Fuels Management Branch gets fourth nomination in a row

## Reese nominated for API award

The Fuels Management Branch of the 64th Supply Squadron here will compete against similar branches at Laughlin AFB, Texas, Mather AFB, Calif., and Columbus AFB, Miss. for the American Petroleum Institute Trophy award for this year.

The API trophy is awarded annually to the best operated fuels management system in the Air Force.

Of the four API candidates, Laughlin will have the edge after winning the command award last year. No matter which of the Air Training Command bases wins the 1982 award, the winner will have to go up against all the other major command API winners for the Air Force honors.

The 1982 nomination is the fourth consecutive time that ATC officials have nominated

the Reese fuels unit. Reese Fuels Management was among the top three in the 1980 ATC API competition and moved to runner-up in the command's 1981 API competition.

During the November 1981 ATC Management Effectiveness Inspection they proved themselves worthy of being called "professionals," scoring a third consecutive

"excellent" rating.

The trophy itself is a silver, winged bronze oil drop on a trapezoidal gold and mahogany base with gold plates inscribed with the purpose of the trophy and the winning organizations name.

The API program is designed to stimulate command interest in the handling of fuels from safety to mission accomplishment based on sound management.

There is a plaque that accompanies the award with the same information inscribed on it. The plaques are kept by the winning unit, but the trophy moves from unit to unit as new winners are announced.

Plaques are also awarded to the second and third place winners and Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve organizations whose fuels management operations earn outstanding ratings.

## New trainer gets T-46A designation

(ATCNS)—The Next Generation Trainer will be officially designated the T-46A, Air Force officials recently announced.

The new trainer is scheduled to begin operational service in 1987, at which time it will replace the T-37B as the Air Force's primary jet trainer.

At Reese, Air Force student pilots have been getting acquainted with basic flying skills in the T-37Bs for better than two decades.

Like the T-37B, the new trainer will be used to teach Air Force student pilots fundamental flying skills and prepare them to advance to the basic phase of pilot training in the supersonic T-38 Talon.

The Fairchild Republic Company of Farmingdale, N.Y., is the prime contractor for the T-46A. The new jet

trainer's engines will be manufactured by the Garrett Corporation's Garrett Turbine Engine Company in Phoenix, Ariz.

Features included on the NGT will be twin engines, side-by-side seating, cabin pressurization, improved ejection seats and anti-icing capability. The 6,800-pound aircraft's two engines will be in the 1,300-pound thrust category.

In terms of performance, the T-46A will be able to sustain 2.5 Gs at 25,000 feet. It will be capable of cruising at 376 knots at an altitude of 25,000 feet, with a maximum cruise altitude of 42,000 feet, much higher than the T-37 is capable of flying.

The T-46A represents the first acquisition of an Air Force trainer since 1973, when the Boeing T-43A navigator trainer entered the service's inventory.

## Six seconds to live

NORTON AFB, Calif. (AFNS)—Taking just six seconds to buckle-up an auto seatbelt could save an estimated 12,000 lives each year, say Air Force Inspection and Safety officials at Norton.

Halfway through the annual "Make it Click—101 Most Critical Days" campaign, which began May 29, 19 Air Force people had died in motor-vehicle related accidents.

During 1981 some 14,320

people died on the nation's highways.

Safety experts worldwide have joined with business, industry and civic volunteer groups, working through the National Safety Council, to get people to save lives by wearing seatbelts. Safety officials said "the use of safety belts is smart, easy and effective. They only take six seconds to click on, which is little to ask for a lifetime reward."

## Colonel O'Grady endorses Project Warrior

(ATCNS)—When accused of making snap decisions, General George S. Patton once retorted, "I've been studying the art of warfare for forty-odd years. When a surgeon decides in the course of an operation to change its objective . . . he is not making a snap decision but one based on knowledge, experience and training. So am I."

General Patton's response is pertinent to all professional military members. Our military strength lies in the present status of

our forces, the knowledge of our people and in our leadership. We can't make sound day-to-day decisions or wise future plans if we don't have a firm understanding of the people, events and decisions that have made us what we are today.

We need a "book knowledge" of tactical military history and an appreciation for past leaders whose plans created our present. We must draw on their wisdom if we want to plan effectively for tomorrow. In this sense, we stand strong today only when we have one foot planted firmly in the past and the other boldly stepping out into the future.

**Project Warrior** challenges us to learn the lessons of military history in order to make a better tomorrow. That is a challenge and opportunity for each of us. The enthusiasm with which we meet that challenge will help us rise above petty concerns and self interest by recognizing true adversity and how it may be successfully met and overcome.

If we educate ourselves to recognize the small concerns and maintain those minor concerns in their proper perspective with the larger issues, we will ensure yesterday's lessons become a part of a ready U.S. Air Force.

### CMSAF Andrews sees the need for leading by example

## Leadership fever is something for all to catch

"We need to get well," CMSAF Arthur L. "Bud" Andrews says about discipline and leadership in the enlisted force. "Sincere" falls light years short of explaining how strongly he feels about that.

"If Air Force senior enlisted members don't shoulder their responsibility as leaders, we will fail and fail miserably," he warned.

"If I were to rate our discipline on a scale of one to 10 right now, it would fall somewhere around 3.5 to four."

"I'm sorry, but this is Bud Andrews speaking . . ." often precedes a statement he feels strongly about. The "I'm sorry . . ." is truly not an apology but a way of saying he has no misgiving about what he says. It's usually used just before he uncovers what he calls an "ugly," a problem some don't want to see.

He feels you can't correct problems until you identify them. Many "I'm sorry, but this is Bud Andrews speaking" precede discussions of leadership and discipline.

Now is the time for our discipline problems to be cured, the chief master sergeant of the

Air Force contends.

"We are here to preserve and protect our liberties, our country. We can never lose sight of that. If you are in the Air Force for any other reason, then maybe you should strongly consider taking off your uniform and finding something else. You need to be 'all the way in or all the way out.'

"Our country, our very lives and way of life depend on our mission being accomplished. Nothing can come before that. We don't have the luxury of an eight-to-five job. So when asked to stay past 'normal' duty hours there should be only one response: 'I'll be here until the job gets done.'"

Total commitment and nothing less is what senior noncommissioned officers should give and ask of their people, Chief Master Sergeant Andrews says. A number of senior NCOs aren't doing that.

"The number of senior NCOs who are not carrying their share of the load is large enough to scare me," he admits. "Our senior Air Force leadership is on target. They have their act

together. It's at the senior NCO level where we have problems, and it goes down from there. Leadership by example is the only way it's going to work.

"Our young people are coming out of basic training disciplined and prepared and wanting to be an important part of the team," assures the chief master sergeant of the Air Force.

"It's when they report to their supervisors that discipline starts to unravel. That's just not right, and it tells me the supervisors just aren't carrying their share of the load.

"Someone once said I worried too much about 'gig lines' and 35-10. 'After all, what does it matter if one's belt buckle isn't in line as long as I do a good job,' they asked. My answer is that discipline must start somewhere. First it's the belt buckle, then the shoes, then the uniform, the hair, and on and on until the job, too, starts to slip and get out of line—out of line to the point our work is now looking sloppy.

"Leadership is a fever we must all catch."

**MANY PEOPLE ARE WONDERING** why our main gate is still closed and the repaving project unfinished. Received a call on this, asking, "Why is it taking so long to get the front gate fixed? Every week, I've looked out there and it doesn't seem like they work, but one day on it, if even that."

In one word, the problem has been "rain", and the fact that May saw about twice as much of it as usual. The contractor was able to excavate the area easily enough, but the continuous wet weather in May and June prevented him from laying the "caliche", that stone-and-sand mixture that you

see there now, until the earthen base could dry our sufficiently. We require the contractor to meet certain specifications in regard to the density of the earth below the pavement and these specs couldn't be met until the rain stopped and things had a chance to dry out.

Because of this, we've given the contractor until August 10 to finish the job.

**OUR NEWLY-PAVED PARKING LOTS** were the subject of another call. The caller seemed a little peeved about the tar and small stones that have been showing up in all our cars because of the paving and wondered if the contractor could spread extra gravel over the fresh tar to hold it down and possibly extend the life of the pavement.

This wouldn't work because only one layer of "aggregate", in this case the stones used to lay over the fresh tar, will adhere to the asphalted surface. Extra gravel would not stick and would simply compound the ex-

isting problem without extending the life of the pavement. In any case, the seal will harden in a few weeks and lose its troublesome stickiness.

**A TECH SERGEANT** called recently, curious about why WAPS score cards hadn't been released. He'd heard that his unit commander had seen the cards, but had released them to another section where they were being held, violating the confidentiality of WAPS scores.

The problem was that our caller had been misinformed. The confidentiality of WAPS scores had not been violated. Not only had his commander not sent his score card to another section, his score card was not even on base. He had recently arrived PCS from another base, whose promotions section had not forwarded his score card as they should have. Consequently there was nothing to give this person when the scores were released. Another score sheet has been ordered for him.

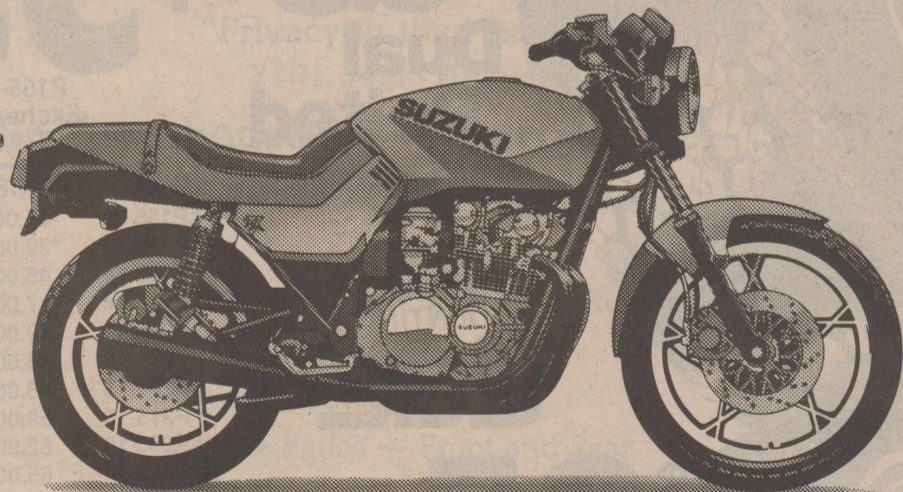

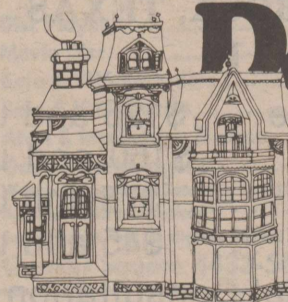

## IRS rules on Universal Life Insurance

The IRS recently issued a ruling on Universal Life Insurance policies that could alter the favorable investment opportunities offered by this type of insurance.

Universal Life was developed recently as an alternative to other forms of life insurance. The Universal Life policy term insurance with a deferred annuity to provide a type of "whole life" policy. The Universal Life policy promises a yield of over 10 percent compared to the 3-4 percent normally afforded by "whole life" policies. Agents have been offering "guaranteed rates" of up to 13 percent with Universal Life policies.

The ruling by the IRS now requires the insurance companies to pay more taxes on the premiums they receive on these Universal Life policies than they had anticipated. This reduces their expected profit, and therefore the companies will have to reduce the yields paid on these policies.

Caution is advised in exploring the investment opportunities in this type of insurance. Examine any policy carefully to determine what is "guaranteed" and what is not.

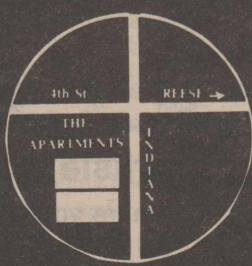

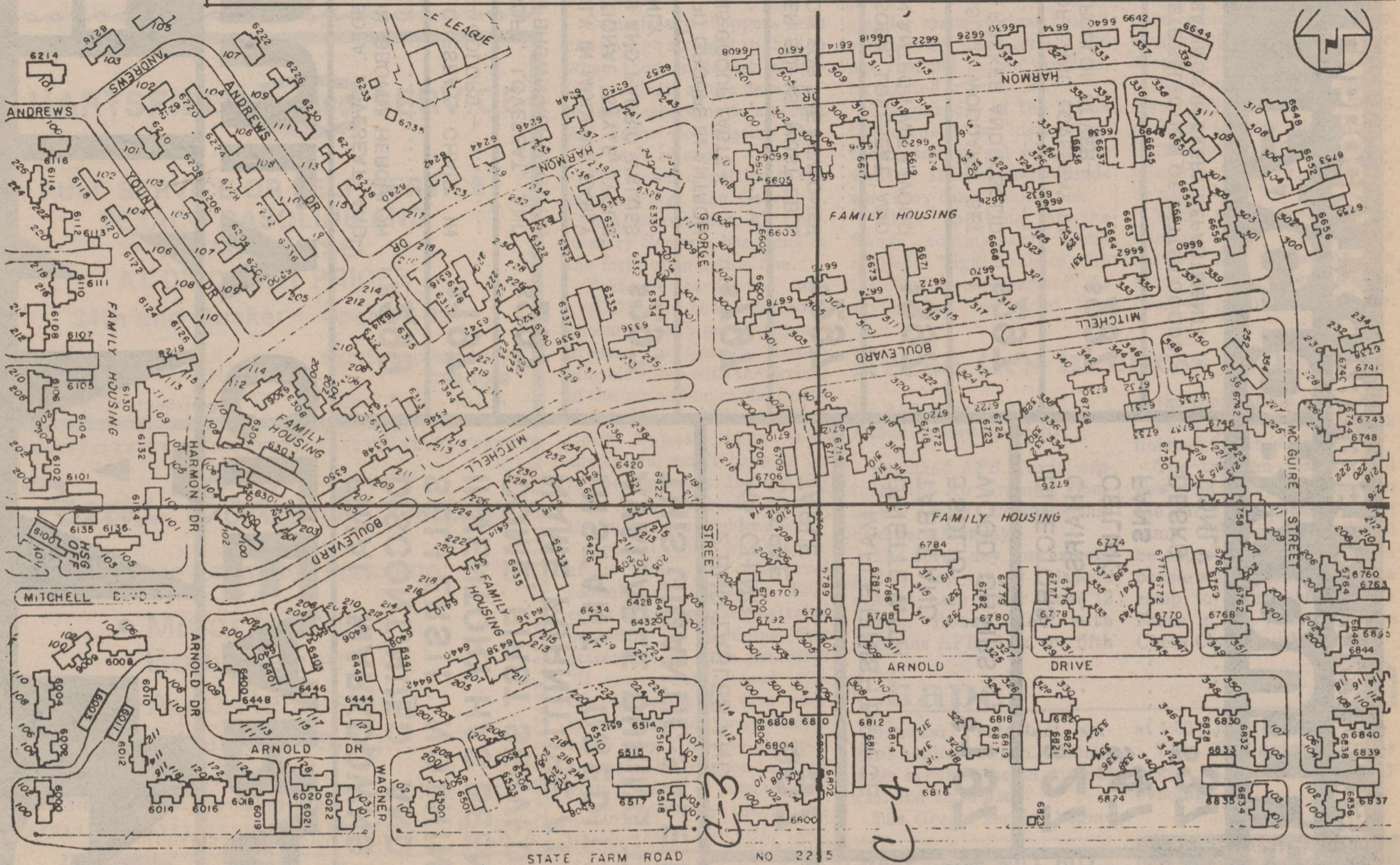

**Commissary action line  
now available here**

Commissary shoppers here can now go straight to the top when they encounter shopping problems at the base commissary according to a recent Air Force Commissary Service news release.

The means of getting to the top man, Maj. Gen. George C. Lynch, commander, AF Commissary Service, has come in the form of an action line.

Post-paid cards are now available in the base commissary—each personally addressed to General Lynch himself. Even with the arrival of the action line cards, Reese Commissary Officer Eldon Cook hopes "they (the customers) won't have to go to the top brass. Instead, I'd hope that we could resolve the customers problem here."

General Lynch was specific about giving the base-level commissary managers first crack at commissary patrons' problems by including this statement on each postcard: "If you're not pleased with the operation of this commissary let the store manager know why. Give the manager a reasonable chance to work your problem or suggestion."

By the same token, the Commissary Service com-

mander made it clear that if commissary management did not respond to the problem, he wanted to know why.

The purpose of the action line cards is to "insure that the customers get what they want or at least understands why they can't," said Cook.

When speaking of the Reese commissary, Cook ranked it "right up there with the best commissaries." As savings go, he added that

base commissary patrons are saving 25-26 percent over shopping in the local markets.

Cook expanded his statement, saying that the 25-26 percent savings did not include items on sale at the commissary: "they're freebies," he said.

With the present commissary staff Cook seems assured that the action line cards at the identification desk will get little usage here.

## Check for VHA eligibility

So people who qualify for variable housing allowance aren't getting it, according to officials of the Air Force Accounting and Finance Center, at Lowry AFB, Colo.

The reasons are because the allowance was never started, was not restarted after a permanent-change-of-station move or was not started following promotion to a grade eligible for VHA.

Air Force members are eligible to receive the allowance if they meet either of two sets of criteria. The first set is: stationed in the continental United States, receiving basic allowance for quarters, not residing in government inadequate housing and the average cost of off-base housing exceeds 115 percent of quarters allowance.

The second set is: stationed overseas, receiving quarters allowance for the family members who reside stateside, family members not residing in government inadequate housing, and the average cost of housing where the family members live exceeds 115 percent of quarters allowance.

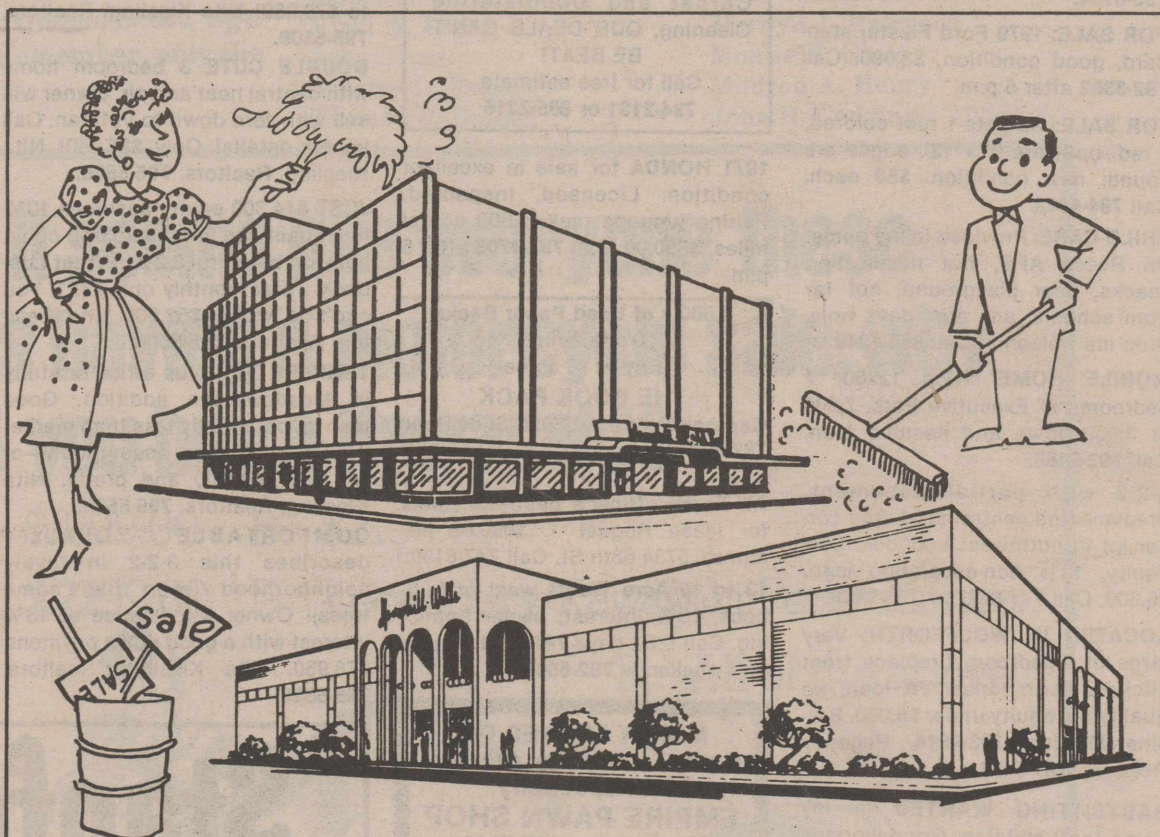
