ALL CHRISTIAN WORLD TO HEAR SERMON SUNDAY

Watchtower radio announces another international network broadcast, August 5, 1928, Sunday morning, 9:30 to 11 Eastern Standard time, direct from the Coliseum, Michigan State Fair Grounds, Detroit. The address of Judge J. F. Rutherford, president of International Bible Students Association, before the principal session of the association's 1928 international convention, will be given unparalleled distribution.

A tremendous wire network, stretching to radio stations in two countries, has been specially arranged for this occasion. American Telephone & Telegraph Company, while admitting the strain of this undertaking, has given assurance that its vast resources of modern equipment and operating personnel will be equal to the task.

Scores of stations, located on the beaten path and in the remotest regions of the country, will participate in this record-breaking event. Linked also in this unique radio chain are a number of Canadian stations.

Short-wave transmitter 2xAD (General Electric Co. Schenectady) will simultaneously broadcast this program on 21.96 meters for transoceanic listeners. Also station 2xAL [New York] on 30.9 meters.

Judge Rutherford's address, "Ruler for the People," as well as a select musical program preceding and following, will be heard through more than a hundred stations, including WBAP Ft. Worth and WRK Dallas.

IMPORTANT MEETING FOR COTTON GROWERS AUGUST THE 10TH.

A general farmers county-wide meeting has been called for August 10th at 2:30 p. m. in the Court House in Snyder, according to an announcement by W. W. Porter field service representative of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association.

"The purpose of this meeting," Mr. Porter said, "is to hear details of the new marketing contract of the cotton cooperative marketing association, which provides for optional or daily pools and withdrawal privileges, as well as a number of minor changes in the present standard marketing agreement, which it is believed will be attractive to members, non-members and business interests generally, resulting in a substantial membership increase and deliveries to cotton cooperative marketing channels.

"The Board of Directors of the Association have had this subject under consideration for some time," Mr. Porter said, "but final approval to the new contract was not possible until several weeks ago when the entire program was worked out from legal angles. At our meeting next Friday, we will have Mr. Caruthers of Sylvester, district director of the cotton association present to explain in detail the various features of the new contract, price fixation pooling plan, how the contract, may become operative, etc." It is felt that the meeting will be one of the most interesting farmers meetings ever held in the county, and form leaders contemplate an exceptionally large attendance, not only on the part of members but non-members and business interests closely allied with progressive agriculture.

ABOUT THE ELECTION

We shall make no reference to state officials, but the county and district run-offs will be as follows: District Judge, Smith and Mauzey, with Smith leading by nearly seven hundred votes. Mr. Bennett of Inadale defeated Mr. Jean of Pyron for weigher in their precinct.

PROMINENT CHURCH MAN SCORES POLITICAL

TALKS IN PULPIT

Tyler, Texas, July 24.—C. W. Boon, Tyler business man, a leader in Marvin Methodist Church of Tyler for thirty-five years, superintendent of the Sunday school and a member of the board of deacons for many years has addressed a communication to Bishop John M Moore of Dallas, wherein he criticizes the Dallas Bishop for his advising Methodist ministers to carry politics into their pulpits. Mr. Boon has given a copy of the letter to the press, which follows:

"I have been affiliated with the Methodist Church for forty-nine years and my love and ardent support for this Christian organization entitles me, I believe, to express myself when matters come up in connection with the church which I think will be harmful and hurtful.

"I have always had a very high regard for your opinion and was much surprised when I read in the press that you were advising the ministers of the Methodist Church to bring politics into their pulpits.

"There is no question in my mind and in the minds of thousands of other Methodists in Texas as to the soundness of the action taken by bishop Chandler, that is that no minister of the gospel has a right to carry politics into the pulpit, but that he should fulfill the commission given him by his church to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ and him crucified. I feel sure if the ministers who are filling the pulpits of the Methodist Church take your advice and preach politics in their pulpits that they will no doubt be of great help to the Republican party, but while doing this, they will materially and effectually injure the Methodist Church, not only for the present, but for many years to come.

"I have given freely of both my time and means for many years to the support of the Methodist Church, the Methodist schools, the Methodist hospitals and the Methodist orphanages; and I hate to see a Christian organization, which I love and of which I am a part, dragged into into the political mire of present day politics. I am sure that such a course, if followed, will be

more detrimental to the Church than anything has ever been. I do not question any individual's right to vote as he pleases, but I do not believe that any man has the right to use his position in the Methodist Church to foster the political ambition of any man, to the detriment of the organization of which he is the head.

"I am hoping that after giving a little more thought and consideration to your previous utterances in the press, that you will realize that the position you have taken is not wise, and so far as possible, you will correct it before it is everlastingly too late."

We pass this on with the view that it might be of some help to our own people. Again, as before, we conclude that these are big problems, and each one of us, preachers and all, should be allowed much latitude.

The Rev. Hudson and we differ very much concerning this thing and we are hoping it comes to pass that the Right Rev. is right in his conclusions—but we are fearful.

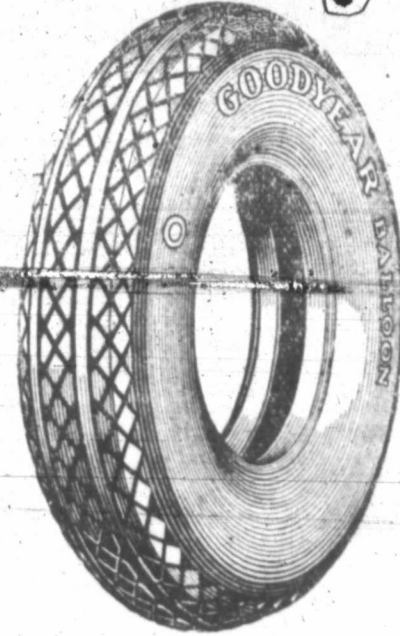
NO COMMENT COMING

WEST TEXAS TO

IMPROVE POULTRY AND

DAIRY BUSINESS

FORT WORTH, Texas, July 27

West Texas is going to study first-hand the darning, poultry and irrigation methods which have been so signally successful in California, if the plans of B. M. Whiteker, manager of the agricultural department of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce materialize.

He plans to organize parties which will eventually include at least one representative from each of the 100 West Texas counties, to make the trip to the West Coast in motor buses.

The first party will consist of twenty-five West Texans and will start within a week after this number have signed up for the excursion. Cost of the trip will be nominal. The tour will last from two to three weeks at the most, Whiteker said.

After spending several weeks in California last summer, Mr. Whiteker believes that West Texas has much to learn from the far Western States in agricultural production and marketing methods.

Pleasure will be combined with business. Besides visiting the interesting production centers Petaluma, Los Angeles and San Francisco, a number of pleasure jaunts to other places are planned.

CANT MAKE IT THAT WAY

Washington, July 24.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's earnings for the last six months of 1927 exceeded \$204,000, according to a report on his income tax payment. His Federal tax payment this year will be more than \$30,000.

The Orteig prize for the first New York-Paris flight was \$25,000. He received \$300 per day on his air tour of the United States, but his expenses only on his good-will tour of the Latin America. Royalties on his book "We" and payment for his syndicate articles on his flight made up most of the balance. He is said to have refused an offer of \$1,000,000 to enter the movies and a lesser offer to appear on the vaudeville stage.

landed in Paris his entire saving were invested in the plane which carried him.

UNITED STATES CHINA NEW-TARIFF PACT

Washington, July 27.—A new tariff treaty with China making effective "Complete national tariff autonomy" on Jan. 1, 1929, if ratified by that time, was signed at Peking July 25.

Peking, China, July 27.—Announcement that the United States and China have signed a new treaty created a great stir in Peking, not only in Chinese circles but in foreign circles as well.

Chinese observers take the news as indicating that the United States will deal independently with China, thus breaking or at least weakening the old accord among the powers which has been regarded by the Chinese as the principal stumbling block to Nationalist China's aspirations for "equal treaties."

The Japanese Legation spokesman said that the announcement of the signing had come with startling suddenness, the Japanese considering that the instrument gives more recognition to the Nanking administration, thus considerably affecting the status of other nations which have vital interest in China as compared with American academic interest.
