Seed For Cotton Club Have Been Ordered

The Hermleigh Cotton Club has drawn drafts against the members of its Club for the balance due on their cotton seed orders. The Purchasing Committee advises that the carload of 1050 bushels of Pedigreed Kasch Cotton Seed was ordered on December 1st, and that it is very important that all of these drafts be paid and that all orders be paid in full by the time the car arrives so that no time will be lost in distributing the seed after arrival. Most of the orders have been paid in full and those that have not instructed their bank to pay their drafts should do so at once as the banks must have authority from the Club members before the drafts can be charged against their accounts. This car was shipped on December 5th and it is expected that it will arrive next week and before it can be opened or any of the seed distributed, the entire load must be paid for in full, and for this reason the Committee urges that all of the members give this their prompt attention.

County Offers Grader to Farmers For Terracing

It is hoped that as many as possible of the farmers of this community will take advantage of the generous offer of the County Commissioners Court and the County Agent to use the County Tractor and Grader for terracing their farms. It is necessary that those who are interested in this matter get together at once and block their acreage as it is required that there must be 640 acres of terracing in each block. Five or six farmers in one neighborhood can easily block that amount or more and secure this County Machinery and have their land terraced at a very low cost, and the benefits to be derived from this work will be of great value to the land and will mean more dollars revenue per acre next year. Lets get busy on this at once.

County Graders to Start Terracing Dec. 1st.

(continued from last week)

the work as they think it can best be handled, the work to be done will be outlined by an individual and will always be acceptable; but the technique and methods to be used in handling the machinery will be left to the men operating regularly in this work.

The terrace lines must be run in advance of the tractor. The county agent will be used for this free of charge and where a terrace is to be built a furrow will be plowed in order to make the work of the machinery faster, where ditches are to be made it will be necessary for fences and grubs to be cleared so that the machinery will not be delayed. Terrace lines can be run at any time now and marked, and people planning this work should make arrangements for this at once so that there will be no delays.

The tractor will operate for a charge of \$3.50 per hour running time. No man will be liable to breaks to machinery or other delays such as freezing, filling of the tractor, but will be charged for the time the tractor and grader are actually running. This will be for cash only as it will be impossible for any Commissioner to extend credit on this work. The money for this work will be paid to the Commissioners.

Several men in several communities have been requested to block the acreage to be terraced or rather list it and file it with the County Agent's office. The list of men wishing this work should be turned in at once, and anyone wishing the use of this machinery should inquire around and see how many folks want this, as it will be impossible to come to one man, and when the tractor starts and leaves a community there will be very little chance to get it back. There will be more work listed this year than can possibly be done and it is hoped that everything will be ready as soon as possible.

Some questions—Many people want terraces, but not the crooked rows; it has been found unpractical to run rows over terraces and anyone that don't intend running with the terraces should not terrace.

A fair tenant-landlord contract is for the land owner to pay for the construction of the terraces and the tenant the upkeep. A tenant wishing to have his place terraced should get in touch with his landlord at once and have all arrangements made.

This will be a big thing for the county.—C. C. Wills, County Agent, Snyder, Texas.

Co-operation Necessary to Town Building

The retail profit on all merchandise sold is approximately 20 per cent of the purchasing price. This 20 per cent amounts to a huge sum of money, and all of which becomes subject to taxation by the local town and county for the support of town and county enterprises. When our people do their trading in other towns and counties, yea, in other states, they are thus indirectly supporting the enterprises of other towns in other counties and states. This makes it mighty nice for the other fellow, but why thus rob our own children, and build up society for others? We understand well how it is thought that money is saved by trading out of town, but we happen to know better--you are losing from 20 to 50 per cent to your town and county and at the same time saving yourself nothing. If we are right, why all this loss to the local town and county? is it good business?

Our zeal concerning this thing almost burns us up. If we are in error, some one correct us; if we are right, fall in line with us and let us stand together and build our town and adequately support our schools. What is the wisdom of our "paving the streets in the other fellow's town?" We are serious about this; it is a serious thing when the actual consequences are seen. Give this your good business consideration.

The doctor who lives in our town is a tax payer and this tax money goes to support the enterprises of the town, and oftentimes when we take the colic we send out of town for a doctor and the deposit is made in the

other fellow's bank and we go walking down an unpaved street rejoicing that we have the privilege of having the doctor of our own choice and never think of the consequences. Is this good business? is it using liberty to a good advantage? will that kind of co-operation ever make a town? Donkey! donkey!! donkey!!!

Lesson for January 15

JESUS AND SINNERS

LESSON TEXT—Mark 2:1-17. GOLDEN TEXT—I came not to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance.

PRIMARY TOPIC—Jesus Forgives a Sinner.

JUNIOR TOPIC—Jesus Heals and Forgives.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Jesus Shows His Sympathy and Power.

YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Jesus' Power to Make Whole.

1. Jesus Preaching the Word (vv. 1, 2).

1. The surging crowd (v. 2).

So great was the crowd gathered about the house where Jesus was stopping, that there was no room to receive them. As soon as it was noised about that Jesus was in the house, the multitudes gathered.

2. What Jesus preached unto them (v. 2).

He preached unto them the Word of God. He always preached the Word before He wrought miracles, for to make known the will of God was His supreme mission. Miracles were not an end in themselves, but to authenticate His work. The people came, some to be healed, and some out of curiosity. He gave them that which they needed, regardless of the motive which actuated their coming.

11. Jesus Forgiving Sins (vv. 3-5).

The man brought to Him was suffering from the dread disease of palsy, but his most deadly affliction was that of sin. This miracle was wrought by Jesus in confirmation of His message.

1. Faith coming to Jesus (v. 3).

The actuating impulse of the palsied man and the four friends who carried him was faith.

2. Faith overcoming difficulties (v. 4).

Though prevented by the crowd from coming to Jesus, they ascended the outer stairway and let the afflicted man down through the roof.

3. Faith rewarded (v. 5).

No word was uttered either by the paralytic or his bearers. Their action was enough. The paralytic got more than he expected. He desired healing of the body and he got bodily healing plus forgiveness of sins.

111. Jesus Answering the Scribes (vv. 6-10).

1. Their objections (vv. 6, 7). They asked:

(1) Why does He thus speak? (2) Who can forgive sin?

They were entirely right in their reasonings that only God can forgive sins. Their blunder was in not perceiving Him to be God.

2. Jesus' answer (vv. 8-10).

He knew their inner thoughts and reasonings and manifested unto them His essential deity in that He had power to know their thoughts. He inquired, "Which is easier to say, thy sins be forgiven thee, or to say, arise and take up thy bed and walk? But that ye may know that the Son of man hath power on earth to forgive sins, He saith to the sick of the palsy, I say unto thee, Arise, and take up thy bed, and go thy way into thine house." He was willing that His power in the invisible realm should be tested by His power in the visible.

IV. Jesus Healing the Paralytic (vv. 11, 12).

1. His healing was by the direct method—speaking the Word (v. 11). Christ's words are enough. With the command was given the strength to obey. That which Christ commands He gives the strength to perform.

2. The obedience of the man (v. 12).

He immediately arose, took up his bed and went forth before them all. The poor helpless man walked away with his bed upon his shoulder.

3. The people were amazed, and glorified God (v. 12). They said, "We never saw it on this fashion."

V. Jesus Eating With Publicans and Sinners (vv. 13-17).

1. The call of Levi (v. 14). Levi was a tax-gatherer under the Roman government. As Jesus passed by, He commanded Levi to leave his business and follow Him.

2. Jesus dining in Levi's house (v. 15). It seems that Levi, when he found the Savior, invited many of his business associates to eat with him. This gave an opportunity to Jesus to come into touch with these sinners.

3. The perplexed scribes and pharisees (v. 16). They asked, "How is it that He eateth and drinketh with publicans and sinners?"

4. Jesus' reply (v. 17). "They that are whole have no need of the physician. I came not to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance."
