AFAS college loans available

"Lack of money is no reason for missing a college education," said MSgt. Duke Gray, NCOIC, Personal Affairs Section.

The Air Force Aid Society awards guaranteed student loans under two programs: the Gen. George S. Brown senior student loan program for individuals working toward Air Force commissions; and the Gen. Henry H. Arnold student loan program for children of Air Force members.

Despite the increasing chances of change, the society remains optimistic that Air Force students who apply after Oct. 1 will be able to get educational assistance.

Loans under the Brown program are available to active-duty members, retirees, reservists, spouses and certain other people. Children of Air Force members in these categories are eligible for loans under the Arnold program. Each program has loans to cover tuition and fees, room and board, books and supplies, personal needs and transportation.

The minimum loan under either program is \$500. Annual loan limits are:

- \$1,250 for an undergraduate student who is attending less than full-time.
- \$2,500 for a full-time undergraduate student.

- \$2,500 for a graduate student attending less than full-time, and

- \$5,000 for a full-time graduate student.

Arnold applicants must be enrolled as full-time students and Brown applicants must be enrolled as at least half-time students.

Aggregate or accumulated loan limits are \$15,000 for an undergraduate student and \$25,000 for a graduate student. The aggregate amount for graduate students includes outstanding amounts which the student borrowed as an undergraduate.

The annual interest rate is nine percent, and a five percent origination fee is deducted from the loan amount. Those borrowing from AFAS for college purposes must begin repaying their loans six months following their graduation or upon termination of studies. Students may begin the repayment process earlier if they wish.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens enrolled or accepted by a Department of Education—approved institution.

Eligibility is based upon the family's adjusted gross income and the amount the family can contribute. The difference between the cost of education and the family contribution is the amount loaned.

AFAS encourages interested students—regardless of financial position—to apply and discuss their eligibility with the school's financial aid officer.

According to the Personal Affairs Section here, there is now at least one student pilot at Reese who earned his commission with the help of the loan programs.

"It's an exceptional program for Air Force dependents wishing to get a college education," Deputy Commander for Resources Col. Donald McCullough said, explaining that no one could predict the spiraling costs of college.

Personal affairs technicians indicated they have loan applications available and that when an applicant is counseled and the application completed, the information is sent to AFAS National Headquarters, Arlington, Va.

One recipient added that the applications take about three months before applicants know if the loan is approved.

Colonel McCullough summed it up best as "an effort on the part of the Air Force to take care of its own."

Stop the clock on burglars

What does \$500.00 mean to you? A paycheck? A vacation? To a burglar it's the average value of a single haul - TV, stereo, or tools he steals.

It doesn't take much to outsmart most burglars. They're usually not "pros". Most often they're kids taking advantage of an easy mark. So easy, in fact, that often they can go right in through an unlocked door or window. That's why there's a burglary every 10 seconds. Stop the clock on burglars. The first step is to always lock your doors - even when you're going out for "just a minute". Keep these simple tips in mind.

- Check all your door locks. They should be the deadbolt type with a strong metal bar extending at least one inch into the door frame.
- Going on a trip? Make your home look "lived in", especially when you're not home.
- Stop the newspaper and mail delivery, or ask a neighbor to collect them so things won't pile up outside.
- Stereos and CB radios - with your personal identification
- Mark all your things that burglars like - TVs, tools,

number (your social security number is good), which is something burglars don't appreciate. After marking all your property, place an "Operation Identification" sticker on a window or door and let burglars know that you care about crime prevention.

- The best way to protect your paycheck from being stolen is by using Sure Pay. It is an easy way to stop a theft. All you have to do is stop by the Military Pay Section at Accounting and Finance and let them sign you up. Civilian personnel can sign up at the Civilian Pay Branch. Take the time to protect your hard earned money.

In the event that you come home and discover a broken window, or a jimmyed door, don't go inside. Confronting a burglar in the act could be dangerous. Call the Security Police or your local police immediately.

Dr. Jacobus explains how to minimize dental emergencies

(ATCNS)—Summertime is here, school is out, and kids and parents alike are more physically active. With this increased activity there are also increased chances for accidents, some of them dental related.

Dental related accidents can be minimized by fast and proper first aid. Time is of the utmost importance and quick action can result in saving teeth that would otherwise be lost.

A tooth will begin to degenerate after 30 minutes outside the

mouth. After this time period, the chances for long-term survival of the tooth are reduced dramatically. However, with proper first aid and follow-up dental treatment, this rate can be improved.

What to do if a tooth is knocked out:

*Find the tooth, but don't touch the root end.

*If it is dirty, gently rinse - only once - in water. Do not scrape the dirt off. The root is very sensitive to trauma.

*Replace the tooth in its socket or place it in the patient's mouth to keep it

moist. If a child is involved, place it gently into a wet gauze pad.

*Immediately report to the dental clinic or emergency room.

If the tooth is only knocked loose, apply a cold pack over the injured area to reduce swelling and bleeding and immediately report to the dental clinic or emergency room.

Remember, if a tooth can be replaced within 30 minutes after the injury, its chances for survival are much better. The longer the tooth is out of the mouth, the less the chances are for survival.

AF post-delivery convalescent leave limited to 28 days

Commanders may authorize Air Force women up to four weeks'—28 days—post-delivery convalescent leave if there are no unusual complications during childbirth, according to Manpower and Personnel Center officials at Randolph. Where the child is born does not affect the convalescent leave period, they explain.

Officials say that in some instances, Air Force women giving birth in Army hospitals have mistakenly received six weeks' convalescent leave. Army policy permits six weeks' convalescence.

The Air Force post-delivery convalescent leave period was reduced from six to four weeks by the Air Force surgeon general in March 1981.

Actual leave time is based on the attending doctor's recommendation. If more than 28 days' leave are recommended, the commander must verify with the doctor that a longer convalescent period is warranted. Randolph AFB, Texas (AFNS).

A 'kite' of a different kind, watch when walking outside

What is a kite? To a child, it's two sticks, newspaper and string magically dancing among the clouds; but, to people at Reese AFB, a different kind of kite can be a real hazard.

The kite, a predatory member of the hawk family, is a migratory bird. Though small, not much larger than a robin, it is fiercely protec-

tive of its territory and its young. Since the kite is an endangered species, it is against the law to harm them or their nests in any way.

Now that kites have taken up residence on base we need to be aware of their location and keep our eyes peeled.

Kites usually attack only when they feel provoked or threatened. The kites' keen eyesight and aerodynamically shaped bodies make passer-bys "easy pickin's" for these kamikaze-like birds.

Kites have been spotted near the chapel, the main gate, the officer's club and the golf course; however, they aren't confined to these areas. It would be wise to keep watch for them anywhere on base: the picnic area, the hospital, even the flightline!

Obviously, we can't stay in our offices or homes all day since we have a mission to accomplish. Take the time to notice your surroundings, and try not to antagonize the kite. Your alertness could save your neck!

Beware of jogging hazards, enjoy accident free exercise

(ATCNS)—Maintaining a high level of physical fitness is a goal everyone should be interested in. And these days, many people are discovering that jogging is a fast, fun, and relatively painless way to get in shape and stay there.

Tests have shown that people who jog regularly, bet-

ween 15 and 30 miles per week, show improvements in job productivity, psychological outlook, and overall enjoyment of life.

But, like any other sport, there's a right way and a wrong way to do it. The following tips on safe jogging will help make sure you ex-

perience the benefits — and none of the drawbacks of this worthwhile form of exercise:

*Start with a thorough physical exam from your doctor, especially if it's been a while since you were on a regular exercise program.

*Once you've got your doctor's O.K., start slowly. Jog-

ging overdose — going too far, too fast — is a frequent cause of aches and pains.

*Warm up and cool down. Before and after you jog, do proper stretching exercises.

*Invest in a good pair of jogging shoes. Get a pair that fits properly and gives you good support.

*Pay attention to where you run. Jogging on unimproved surfaces, such as unpaved or rocky roads, can result in injuries to tendons and joints.

When you heed these few simple safety tips, you're more likely to enjoy many miles of accident-free jogging.

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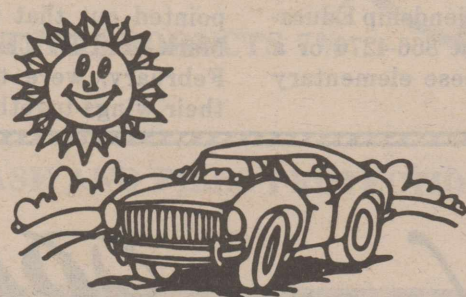
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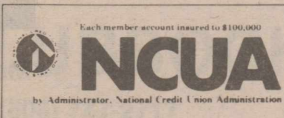

OUR FIRST CALL this week is from a man who wonders why the grass between the runways and along the back side of the base, along the perimeter road, hasn't been cut. "There are places along perimeter road where the grass is so high that it is actually growing over the base fence. And along the runways, the grass is so high I notice the runway lights cannot be seen," he said.

Mowing frequency west of the parking apron is governed by several factors, including the flying schedule, availability of mowing equipment and height of the grass. Grass within 15 feet of roads, taxiways and runways is mowed back to about four inches after it has grown to about eight inches. The next 300 feet is allowed to grow to about 14 inches and is then cut back to about seven inches. All remaining areas are considered unimproved areas and are cut once a year to about seven inches.

So, although some of these latter areas between the runways appear to need cutting, they are generally within the grounds maintenance standards. Exceptions might be those low-lying areas that have been too wet to mow recently. Also, as the caller noted, certain areas along perimeter road to exceed the standards and will be mowed. However, we give first attention to maintaining the grass in the immediate vicinity of runways and taxiways, giving special attention to runway and taxiway lights, distance markers and other facilities and structures directly related to safety and other aspects of the flying mission.

Incidentally, since this CARE Line call was received, we've done additional airfield mowing and we also plan herbicide treatments for certain areas.

ANOTHER CALLER ASKED about memberships at the base golf course. He was told he couldn't transfer his membership to his civilian friend downtown, but saw at the same time that a local bank president had a membership.

Basically, what we're talking about here is a mixture of regulation and community relations. Ac-

cording to the reg, the golf course is open only to members of the Reese community (civilian employees, active duty people, dependents, retirees) and other military and retired people and their dependents who may be passing through the area and want to play. People not authorized to play the course alone may play as guests of those who are.

However, the base commander can allow certain normally ineligible people to use the course in the interest of community relations, social obligations or other morale or protocol situations. He has used this authority to approve the membership of the manager of the Reese branch of the Lubbock National Bank.

A WORKING WIFE called concerning maintenance to her air conditioner in family housing. She and her husband both work and the problem was that the contractor couldn't give her a definite time and date when the repairs would be done.

While it's regrettable that a repair appointment couldn't be made in this instance, the work was never-the-less performed satisfactorily and within the time limits imposed on the contractor.

Operation Boot Strap

WASHINGTON (AFNS)—Operation Boot Strap may sound like a code word for a special mission; and, in a way, it is: one with the goal of obtaining a college degree.

Boot strap allows airmen to be released from their regular duties for up to a year to complete an associate or a bachelor's degree studies.

To be eligible, an enlisted member must meet these requirements:

— The supervisor or commander must be willing to release the member from duty without replacement and without compromising the miss for the requested period.

— The member must agree to replace Boot Strap time with triple that time in military service obligation.

— Members submitting applications for Boot Strap must need the time to accelerate studies in order to apply for Officer Training School or be unable to complete a degree program through off-duty, part-time study.

— Members must meet eligibility requirements for officers described in AFR 53-27 and AFR 36-1.

— A letter from the college must give the title of the specific degree the member is seeking, start and end of each term courses are to be completed, minimum course load for each term, and residence requirements for the college.

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One computer serves all

The Data Automation Section runs over 70 computer systems here, all on one computer—not one computer per system as many customers of data automation think according to 2nd Lt. Olen Paden, chief of data automation.

Production control chief MSgt. Jim Clark pointed out that the local unit also maintains responsibility for the computer needs of the Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve units at Pittsburgh, Penn. those units alone place almost as many demands upon the Reese unit as Reese itself.

Data automation is "beseiged" by higher priority requests around the first of the month since monthly reports have to get to higher headquarters then, said Clark "If people could get their

stuff in a little earlier, things might ease up," he added.

Sergeant Clark added that because of the increased higher-priority requests at the first of the month people are really no better off than when sending their material through routine channels.

"We run a tight schedule 24 hours a day here," said Sergeant Clark, "and we try to treat everyone justly." He also mentioned that if those customers could wait a day or so before their materials was sent out it would also ease tension and pressure.

Not one of the computer customers spends more than 17 percent of the computer's time a month. When a higher priority is requested the affect it will have on the other customers is considered.

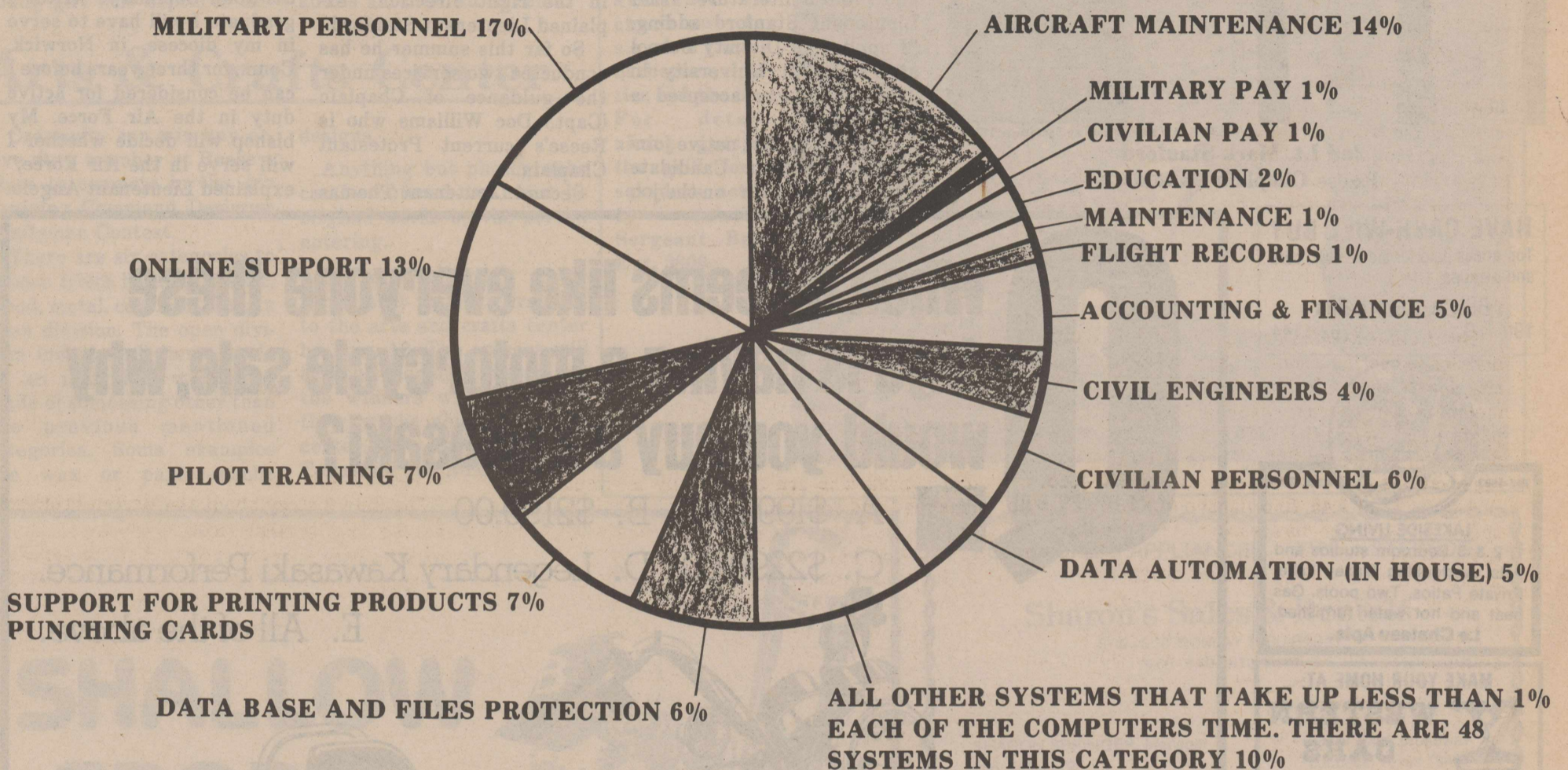
Lieutenant Paden pointed out that just because someone has a low percentage of computer use, it does not mean that they get a lot of priority—military pay is a prime example: only one percent of usage per month for this obviously high priority item.

The percentages used below are based up on the time used out of 580 hours for one month.

Data automation works around the clock providing customer support for well over 100 operations. How a higher priority affects them is as important as getting the mission accomplished.

Sergeant Clark summed it saying that "following a schedule helps us help everyone".

"As an Air Force chaplain I would like to help others sort out their lives and find their place, as a chaplain I will be able to be there to help them sort out what they want, help with their struggles and be able to guide them in the right direction," explained Lieutenant Stanford.

So far this summer he has conducted two services under the guidance of Chaplain (Capt.) Doc Williams who is Reese's current Protestant Chaplain.

Angelo knew from an early age that he wanted to be a Catholic priest. "I was brought up around military installations, and I regard my career as a special kind of ministry" said Lieutenant Angelo.

"With my strong faith convictions and my upbringing I always thought about becoming a priest. Then while I was attending Western Kentucky University I felt a stronger calling," explained Lieutenant Angelo adding, "I applied for St. John Seminary in Boston, Mass., and was accepted for their program."

Lieutenant Angelo cannot come directly into the Air Force after his completion at St. John Seminary. My bishop will decide whether I will serve in the Air Force," explained Lieutenant Angelo.

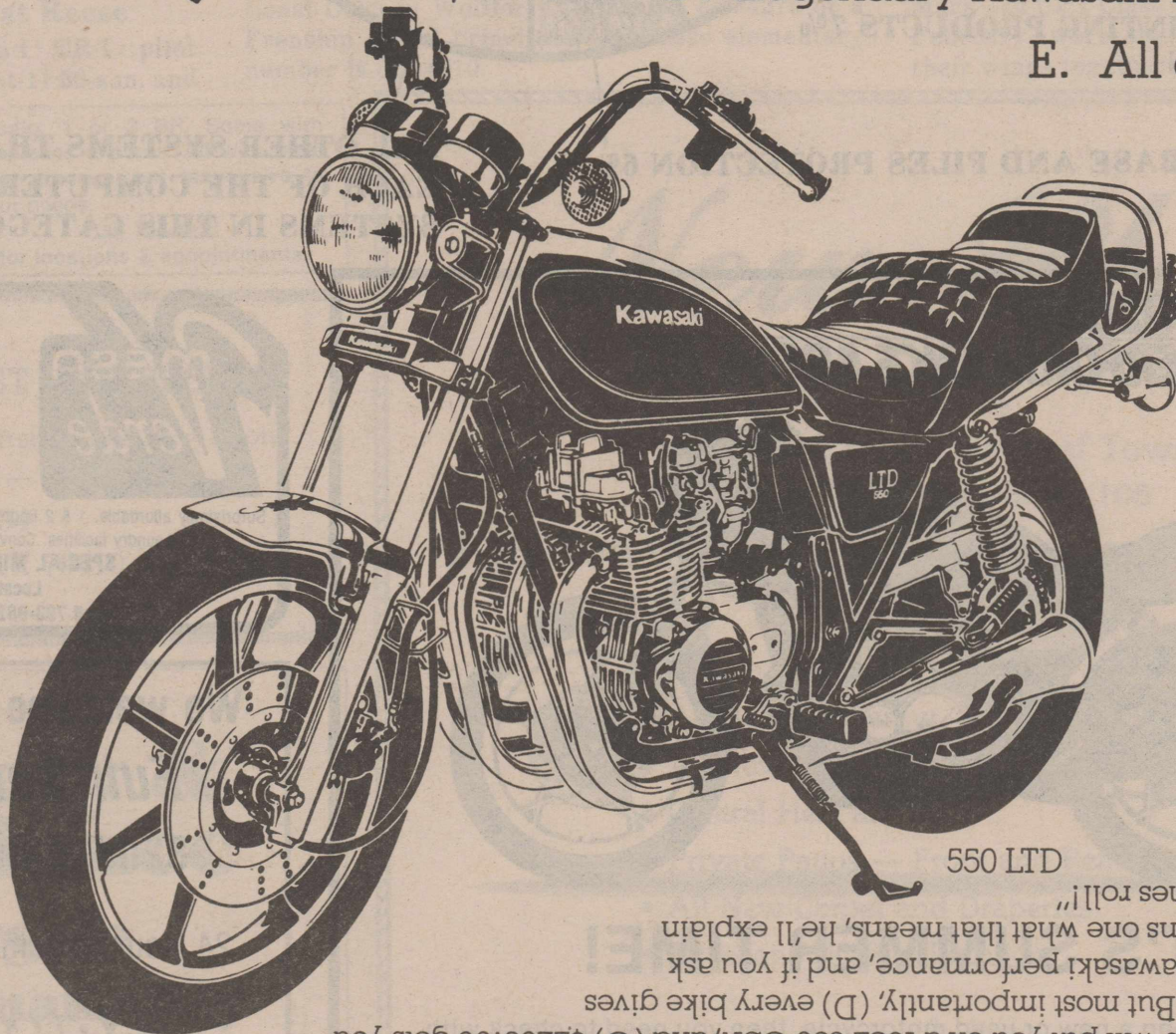

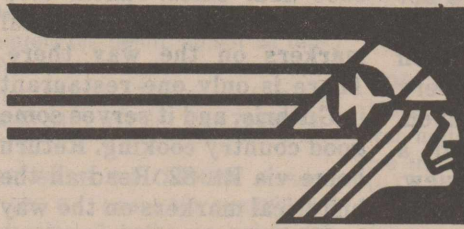

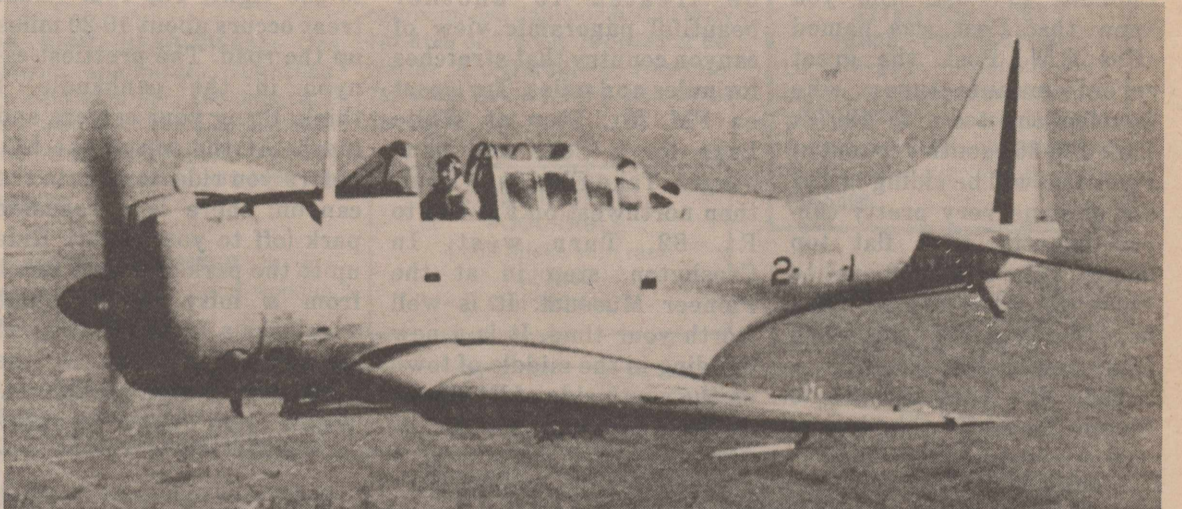

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Base soccer players plan early August competition

(ATCNS)—Soccer players throughout the command will have the opportunity to prove themselves when the 1982 Air Training Command varsity soccer championships get underway in August.

Regional competition will be held at Randolph AFB, Texas; Sheppard AFB, Texas; and Columbus AFB, Miss., Aug. 6-8 to determine district champions.

A 14 member soccer team will be leaving Reese Aug. 5 for Randolph and regional play. Things look "fairly good" for Reese to win said TSgt. Craig Ford, base soccer coach.

Sergeant Ford did point out

that since several members of the Reese team are student pilots it may be difficult just getting to Randolph. He explained, "if they can just get released for the weekend and win their district," he could use players from the teams Reese defeated as Reese players to continue in the ATC finals competition.

Sergeant Ford bases his good feeling about the Reese team on the fact that Reese has the oldest command soccer program (six years old). This, however, is the first year the Air Force has recognized soccer as a varsity sport along with softball and basketball.

The Reese team members use to pay for their soccer trips, except when the base "Morale, Welfare and Recreation Division had additional funds to help offset cost."

The three district champions will then travel to Randolph for the ATC finals Aug. 10-12. During the final matches the best players will be selected and nominated to represent the command at the Air Force soccer training camp at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, Aug. 30-Sept. 18.

An Air Force team will be selected from the participants at the training camp to represent the Air Force in the interservice soccer competition.
