Growing Demand for Black Walnut Logs

With the growing popularity of black wainut furniture and the in creasing use of ply wood or veneer by the manufacturers, the United States forest service points to the great demand for high grade walnut logs suitable for this use, says the Pathfiniter Magazine Logs suitable for cutting into veneer must be 18 to 24 inches in diameter at the small end and practically clear of defects in order to bring a price of from \$150 to \$200 a thousand board feet at the mill. Larger logs of good quality naturally bring higher prices, but smaller logs do not bring more than about \$100 a thousand board feet at the null.

Logs at the mills bring higher prices than logs in the woods or delivered at a shipping point, as freight is a very large item of cost The value of standing timber depends greatly on the distance from the mill to where it is to be converted into timber or veneer. The price for standing walnut trees is about \$50 a thousand board feet less on the average than at the mill.

Turning Cutover Lands Into Redwood Fo. ests

Redwood trees, imported from California and planted in the Grave Harbor district of western Wash ington 14 years ago by one of the large logging concerns of the Pa. cific Northwest, have proved a pro nounced success, according to com pany officials. As a result, plans are under way to transform large areas of cutover lands in the Grays Harbor region into redwood forests In the 14 years a redwood tree has attained a diameter of 18 inches. showing more rapid growth than that of any other variety of tree planted at the same time The tree also shows every indication of being high-grade lumber stock. Other va rieties planted included spruce, fir. pine and red and white oak Encouraged by these results, the company is undertaking the growing of the redwood trees from seed, and in addition has planted more than 1,-000 acres with spruce. fir and pine seed. Success in these seeding operations will lead to reforestation on a large scale, lumber officials say.

Claude G. Bowers of New York, the temporary chairman at the Houston convention delivered the notification address as chairman of the notifica tion committee. The ceremonies took place at the Arlington Hotel before one of the largest gatherings in the history of Arkansas

The nominee made a plea for a frank discussion of all the issues of the campaign without bitterness Public attention has been concentra ted on political affairs to a degree of intensity never before known, he vaid. In this campaign, he said, vot-E-s are interested net only in the issues, but in the personal character istics, of the candidates.

"The preliminary events of the con test indicate that in order to avoid bitterness, the leaders on both sides must display a sense of justice and fairness by refusing to become the beneficiaries of political influences and processes which they themselves are unwilling to employ." he continu ed. "In this way, and in no other. may the poisons of slander and libe! be counteracted and overcome."

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Arouse Prejudices

The quadrennial contest presents an inspiring spectacle when conducted with high standards of ethics, Senator Robinson said. But, he con tinued

"Numerous political serpents are hissing in the dark and striking from cover, and with venemous malice seek to poison the thoughts and arouse the prejudice of those who will decide issues of far-reaching importance."



Senator Robinson characterized the attitude of the two parties with respect to the agricultural problem, the outstanding issue of the campaign. Both platforms recognize the distressed condition and hold out promises the relative value of which is apparent, he said.

The Capper-Williams bill followed the general lines of this recommendation__It was supported by Mr. Hoov er. Senator Robinson said, but was opposed by the farm organizations and defeated






