There is, though, a third chance for passing MOST II but all riders must first complete the advanced motorcycle rider course which is a six and one-half hour course.

Those interested in MOST II practice can acquire a visitor's pass from the Reese base operator dispatcher for access to the course area. The visitor's pass is required for all to have while using the course. The course will be open during daylight hours or during normal operation at base operations.



The final decision rests with YOU

Have you ever asked yourself why you do the things you do? Think about that for a moment. Why, for instance, do you get up each day? Why do you go to work? Why do you eat? On the surface these questions seem pretty simple. You get up because you have to go to work. You go to work to earn a living. You eat because you're hungry. Seems simple enough. You're responding to stimuli with what you consider appropriate behavior. But, why are you responding?


All too often in the course of a day people respond to stimuli because they feel that they have to. I have to go to work because if I don't I'll get into trouble. I have to eat because my body tells me that I am hungry. These answers are true to a certain degree, however there is one overriding factor that dictates our actions that too few people really consider. We do what we do because we make a con-

scious decision to act in a certain manner. That statement is not as farfetched as it sounds. Consider if you will the human decision making process. A situation, or stimulus, is presented to you. Though you may not be totally aware of why you reacted the way you did, a conscious decision was made. It has been said that the only things in life that a person has absolutely no control over are who their parents are, when they are born, and where they are born. Even your death can be controlled by you, to a certain degree.

Too many times we try to blow off the responsibilities of our actions that legitimately belong to us. How many times have you said, "I did it because I had to," or "They made me do it?" You have the conscious ability to decide everything that you do. Granted, the consequences of your actions might influence your decision. For example, if you decide not to go to work, you will probably receive some sort of punishment.

However, you do have a decision to make, one way or the other, and the responsibility for that decision is 100 percent yours. No one made up your mind for you.

In the area of substance abuse this same rationale applies. You and only you are the one that decides to take that extra drink. You are the one that decides to drive home when you know you're intoxicated. You are the one that decides to smoke marijuana at a party. No one forced you into the situation. The fact that you feel that you have been forced by your friends (peer pressure) to do what you did has nothing to do with the outcome of your actions. Whatever you decide, be ready to own the responsibility to accept the consequences of your actions. If the possible consequence seems unpleasant, like getting busted, going to jail, or maybe even killing yourself, reconsider your actions and decisions. After all ... it's up to

Responsibility seen as leaderships key

The stripes, bars, oak leaves and eagles on your uniforms and the stars on mine tell the world that we're leaders. Our uniforms are outward, visible symbols of the leadership authority the service has vested in us. But I would ask you to pause for a moment.

Consider the observation of the prominent evangelist of some decades ago, Billy Sunday, who had some keen insights into human nature. On one occasion, he stated to the effect that going to church makes you no more a Christian than going to a garage makes you a car.

So it is with us in our profession. Just because we wear a uniform and are declared to be leaders, we may not be.

How can we tell if we're good leaders? I have a few rules of thumb

that I'd like to share with you, and that I'd advise you to apply in your daily lives, just as I try to apply them in mine.

First, set a good example. You can do so by making sure you've "got your act together." Remember that you're a leader 24 hours a day, in and out of uniform, on and off base.

Second, avoid the "nine-to-five" syndrome. The Air Force is not just an occupation. It is a way of life. We're part of the service all the time. Clockwatching is not something we should practice ourselves or condone in others when there's pressing work to be done.

Third, get involved in the lives of your subordinates. Know their family situations. That will enable you to be of real help when they experience personal problems.

Fourth, keep your standards high and keep those of your subordinates high as well. Haircuts and uniforms may not be the most important things at the office or shop, but if they slide so will everything else, including discipline and job performance.

Fifth, have a positive attitude and share it with your subordinates. Don't let them carp, and certainly don't support them or reinforce them when they do.

Sixth, be loyal to your subordinates as well as to your superiors. Support them when they deserve support, and they'll go the extra mile for you every time.

And finally, don't be swayed from your high standards when you see your superiors fail to live up to your expectations. Work and work hard, even if your boss doesn't. Your subordinates deserve it.

We live in a fishbowl. We have to understand that. But instead of being resentful over that state of affairs, we have to realize that it's the price of leadership and a tool of leadership if we use it wisely. If we don't use it wisely, it indeed becomes an oppressive burden.

Remember that. When an airman looks at you or at me, and he sees improper or inappropriate behavior, we lose credibility. The tragedy is that we all lose credibility and the service loses credibility if even one person in a leadership position behaves poorly.

And our young people suffer, because they deserve good leadership. Inappropriate behavior on our part deprives our young people of the leadership they need and deserve.

We are, after all, their leaders.

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
Knowing what to do will get you through a tornado

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

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


