MOST II mandatory for bikers

All present and future motorcyclists must complete a new skill test before registering their bikes on base, say officials at Air Training Command headquarters.

The Motorcycle Operator's Skill Test II includes all previously registered riders and those who plan to register.

In order to complete MOST II members should do the following; have unit orderly room schedule members for Course Seven, a four hour session for all who have not pre-

registered their motorcycles on base. After Course Seven has been scheduled members will then go to Wing Safety for helmet and eye protection inspection. Upon approval members will then go to Pass and ID for a temporary pass which will be valid only until the end of the week of the next scheduled Course Seven class.

After completion of Course Seven members will automatically be scheduled for the MOST II course. During this time all motorcycles will be inspected by the ex-

amining official before moving on to the MOST II proficiency ride. This will be for all registered and non-registered riders on base.

Successfully completing the MOST II ride, members can then go to Pass and ID to complete ATC Form 483 and pick up the base decal. ATC Form 483 must be carried by all who ride their motorcycles on base.

For those who do not pass the MOST II course the first time around will be re-scheduled for a re-test that

Friday of that week. Friday will normally be the scheduled make-up day.

All pre-registered riders will have to successfully complete the MOST II proficiency ride.

Anyone who fails the MOST II course twice will not be registered on base. Any member who is currently registered but fails the course twice will have to go to Pass and ID before noon the following workday for de-registration of their motorcycle.

There is, though, a third chance for passing MOST II but all riders must first complete the advanced motorcycle rider course which is a six and one-half hour course.

Those interested in MOST II practice can acquire a visitor's pass from the Reese base operator dispatcher for access to the course area. The visitor's pass is required for all to have while using the course. The course will be open during daylight hours or during normal operation at base operations.

Converter boxes must be returned

Reese Village residents can now enjoy cable television four different ways thanks to a change in service by Lubbock County Cablevision.

In addition to the basic 10-channel service, viewers can now get four additional channels through "Extra-View". Home Box Office and Cinemax are also now available to village residents.

With the new services, converter boxes have to be added. Those residents continuing with only the basic service will need no new equipment.

The three additions to basic service also have their own price, but residents must subscribe to the basic service before they can get the new ones. LCC is distributing the new converter boxes to those residents already taking HBO.

Along with the distribution

of the new converter boxes LCC is issuing receipts and gathering additional family information to be used to get the converter boxes back in case residents accidentally have them shipped with their household goods when they move.

Subscribers to any of the services requiring the converter boxes should contact High Plains Cablevision in Idalou, at their toll-free number, 1-800-692-4455, before moving. A cablevision technician will come out and remove the box and give the resident a receipt for the turned-in box. If there is not a convenient time for a technician to get the box, it may be left at the Village Barber Shop, 4th Street.

These boxes must be turned-in or residents will get a bill for the box itself.

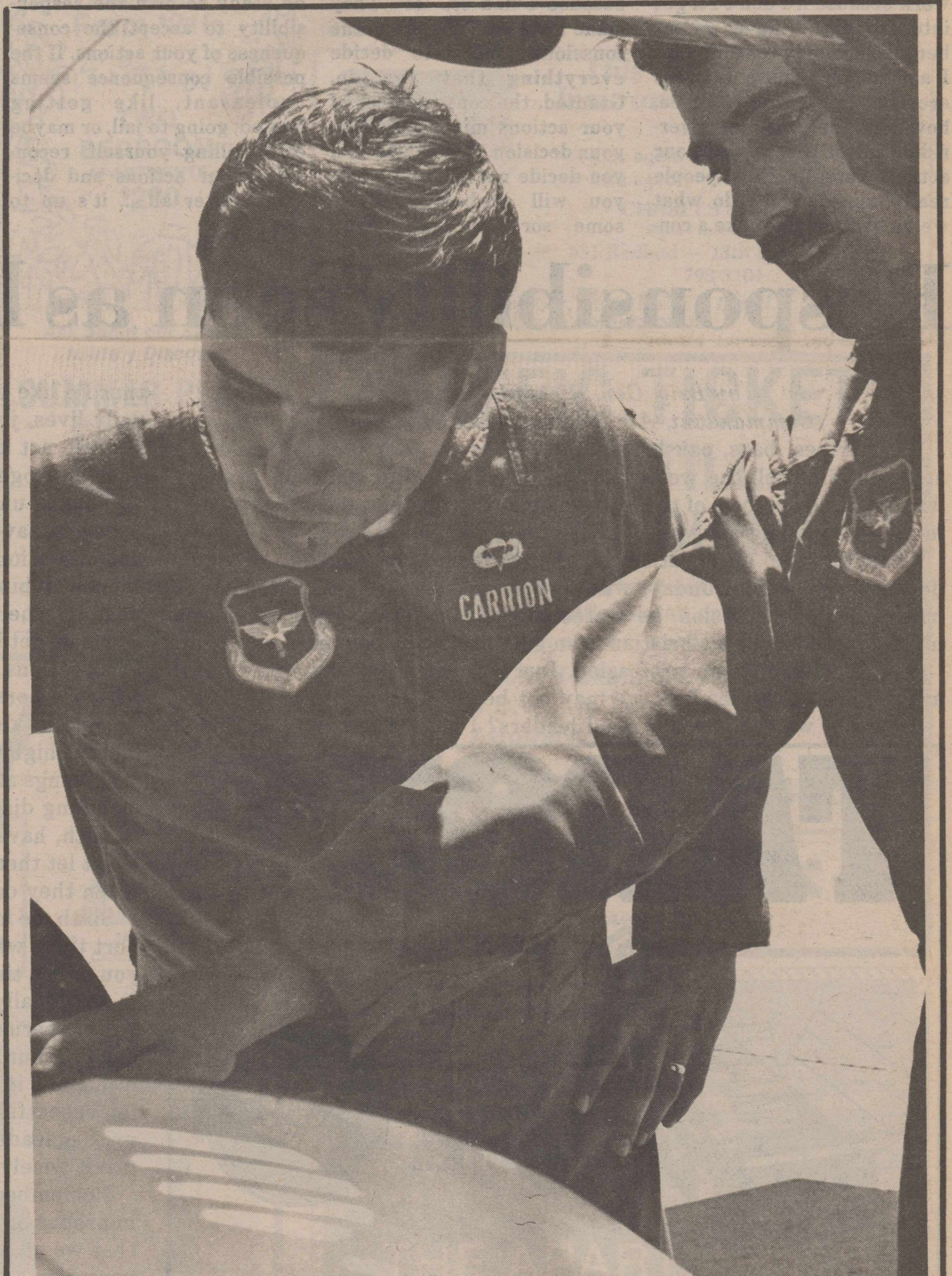
Day camp will be held Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. For all working parents there will be adult supervision provided at the

The final decision rests with YOU

Have you ever asked yourself why you do the things you do? Think about that for a moment. Why, for instance, do you get up each day? Why do you go to work? Why do you eat? On the surface these questions seem pretty simple. You get up because you have to go to work. You go to work to earn a living. You eat because you're hungry. Seems simple enough. You're responding to stimuli with what you consider appropriate behavior. But, why are you responding?

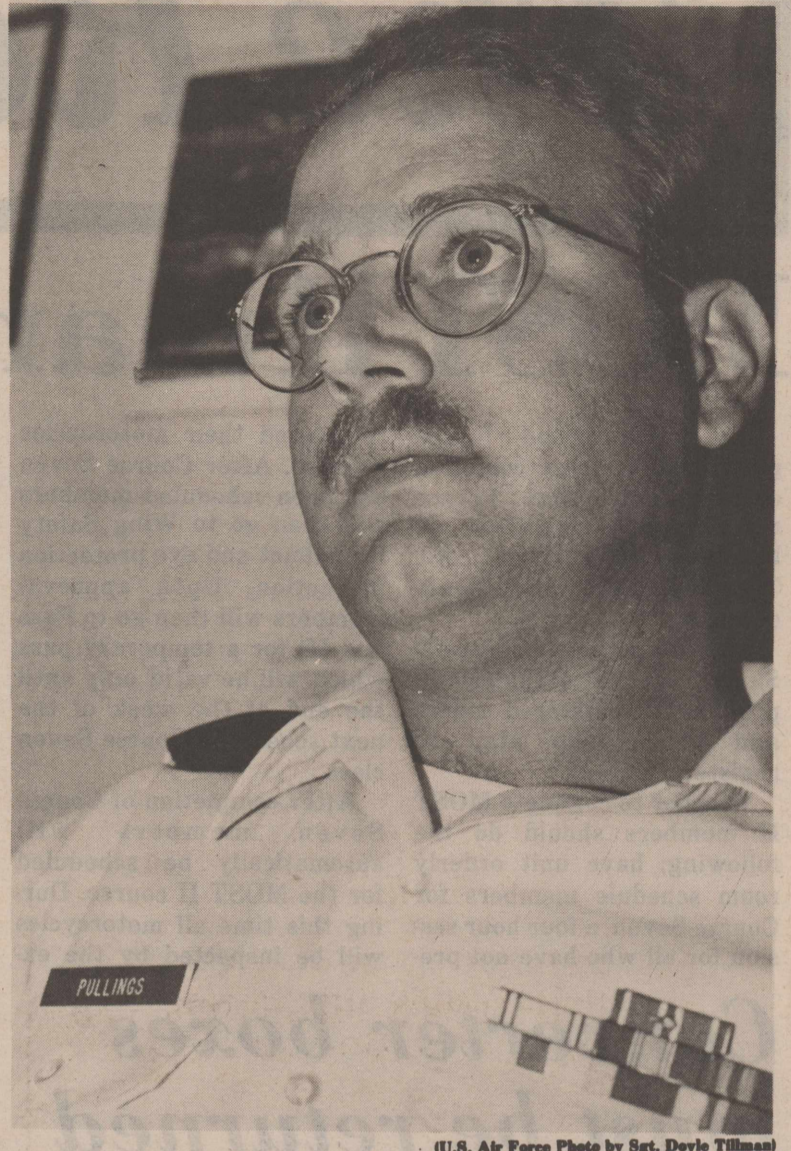
All too often in the course of a day people respond to stimuli because they feel that they have to. I have to go to work because if I don't I'll get into trouble. I have to eat because my body tells me that I am hungry. These answers are true to a certain degree, however there is one overriding factor that dictates our actions that too few people really consider. We do what we do because we make a con-

scious decision to act in a certain manner. That statement is not as farfetched as it sounds. Consider if you will the human decision making process. A situation, or stimulus, is presented to you. Though you may not be totally aware of why you reacted the way you did, a conscious decision was made. It has been said that the only things in life that a person has absolutely no control over are who their parents are, when they are born, and where they are born. Even your death can be controlled by you, to a certain degree.

Too many times we try to blow off the responsibilities of our actions that legitimately belong to us. How many times have you said, "I did it because I had to," or "They made me do it?" You have the conscious ability to decide everything that you do. Granted, the consequences of your actions might influence your decision. For example, if you decide not to go to work, you will probably receive some sort of punishment.

However, you do have a decision to make, one way or the other, and the responsibility for that decision is 100 percent yours. No one made up your mind for you.

In the area of substance abuse this same rationale applies. You and only you are the one that decides to take that extra drink. You are the one that decides to drive home when you know you're intoxicated. You are the one that decides to smoke marijuana at a party. No one forced you into the situation. The fact that you feel that you have been forced by your friends (peer pressure) to do what you did has nothing to do with the outcome of your actions. Whatever you decide, be ready to own the responsibility to accept the consequences of your actions. If the possible consequence seems unpleasant, like getting busted, going to jail, or maybe even killing yourself, reconsider your actions and decisions. After all ... it's up to you.

Responsibility seen as leaderships key

The stripes, bars, oak leaves and eagles on your uniforms and the stars on mine tell the world that we're leaders. Our uniforms are outward, visible symbols of the leadership authority the service has vested in us. But I would ask you to pause for a moment.

Consider the observation of the prominent evangelist of some decades ago, Billy Sunday, who had some keen insights into human nature. On one occasion, he stated to the effect that going to church makes you no more a Christian than going to a garage makes you a car.

So it is with us in our profession. Just because we wear a uniform and are declared to be leaders, we may not be.

How can we tell if we're good leaders? I have a few rules of thumb

that I'd like to share with you, and that I'd advise you to apply in your daily lives, just as I try to apply them in mine.

First, set a good example. You can do so by making sure you've "got your act together." Remember that you're a leader 24 hours a day, in and out of uniform, on and off base.

Second, avoid the "nine-to-five" syndrome. The Air Force is not just an occupation. It is a way of life. We're part of the service all the time. Clockwatching is not something we should practice ourselves or condone in others when there's pressing work to be done.

Third, get involved in the lives of your subordinates. Know their family situations. That will enable you to be of real help when they experience personal problems.

Fourth, keep your standards high and keep those of your subordinates high as well. Haircuts and uniforms may not be the most important things at the office or shop, but if they slide so will everything else, including discipline and job performance.

Fifth, have a positive attitude and share it with your subordinates. Don't let them carp, and certainly don't support them or reinforce them when they do.

Sixth, be loyal to your subordinates as well as to your superiors. Support them when they deserve support, and they'll go the extra mile for you every time.

And finally, don't be swayed from your high standards when you see your superiors fail to live up to your expectations. Work and work hard, even if your boss doesn't. Your subordinates deserve it.

We live in a fishbowl. We have to understand that. But instead of being resentful over that state of affairs, we have to realize that it's the price of leadership and a tool of leadership if we use it wisely. If we don't use it wisely, it indeed becomes an oppressive burden.

Remember that. When an airman looks at you or at me, and he sees improper or inappropriate behavior, we lose credibility. The tragedy is that we all lose credibility and the service loses credibility if even one person in a leadership position behaves poorly.

And our young people suffer, because they deserve good leadership. Inappropriate behavior on our part deprives our young people of the leadership they need and deserve.

We are, after all, their leaders.

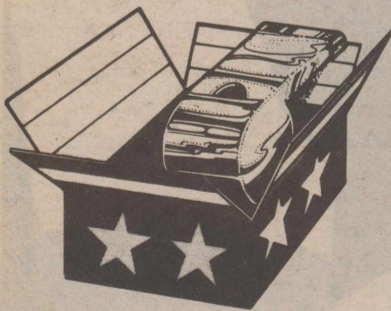

tinue education at Texas Tech University in downtown Lubbock.

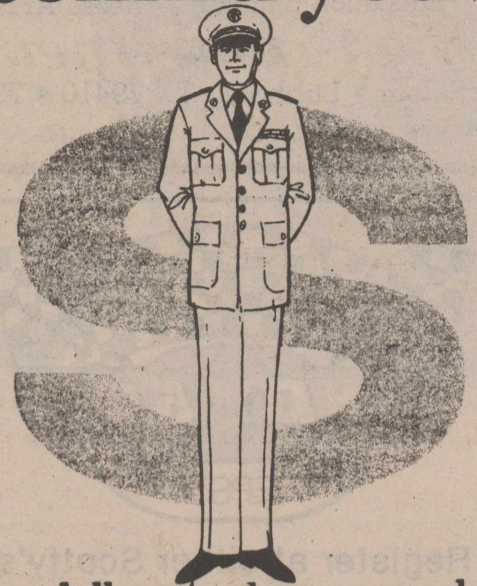



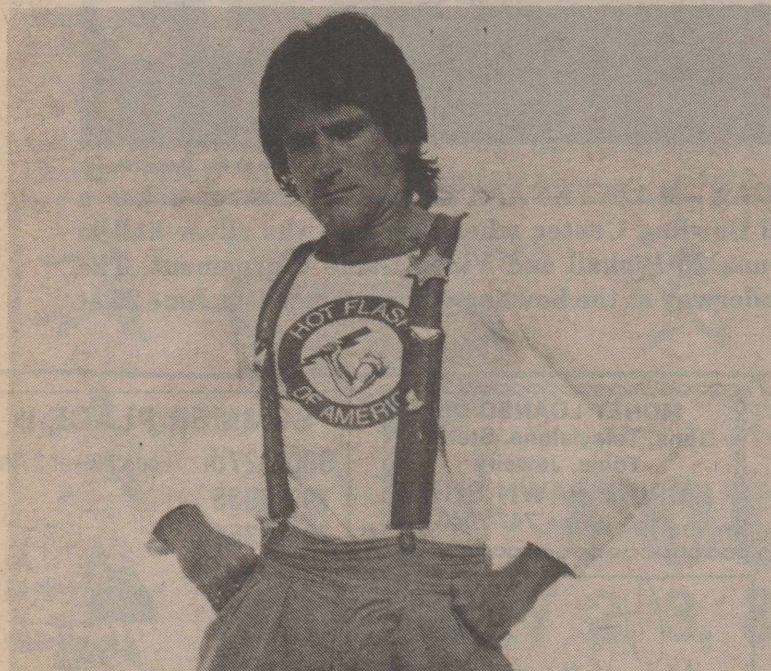

Knowing what to do will get you through a tornado

Tornadoes! We hear about them every day. So what? We have what to do, where to go, and the warning signals drilled into our heads as soon as we arrive in Texas. We've all heard it hundreds of times, but how often did you really listen and how many times were you daydreaming?

It is starting, the weather conditions are right for a tornado. Where does one start first? How about the kids? Call them inside and tell the wife to quit beating the dog. Look around the house. Assess



If a tornado strikes, you won't have time to stop and wonder what you were supposed to be doing. Stay calm and let your common sense take over. (You can't always count on the warning signal (3-5 minute steady tone). If you're on a hunting trip or a picnic, you

probably wouldn't hear the signal if it went off. You are all alone out in the country, no one to tell you what to do. What did your supervisor tell you to do?

I know you were too busy with the trip to really listen to the briefing. Okay, we're all guilty of that so once again here's what you should do. Don't jump in the car. Realistically it's like a child's block, easily picked up and tossed about by the strength of a tornado. Now what? Since the car is out, where do you hide? You don't—stay out in the open. Simple, simple. Well, not quite. Now find a ditch, lay down in it, relax. Cover your head with your arms. Stay that way until you are sure all of the danger has passed.

Now you're at home relaxing in front of the TV. The kids are outside play-

changed to a warning, a tornado has been sighted 10 miles south of your house, headed north. Now is the time for action. Grab the kids and run? Wrong!

Slow down and start over. Grab the kids and go to the centermost part of the house. There goes the warning signal. Look around. All of the kids together? Good! There's the wife still kicking the dog. Are there large portions of glass around? No good glass has a tendency to cut skin when it's flying through the air. Bury the kids and wife under pillows, cushions, blankets and other soft objects. After you've got your family protected, then cover yourself. Wait until you're sure the tornado has passed; You've gotten the family through a tornado.

Tornadoes mean danger

Tornadoes: They're serious business throughout the midwest and especially so here in the Lubbock area. Reese AFB is located 10 miles west of Lubbock, deeply imbedded in the infamous "tornado alley."

During the late spring and early summer, tornadoes become a more noticeable threat than at any other time. A tornado, which is a violent and destructive wind, can sweep down at any time and with little or no warning.

During a tornado, Reese Village residents should go to the centermost portion of their homes and cover themselves with pillows for protection. A closet or bathroom is usually the best place for the family during a tornado. Don't try to look and see the approaching tornado, since flying glass and debris can be deadly projectiles.

People at work should go to the strongest point of the office complex, usually in the center of the

building. It is important that everyone stay clear of windows and avoid open areas.

Those working in a hangar, the gym or in an

open space should seek shelter in a sturdier building. If you cannot get to another building and are caught in the open, get into a ditch or other low area and cover your head.
