C. OF C. TO HAVE MEETING TUESDAY

President Coker is persistently insistent that there be a good representation of both business men and farmers at the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday night. The county demonstration agent will be here, and his aid and suggestions will be of value to all present.

The fact that most of our land is fairly level and doesn't wash is no argument that it doesn't need terracing. The terrace serves at the least two great purposes. 1st. It saves the land from washing. 2nd. It preserves moisture. There is enough rainfall, ordinarily, to furnish sufficient season for a crop, but too often it is lost by the water running off too swiftly. The properly terraced field holds what rain fall it receives and preserves it. The chief need of this country is moisture. The terracing system is the best solution to this problem. We cannot govern the falling of the rain, but we can preserve the rain fall.

Tuesday night will be a great meeting for the people of Hermleigh and let us all be here. Thought power moves the world.

PRESIDENT'S THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION

"A Proclamation:
"The season again approaches when it has been the custom for generations to set apart a day of thanksgiving for the blessings which the Giver of all good and perfect gifts has bestowed upon us during the year. It is most becoming that we should do this, for the goodness and mercy of God which has followed us through the year deserve our grateful recognition and acknowledgments.

"Through His divine favor peace and tranquility have reigned throughout the land. He has protected our country as a whole against pestilence and disaster and has directed us in the way of national prosperity. Our fields have been abundantly productive our industries have flourished; our commerce has increased; wages have been lucrative, and contentment has followed the undisturbed pursuit of honest toil.

"As we have prospered in material things, so have we also grown and expanded in things spiritual. Through divine inspiration we have enlarged our charities and our missions; we have been imbued with high ideals which have operated for the benefit of the world and the promotion of brotherhood of man through peace and good will.

"Wherefore, I, Calvin Coolidge President of the United States, do hereby set apart Thursday, the 29th day of November, as a day of general thanksgiving and prayer, and I recommend that day the people shall cease from their daily work, and in their homes and in their accustomed places of worship devoutly give thanks to the Almighty for the many and great blessings they have received, and seek His guidance, that they may deserve a continuance of His favor.

"In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused to be affixed the great seal of the United States.

"Done at the city of Washington, this 23rd day of October, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight, and of the independence of the United States, the one hundred and fifty-third.
