections in previous years must still enroll during the 2018 enrollment period.

"This week, FSA is issuing approximately \$850 million in rice payments," Peterson said. "These payments are part of the \$8 billion in 2016 ARC and PLC payments that started in October to assist enrolled producers who suffered a loss of revenue or price, or both. Over half a million producers will receive ARC payments and over a quarter million producers will receive PLC payments for 2016 crops."

The ARC and PLC programs were authorized by the 2014 Farm Bill and offer a safety net to agricultural producers when there is a substantial drop in prices or revenues for covered commodities.

Covered commodities include barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium grain rice (which includes short grain and sweet rice), safflower seed, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed and wheat. Upland cotton is no longer a covered commodity.




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WWI dog tag crosses ocean back to Texas

After almost 100 years, Willie's tag was back on Texas soil.

The experience of World War I

My dad, Arthur Milton Tubb, was born November 15, 1894, in Leon County, Texas, to John Lee Tubb and Bettie Beatrice West Tubb. He was one of three children. When he was nine years old, the family moved to Sanco and later to Robert Lee. When he was a young boy, he helped build the Coke County Jail here in Robert Lee. As a young man, he learned to play the guitar; he loved to play and sing.

In 1917, during World War I he was inducted into the Army and transported to Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, along with other Coke County men. He was inducted with Willie I. Tubb and Pammie Landers. The three found San Antonio to be a very colorful place in 1918. They lived in tents and trained with whatever was available for them. There was an epidemic of the flu during that time; a lot of men had to be hospitalized and many died.

Willie I. Tubb was born to George W. Tubb and Sarah J. Tubb in 1894. He grew up in Coke County around the Silver area. He attended school there and graduated there and went to secondary school. He taught school for several years. In fact, he taught some of the men when he was in the service, as they had little education.

Pammie Z. Landers was born 1888 in Thrifty, Brown County, Texas, to A. K. and Catherine Landers. He was one of nine children. Later the Landers family moved to a 200 acre farm north of Robert Lee. They became acquainted with other families there, and the area later became known as the Friendship Community.

These three men were good friends, and my dad, Arthur, was a second cousin to Willie I. They were getting ready to be shipped out overseas to France to help in the war against Germany. My dad, like the others, had been equipped with all the necessary gear and had been trained for war. Marching by foot or riding by horseback in the cavalry, my dad, Arthur Tubb, was assigned for certain duties.

The unit was to leave in a matter of days for Europe. My dad was riding by horseback and the pavement was wet.

The horse slid down, falling on my dad, causing injury to his back. The doctors' examinations left no alternative

but to keep my dad from joining the unit going overseas, much to his disappointment, because he wanted to be with his buddies.

Alta Bilbo of Robert Lee said she remembered when the men left home to go to war. She said she was 17 years old in 1918, and it was a sad time. Alta said it was hard times and they couldn't buy certain things. They all got together to help in the war effort. They rolled bandages to send to the Red Cross and Salvation Army. She said there was an epidemic of flu everywhere. Alta told me the

drug store was owned by Charlie Goss, and Dr. Coalson was the doctor. Her husband to be, Alli Bilbo, worked in the drug store.

Floy Sawyer, also of Robert Lee said she was 5 years old in 1918, and times were hard. She said her father was a farmer and they had to move a lot because of bad crops. She said a man drove her and her family from Indian Creek near Brownwood in a large touring car to the train station in Brownwood. They went to College Port, Texas, on the bay, to try with new crops.

"We teach the basics of the shearing pattern. A lot of it is you learn how to handle the animal so you don't hurt yourself or the animal and how to harvest the wool efficiently," said Dr. Reid Redden, Extension state sheep and goat specialist at San Angelo, in an interview with the Texas Farm Bureau Radio Network. "We update shearing equipment, handling equipment and the most advanced shearing technique and process that we have available to us."

Redden said the heart of the fine wool sheep industry in Texas is in and around San Angelo. But there are smaller flocks of sheep popping up all over the state and the nation. And he said some of those are just too far away for major shearing crews to get to, so there's a growing demand for small flock shearing.

Meanwhile, more Yanks had started to arrive in a tired Europe. The American Troops had been in Europe since Aug. 1917, when they had paraded down the streets of London. Once in France the Doughboys were put through rigorous training in both trench and open warfare. As they gained skill, they were posted to sentry duty or sent out on small raids. As of December 31, 1917, 176,665 American Troops were in France. America was badly prepared for the war it entered on April 6, 1917. Woodrow Wilson was the President of the United States.

On July 4, 1918, three days after Vaux fell, American G.H.Q. at Chaumont announced loudly that more than one million Americans had arrived in France.

Willie I. Tubb and Pammie Landers had left Arthur Tubb at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio and they shipped out to Europe. They arrived with their division fresh off the boats. They carried the Model 1917 rifle, a weapon so awkward and crudely tooled that their firing was only effective at short range.

They arrived wearing hot O.D. Wooplens with choker collars, which in the July heat, only added another atrocity to the Western front. However, when they came down the gangplank, they radiated vigor and confidence. They stood tall and appeared all powerful, thanks to the campaign hats they were wearing. There has never been a prouder, happier, more talkative army under the American Flag.

As they marched over the Roman Roads, they sang the bawdiest songs within memory: "Lulu", "Frankie and Johnny", and the "Fusiliers", a ditty that was later cleaned up to become "I've got sixpence" of World War II.

World War I was a bloody war and it was then that the Mustard Gas was introduced.

Pammie Landers was in the

130th M.G. Bat. 35th Division. He was killed 29 September 1918, three days after Armistice; they didn't get the word in time while fighting in the trenches. Pammie was a courageous hero; he paid the supreme sacrifice. Pammie was buried somewhere in France, in a place called Ramagne, in a cemetery named Meuse-Argonne. Clodene Greer Guillary of Waco, Texas, one of Pammie's nieces, was able to go to France to visit his grave.

Although Pammie was unable to return home with Arthur and Willie I., his memory lives on. Pammie had two nephews living in Robert Lee, Wilbern Millican and Finis Millican. Wilbern named one of his sons after his uncle Pammie. Other nieces and nephews have kept some memorabilia on Pammie. My dad, Arthur Tubb, was instrumental in naming the local American Legion Post after Pammie Landers. Pammie was the only man killed from Robert Lee during World War I.

After the fighting in the trenches had ended in France and they were told that Armistice was signed, according to Willie I., the Germans and Americans offered one another cigarettes. Willie was able to get acquainted with several families before returning home.

Willie I. lived in Silver, Texas. He became a rancher and was successfully involved in investments in the oil industry until his death. Willie has one

nephew, Bunyon Millican living at Silver, along with great nieces and nephews.

After my dad, Arthur Tubb had the accident on the horse at Fort Sam Houston, he was honorably discharged and returned home.

He was in the cafe business and later was involved in stock farming. He married Mary Maxwell and raised a family. Arthur was in the American Legion, serving as adjutant for

over 35 years in Robert Lee.

My dad, Arthur, never forgot Pammie and the time they spent together while training at Fort Sam Houston.

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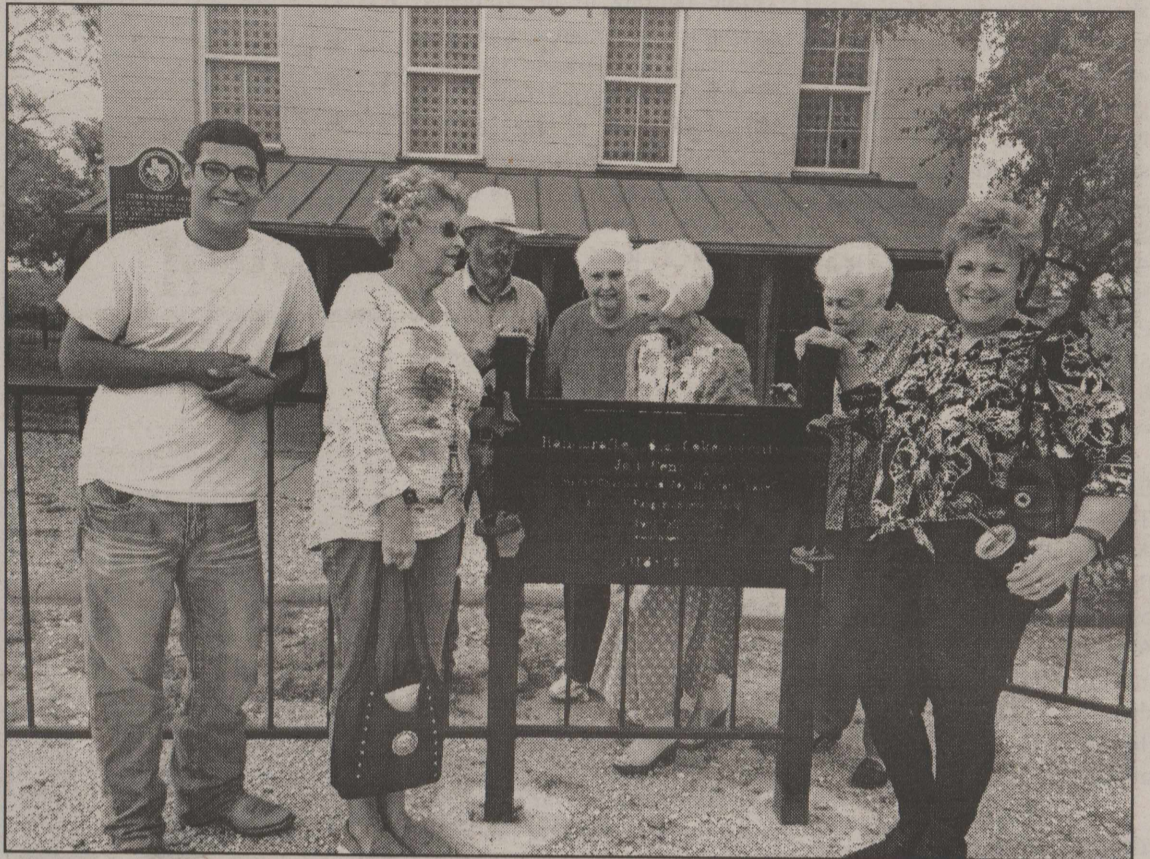

Old Coke County Jail is 110 Years Old!

The Old Coke County Jail is now 110 years old. For the past several years a preservation project funded by the Roberta Cole Johnson estate and through the direction of Charles and Joy Millican Blake has preserved the building for another 100 years.

The Old Jail property has recently been defined by an iron fence forged in Coke County by Steve Clark and Ryan Jones, with the planning of Jeff McCrea, who oversaw the Old Jail preservation project with Coke County Historical Commission members.

Charles and Joy Blake are the benefactors of the fence project. The local NRCS office personnel helped in measuring the property when the project began two years ago.

The fence now bears a plaque designed and cut by Caitlin McGuire of Bronte ISD and installed with the help of Jeff Brisbin, Ag Dept. at Robert Lee ISD and Julian Torres, senior at RLHS. The plaque documents the date and people involved in

the fencing project.

Historical documentation of the preservation of the Old Jail property began with a master's thesis from the University of Texas by Kara Dotter who spent a year in research into the construction materials, installation of the cells by the Southern Folger Detention Equipment company still in operation in San Antonio, and included professional historical preservation procedures necessary.

Local history of the jail was documented by Bonita Copeland Cartrite in her book *A History of the Old Coke County Jail and Sheriffs: With Related Facts and Tales*. The first printing has sold out. A second printing of her work is in the planning. Descendants and friends of the sheriffs who served the County prior to 1969 reside in the County and can relate first hand stories of the Old Jail, its sheriffs and its history. It is hoped their historical remembrances can also be documented for the next generation.



Why should you care about the farm bill?
