He was selected to attend a command conference to determine future operational and maintenance requirements for training devices and to accomplish a general study of the synthetic trainer Air Force Specialty code. He was also selected to serve on the Air Training Command promotion board to technical and master sergeant, the wing airman performance report board, and the NCO Advisory Council.

How many pilots, each day here at Reese, have their instructor gently but firmly remind them that the aircraft they presently control is in the wrong attitude? The

> controls brings the plane back to it's proper perspective with good old mother earth. Wouldn't it be wonderful if we could correct the attitude of all our personnel with so little effort?

Why is this intangible subject so important in Maj. Elliff a person's daily life? I firmly believe it is the single most important factor that distinguishes the professional from the amateur. Without the proper attitude, even the most gifted individual turns out mediocre work. With it, many less fortunate people astound their fellow men. And attitude is catching.

Have you ever worked with someone who could care less how well he accomplished his job? "Good enough for government work!" That one statement typifies the attitude of far too many Air Force troops. Have you ever said it? Of course! Most of us have at one time or another. But too many people mean it sincerely and therein lies the problem of association. Say it long enough and before you know it your values are lowered to this ridiculous phrase. The quality of your work deteriorates.

On the other hand, have you ever worked with anyone who takes the time to do his job the correct way? You know there are many ways to do a job: the fast way, the slow way, the easy way, the hard way, and there's your way and my way. But the only way we should accept is the correct way. There is a tremendous feeling of personal pride and self satisfaction in knowing you did the job correctly, and did it well. Accept nothing less than the best. One man with the proper attitude, particularly if he is a supervisor, can change the course of an entire organization.

There are many fringe benefits to a proper attitude. You can be identified as a professional. And a professional is inherently safe. He is also promoted faster, has more admirers and operates more economically. Be a professional-develop the proper attitude. As you can see from Webster's definition, a person's attitude "shows." Which way is yours showing?

Physiological Training Open For Civilians

Every Air Force altitude chamber in the country will be available to general aviation pilots tomorrow. In addition, these civilian pilots will receive four hours of classroom instruction on the problems of flight and the effect on the human body.

In coordination with Flying Magazine and the Aerospace Medical Association's General Aviation Safety Subcommittee. the Air Force and Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), have set tomorrow aside to familiarize civilian pilots with physiological effects of flight.

At Reese, more than 30 civilian pilots have signed up for the one day training. The altitude chamber will enable the pilots to experience and observe hypoxia (lack of sufficient oxygen) and rapid decompression.

In addition, the pilots will learn about spatial disorientation, decompression sickness and other human factors of flight which can cause medical problems if not handled properly.

Due to the response of pilots in the local area and throughout the country, the FAA has asked the Air Force to repeat the oneday training program on June 6. Captain William J. 





New Method Proposed To Select Golf Team

The new method comes on the heels of opposition to a regular base-wide tournament, usually played over a two-week period, that had the medalists (top five) representing the base in open play. The opposition was based on the fact that perhaps one or more of the base's best golfers could not-due to duty, leaves, etc.-play in the tournament, leaving them out in the cold.

The new system is still being worked out, but it will be based on a number of scores turned in for the specific purpose of establishing a spot on the ladder. After the required number of scores are turned in, the place on the ladder is established — and it may be challenged by other golf-

For instance, if a golfer establishes himself in the number six spot on the ladder, after say 20 scores are turned in, he may challenge for the next higher, or the number five spot, or the one above that, the number four spot, but no higher than two spots above his own ranking. He will then play a head-up match with the holder of that spot in an attempt to displace him. Should he win, he will hold that spot until displaced.

The holders of the rungs on the ladder will be used in composing golf teams at Reese. For instance, a five man team would take the first five on the ladder while the first eight would play in eight-man matches.



They also study weather conditions, instrument lighting, and location of tissue, equipment and aircraft parts, in an attempt to find the cause of the accident.

Following the investigation, the committee makes recommendations on safety measures which could be provided to help prevent further accidents of this type.

Air Training Command (ATC) requires the Life Support Working Group to meet at least once each quarter. At Reese this group felt a need to establish a subcommittee (Aeromedical Services) which meets twice per month. Lt. Col. Richard C. Fontaine, chief of the physiological training unit at Reese, feels that these semi-monthly meetings allow each member to identify his organization's problems as the need arises. The committee includes representatives from Wing Safety, Maintenance, Rescue, Aeromedical Services and both flying units.

Committee Has Many Functions The Aeromedical Services Committee encompasses all aspects of aircrew and passenger

training. They provide medical services and physiological training, insure standard procedures in the use of current and new aircraft life support equipment, and review and evaluate all technical requirements.

Delivering babies and passing out pills may seem to many the primary function of the hospital. But although dependent care is an important fringe benefit to the military family, it is not the main concern of the hospital.

The link which the Aeromedical Services Committee provides between the hospital and the flight line helps insure the safety of every pilot and student on base. They provide an integral and very important support program to the primary mission of Reesethe comprehensive, effective and safe training of pilots.
