The "Gulf Cloud" hovers over the two sisters of the "Gulf," the Plains and the Mountains which are represented by two figures, one of which is smaller of stature and which wears flowers tucked in her hair and at whose feet are cotton bales, representing the great industry of the plains. The other is taller and larger, truly representing the mountains.

The "Gulf Cloud" is taking leave of her mother to fly across the plains and mountains of Texas and leave moisture in the form of rain for the proper development of the plant and animal life over the state. The rain is represented by the spray of water rising from the fountain and falling over and dripping from the wings of the "Gulf Cloud."
