#### Odd Effect of Unig

Tested by Scientist

A drug that makes of individual see velice is the surfact of experiments by a Souther scientist, Wilfred Marshall, of the University of Aberdeen The drug is known as santonin and is prepared from the dried flower heads of the European wormwood In his experiments reported in the Journal of Pharmacol ogy and Experimental Therapeutics. Mr. Marshall administered doses of santonin to an elderly man experienced in discriminating colors Doses of a half gram or more caused objects to appear vellow to him within half an hour after the dose was taken. The velfow vision was most noticeable on coming from a darkened room into daylight and was best seen through the win dows viewed from a dundy lighted tensity quickly diminished to a greenish vellow veil. Artificial lights viewed in the evening seem a deep yellow in hime A chrome vellow color examined by the subject under the influence of the drug appeared to be a deep orange, a light lemon color in shadow had the appearance of a dirty white-suffused with a tint of violet. It has not vet been determined just how the drug accomplishes its peculiar effect

#### Lightning Second to Machine Made Power

All the crashes of lightning in the world produce, at any given time, power equal to less than onetwentieth of the amount being generated by the light and power companies in the United States, according to computations based on estimates of F W. Peck, Jr., consulting engineer for the General Electric company

There is an average of 1,800 thunderstorms in progress in the world at any one instant, according to Mr Peck. These give 300,-000 flashes per hour, each of about four-kilowatt hours' power expacity and make a total power rapacity of 1,500,000 horsepower operating continuously.

This is compared with the 32,-500,000 horsepower capacity of generating stations in the United

#### Makes Snow Removal Easy

A home-made, motor driven snow sweeper for sidewalks has been invented by A E Beauchamp of Hartford, Conn. The frame of the machine consists of a baby carriage, which forms the chassis.
