Reese surpasses 1983 CFC goal early

Reese has topped its \$91,500 1983 Combined Federal Campaign goal. In fact Reese supporters of CFC have now gathered together \$109,784.95.

Because of the tremendous

response by Reese community the base was the first of the 12 Lubbock area divisions to meet their goal. CFC Chairman Col. Richard E. Hearne recently expressed his appreciation for a quick, highly successful 1983 campaign. "Everyone contributed greatly."

And, while all of the base

units helped Reese meet its goal, 14 groups, units and organizations managed to hit the 100 percent mark. They include the 35th Flying Training Squadron, the 54th FTS, the 64th Student Squadron, the 64th Organizational Maintenance Squadron, the 64th Transportation Division, the 3314th Management

Engineering Squadron, Services Division, Readiness Division, the 1958th Communications Squadron, the 64th Security Police Division, the Chapel, the 64th Flying Wing and Air Base Group commanders' staffs.

Of those, the commanders' staffs, the security police and the management engineering

squadron topped the 200 percent mark.

Even though Reese has hit 119.9 percent of the 1983 goal CFC Vice-chairman 1st Lt. Jackie Lopez pointed out that the 1983 campaign is just now half over. For that reason the Reese contributions will grow even still. "There are some squadrons still reporting in."

First base-made ATC film developed here

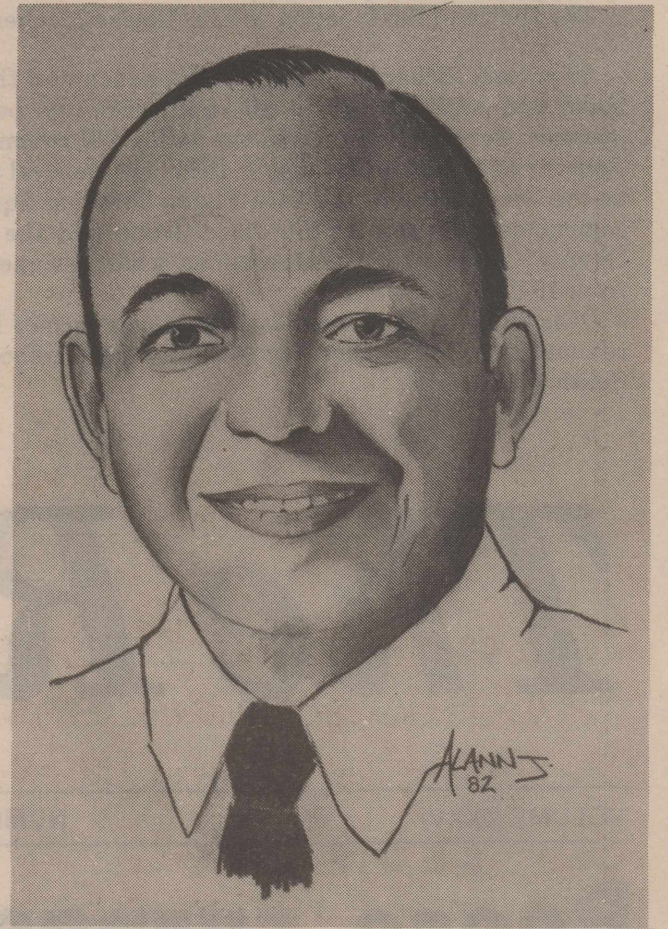
Many Air Force personnel experience financial problems and have difficulty making "ends meet" in today's environment. This situation is understandable with the inflationary interest rates and price increases we have seen in the recent past. Air Force and DoD leaders have exerted significant efforts to increase entitlements and benefits, but many of these are also difficult to achieve and require time to implement.

There are other ways that the Air Force can help our people. One of these is a program to help people manage their money more efficiently. The program is called the Personal Financial Management Program. Here's how it works. People from various organizations have volunteered their time to provide free management counselling on various topics and problem areas. These include tips and advice on establishing budgets, checkbook management, the cost of

credit, and numerous other consumer savings tips.

Each of these sessions is tailored to the individual and provide free advice and counselling for the military member and may include dependents, such as the wife, if you desire. The volunteers have been carefully selected and professionally trained to provide the best service and assistance possible.

Ask yourself the following questions: Am I saving as much as I should? Am I spending my money wisely? Do my charge account balances grow each month? Am I having trouble deciding if I can afford a major purchase? If you answered no to either or both of the first two, or yes to either or both of the last two, PFMP may be for you. The program is open to all airmen, NCOs, officers, civilians and dependents and is strictly voluntary. Our base program is monitored by the Accounting and Finance Office. Energy is still money: the crisis remains

"Why aren't we seeing more energy awareness reminders lately? Why do many commanders no longer list energy as one of their top priorities? Is the energy crisis over?"

The Air Force goal—to use 20 percent less facility energy in 1985 than we used in 1975—was being met through 1981. But by the end of fiscal 1982 we had achieved less than in 1981.

Why?

Could it be that savings from energy projects and retrofits already on line have eroded? That's doubtful.

Maybe it's because we've become more of an electronic Air Force, using more computers and electrical devices, along with more air conditioning. But this didn't happen overnight, and that had not hampered steady energy savings in the past.

Some even blame the weather, but preliminary reports do not point that way.

The only area left is a change in attitude—a perception that the energy crisis is over. Perhaps we have even burned out on the energy conservation theme. Maybe it's time to take a new look at the problem.

Here's the way I see it.

Energy and money are almost synonymous, and today it isn't the lack of energy that should drive our program, but the cost of it.

If we begin substituting the word "money" for "energy" in the posters, articles and slogans we've used in the past, you'll see we are achieving the same end.

The cost of energy impacts heavily on our operating budget. That results in an increasing dollar crisis that will not go away for some time.

\$750 million will be spent for Air Force facility energy this year, and even more next year.

Let's get back into the savings habit. This time let's concentrate on the dollars. Let these dollars be the motivating aspect in the new crisis—the dollar crisis.

To get on top again, all we have to do is treat energy as if it were money.

After all, it is.

Protect your family from the fire demon

Fire—just as other elements of nature—can be a boon to humanity if used safely and in the right way. It warms us in the winter, lights our way through the darkness and cooks the food we eat.

But when used to the extreme and improperly, fire is a demon. It kills. It inflicts pain and suffering. It ravages through homes destroying both life and property.

Too often, fire is more costly in terms of life and limb than in terms of property. For example, a gas hot-water heater pilot light ignites vapors from a gasoline can stored in the utility room of a base house.

By the time the firefighters arrive, the Air Force member has put out the fire with a home extinguisher. It was a small fire with only \$180 damage. But the cost to those who lived there is hard to measure. A two-year-

old boy has burns over 30 percent of his body. The father has second-degree burns on his hand.

Of the 644 Air Force fires since the beginning of the year, Air Force Engineering and Services Center officials at Tyndall say 238 were in the home. And 23.8 percent of those started in the kitchen.

Most kitchen fires are caused by grease, or unattended cooking. The second leading cause of home fires is children playing with matches, according to MSgt. Gerry E. Knapp of the AFESC Fire Protection Group.

Sergeant Knapp put it this way: "When matches and lighters are left within reach of children, sooner or later they will play with them. It's part of the child's learning process to imitate adults. When the parent lights a match and tosses it into an ashtray, the child will do it, too. And the outcome can mean disaster."

Appliances and electrical systems are the

third leading cause of home fires. Lint buildup in dryers, defective or neglected appliances such as coffeepots and toasters, are other fire hazards.

Carelessness is the reason for most fires, Sergeant Knapp said. "Improper disposal of smoking materials and falling asleep while smoking are other leading causes of fires in the home."

Recent changes in the liability law for negligence mean that occupants of family housing can expect to pay for damages to the structure without any limitation on their liability, officials said.

Take these tips from the professionals. Think. Did you turn off the burner? Are the matches stored away from the children? Are electrical outlets safely installed? Have your appliances been checked for defects lately? Protect your home from the fire demon. Protect your family.

This man's duty performance has been observed and is satisfactory. He is well-motivated and sincerely wants to do a good job.

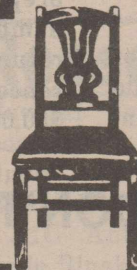

The library folks especially need people licensed to drive government trucks. But, even if you can't, they still need your help this weekend. Call the library at Ext. 3344 to offer your services.

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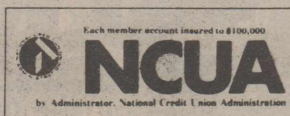

Don't forget dependent care

October is the annual counseling month for dependent care responsibilities. Everyone should understand the relationship between dependent

care responsibilities and the accomplishment of military duties and obligations.

Single member sponsors and military couples with dependents face unique family situations that could limit their availability to meet a full range of military duties which, in turn, can impact on readiness.

An increasing number of these members are not making realistic dependent care arrangements. These groups now represent 5.1 percent of the total Air Force population. In 1981, the Air Force Inspector General found 27 percent of the affected persons had not made realistic dependent care arrangements.

All Air Force personnel must be available for worldwide duties at all times including PCS or PCA, unaccompanied tours, short notice TDY or no notice deployments, alerts, recalls, extended duty hours, shift work and similar military obligations. Each military member must make arrangements for dependent care to maintain worldwide availability.

The new AFR 35-39, Dependent Care Responsibilities outlines Air Force policy on dependent care responsibilities. Become familiar with it. Commanders or first sergeants will counsel those concerned on their dependent care arrangements.

Taxes

Taxpayers who fail to file a return within 60 days of the filing date face a minimum penalty of \$100 or the amount of tax due, whichever is less, and the penalty for not supplying information preparers with your taxpayer identification number (for such items as interest and dividend returns) will net you a penalty of \$50 per occurrence, up from \$5 currently, to a maximum of \$50,000 per year.

Is it true that the act permits the Treasury to increase the interest rate on U.S. Savings Bonds? A miscellaneous provision of the legislation amortizes the Secretary of the Treasury to periodically change the interest rates on both new and outstanding series EE and HH Savings Bonds, but the rate cannot be decreased below a minimum yield guaranteed when the bonds are first sold. Under previous law, rate boosts were limited to 1/2 percent every six months. The interest on series EE and HH Bonds, now 9 percent and 9.5 percent, respectively, has not been increased since May 1981. While the Treasury has not yet unveiled its plans, it is possible that they will follow the model outlined by Secretary Reagan late last year. That plan would set EE interest at 85 percent of the average yield on five-year Treasury Securities and would change the rate every six months. The Act will also affect the interest paid on the older series E and H Bonds.

Working moms are being more common

More than half of the children growing up in the United States have mothers who work outside the home. A National Research Council panel has concluded that parental employment is "neither universally good nor bad," and that the only overall and uniform effect of paid work is "to add to the family income and to decrease the amount of time parents have available for family tasks." The number of single-parent households has in-

creased sharply because one of three marriages end in divorce. One in five children live with only one parents, almost always the mother. These children are most likely to live in poverty, especially if the mothers are not employed, the panel said. The greatest rate of increase in women's employment has been among the mothers of preschoolers. More than 40 percent of children under 3 years of age have working mothers. 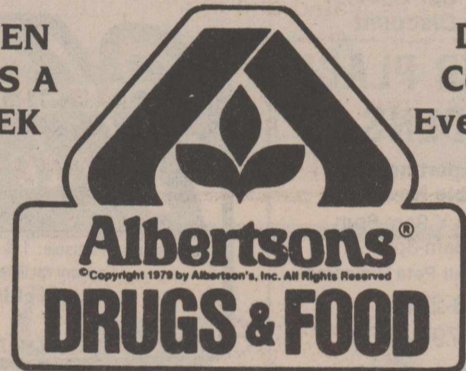

As the chief administrator for the Consumer Health Education Program here, it is her job to insure that everyone who benefits from Air Force medical service knows the proper lifestyles they should maintain in order to stay as healthy as possible.

In keeping with her programs objectives, Captain Jaskowiec provided the Roundup audience with a sim-

ple good health quiz. Each answer is worth the points indicated.

Do you take time to get completely away from work and other pressures, to unwind? frequently, 4; fairly often, 3; sometimes, 2; seldom, 1; or "I just can't", 0.

Do you sleep well, fall asleep easily and sleep throughout the night? very well, 4; fairly well, 3; not so well, 2; have trouble, 1; or can't sleep, 0.

Do you take, or feel the need to take, aspirin, tranquilizers, sleeping pills, stomach medicines, or lax-

atives? seldom or never, 4; occasionally, 3; fairly often, 2; quite often, 1; or hooked, 0.

Do you practice a form of deep relaxation daily? Everyday, 4; often, 3; occasionally, 2; seldom, 1; or not at all, 0.

Can you run a mile at any speed without becoming exhausted? easily, 4; fairly well, 3; barely make it, 2; cannot, 1; or cannot even walk it, 0.

Can you play a fast, strenuous sport without getting exhausted? easily, 4; fairly well, 3; get very tired, 2; get exhausted, 1; or would not try, 0.

Do you jog or in some way

actively exercise several times a week? usually, 4; often, 3; occasionally, 2; seldom, 1; or not at all, 0.

Are you fairly strong and physically able? very, 4; moderately, 3; adequate, 2; weak, 1; or ?

Are you overweight? no, 4; a little, 3; moderately, 2; a lot, 1; or fat, 0.

Do you smoke? no, 4; yes 2 or 3 a day, 3; half a pack, 2; one pack or more daily, 1; or chain smoker, 0.

Do you drink (include liquor, wine or beer)? no, 4; rarely, 3; one daily, 2; several daily, 1; or drunk daily, 0.

Do you drink coffee, tea, colas, or other sources of caffeine or sugar? no, 4; 1 or 2 daily, 3; several daily, 2; regularly, 1; or all the time, 0.

After you have completed this good health quiz you can score yourself. First add up all points scored, then divide by 12 and there you have your average. If you are now pleased with the results, you can take measures to correct areas where you scored low on the test.

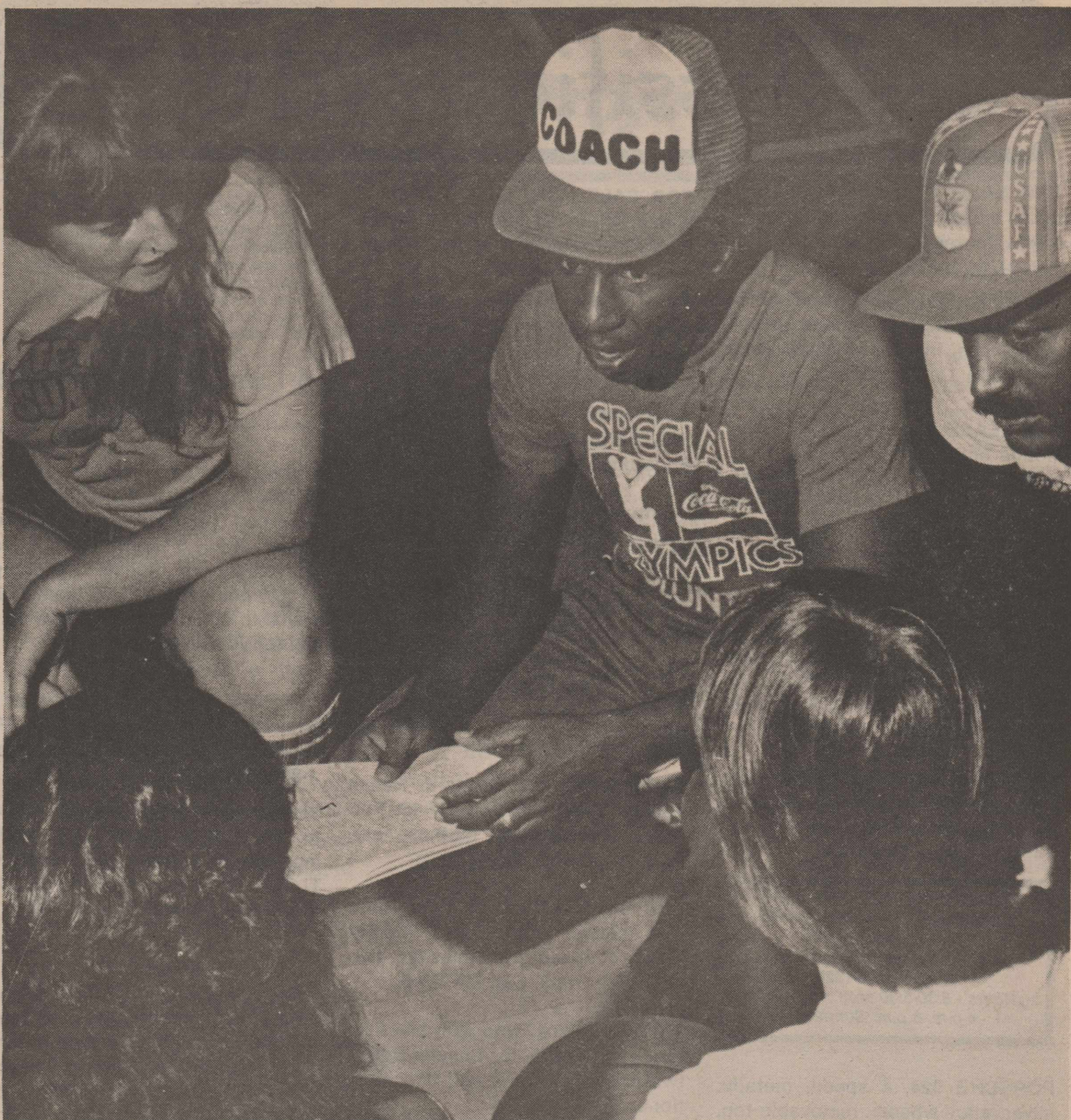

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Project Warrior

The Battle of Leyte Gulf by Adrian Stewart. New York: Charles Scribner's Sons, 1980, 214 pages, \$14.95.

Some might argue that advances made in both strategic and tactical weaponry in the last three decades have rendered naval battles, like the Leyte Gulf confrontation, obsolete—quaint military episodes important only to the nostalgic or to those interested in the evolution of man's war-making abilities. Adrian Stewart, English attorney and military writer, would not agree.

His *Battle of Leyte Gulf*, based exclusively on secondary works, provides a lively examination of what has frequently been called the last major naval battle of World War II. The hard-fought conflict resulted in the decima-

tion of the Japanese fleet: Twenty-six vessels with more than 300,000 total tonnage were destroyed. The United States lost just six ships of only 37,000 tons. The Japanese defeat, of course, facilitated the recapture of the Philippines a few months later.

Leyte Gulf was the first battle in which the Japanese employed the kamikaze. Stewart is at his best in his description of the history, nature, and function of these suicide planes. He differs with those who would write off the use of kamikazes as a mere desperation move. To the contrary, he argues, the use of kamikazes was in the best Japanese warrior tradition and was tactically sound.

Stewart finds many heroes among the victors and a "goat" on each side. He in-

dicts Admiral Takeo Kurita for vacillation when there was a probability of spectacular victory. Singled out for particular derision is Admiral William Halsey, who Stewart accuses of grossly underestimating the enemy; this misreading could have been disastrous for the American fleet had Kurita followed up on the advantage Halsey's negligence provided him.

The book is quick reading for those interested in an overview of the Leyte Gulf battle, but it is unscholarly and overlooks other recent studies.
