3 Inch General Rain Fell Here Monday

WHEAT SHOULD BE SO 'N FOR WINTER PASTURE

A three inch rain falling over a period of hours soaked all the country around here Monday night and Tuesday.

Though a little late in the season for cotton, it will almost assure a plenty of feed and revive pasture lands. There is quite a bit of cotton which will be greatly benefited even at this late season.

It is being suggested that every one who can conveniently sow wheat for winter pasture and for an early money crop next year if the spring season is favorable. Wheat sowed now will make good winter pasture, if season is good in the spring, it will make a money crop. This is safe risk. This country makes wheat when the season is right. The season here has been bad for wheat for a number of years, and most farmers are afraid of it, but this might be the lucky year, who knows?

It is no bad idea to take advantage of this season and sow some wheat.

Lesson for September 15

TEACHING THE LAW OF GOD

GOLDEN TEXT—The entrance of thy words giveth light.

LESSON TEXT—Nehemiah 8:1-18.
PRIMARY TOPIC—Studying God's Word.

JUNIOR TOPIC—Studying God's Word.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Finding Joy in God's Word.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Call for Trained Teachers.

This lesson is a fine illustration of the rightful place of God's Word in the life of a nation. The only certain cure for national ills is a return to God and obedience to His Word.

I. The Word of God Being Read (vv. 1-3).

1. The eager assembly (v. 1).
The people gathered themselves together and requested Ezra to bring the book of the law.

2. A representative assembly (v. 2).
It was made up of men, women and children. The men did not leave the spiritual affairs to the women, neither were the children left at home. The Spirit of God can speak through God's Word to the whole family sitting in the pew.

The lesson lasted for five or six hours, from morning until midday.
II. The People's Attitude Toward God's Word (vv. 4-6).

1. Due reverence shown (vv. 4, 5).
When Ezra opened the law, all the people stood up out of respect for God's Word.

2. They joined heartily in the prayer (v. 6).
As Ezra led them in prayer, they joined heartily in saying, "Amen, Amen," bowing their faces to the ground.

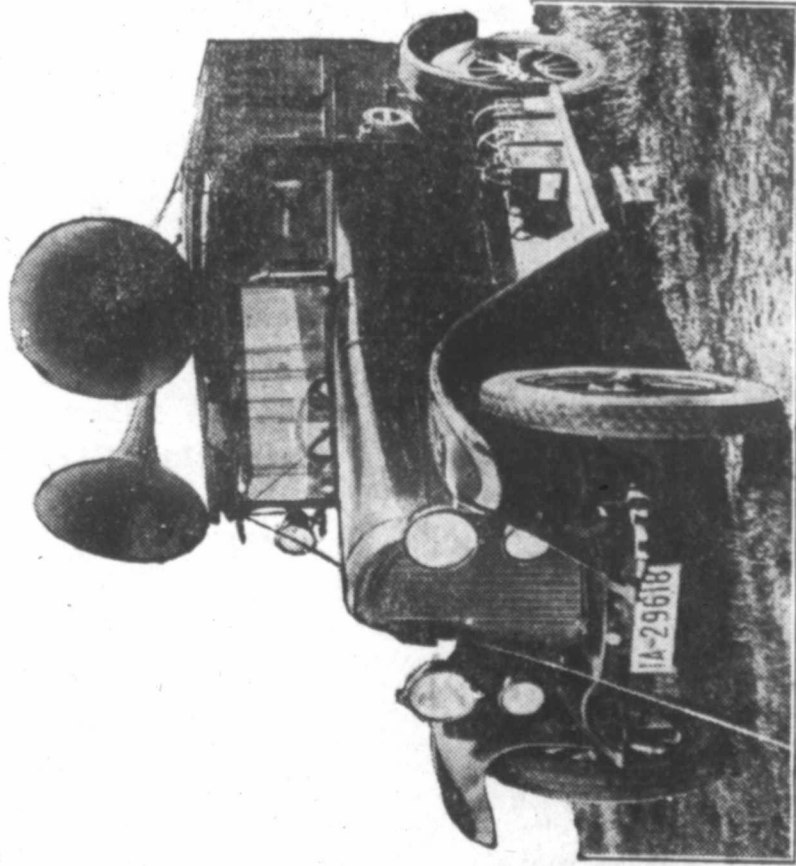
III. God's Word Being Interpreted (vv. 7, 8).

The attitude of the people toward God's Word largely depends upon the minister. Proper dignity and solemnity should be manifested by the minister when reading the Holy Scriptures.

1. He stood up where the people could see him (v. 5).
2. He read distinctly (v. 8).

OPERATION COST FOR AUTOMOBILE

Average of \$293 Was Spent
by Each Automobile
Owner in 1928.

An average of \$293 was spent by each autolst in the United States during 1928 in the operation and maintenance of his car, according to figures compiled by the American Motorists' association, in co-operation with the Automobile Club of Illinois. Of this sum, \$101, or 34 per cent, was expended for fuel and lubricants, this being the largest item in the autolst's annual operation and maintenance bill.
Cost \$1.14 Per Day.

The \$293 figure does not take into account depreciation. The average life of a passenger automobile, according to computation of the federal government, is approximately seven years. During 1928 the average retail price of passenger cars in the United States was \$875, which based on a seven-year life expectancy, would mean an

NEARBY AND YONDER

The Welland Ship Canal

A WELLAND canal has afforded a passageway between Lakes Erie and Ontario for well nigh a hundred years.

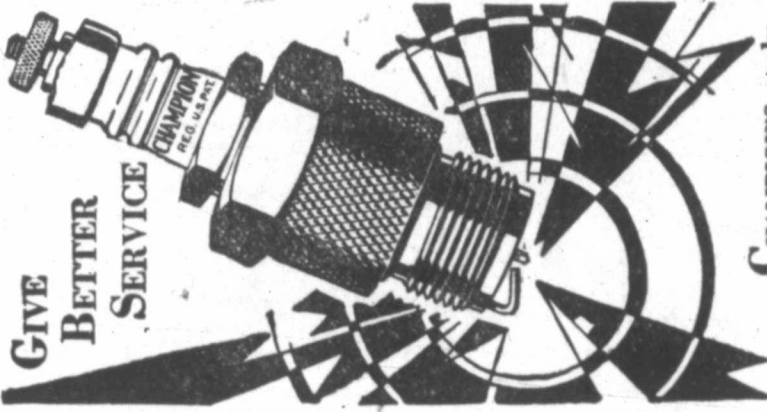
The original Welland was first sailed in 1823. It was 27½ miles long, 22 feet wide, 8 feet deep and contained 40 locks, each 110 feet long. It was enlarged, rebuilt and again placed in service in 1845. The present canal, which represents another step-up in size, was opened in 1882. The one now building probably will be ready for service some time during 1930. It has been built to dimensions which it is thought will be sufficiently large to meet the increased size of cargo vessels plying the Great Lakes for many years to come. It will be 25 miles long, 80 feet wide, 25 feet deep and have 7 locks each 800 feet long and 30 feet deep with a lift of 40½ feet which will lift or lower passing vessels the 325½ feet which represents the difference in level between the two lakes. Some 4,000 vessels pass through the present canal annually.

Some conception of the magnitude of the work of constructing the new ship canal can be gained from the fact that some 6,000,000 wagon loads of rock and 40,000,000 wagon loads of earth had to be excavated, while enough concrete was used to build a solid wall 20 feet high, 6 feet thick and 100 miles long.

The time required to pass a loaded vessel through the completed canal will approximate 8 hours, as against 15 to 18 hours with the present canal. The cost of the completed job will approach \$100,000,000.

The Los Angeles Aqueduct

THE Los Angeles aqueduct is "as long as England is wide. It goes under mountains, through 142 tunnels and crosses a desert as large as the state of Massachusetts." It was built to insure the largest city on our western coast with a sufficient and everlasting supply of pure water, cost \$24,500,000, took five years to build—as many as five thousand men worked on it at a time, is hailed as a spectacular feat of engineering and measures up to the job.

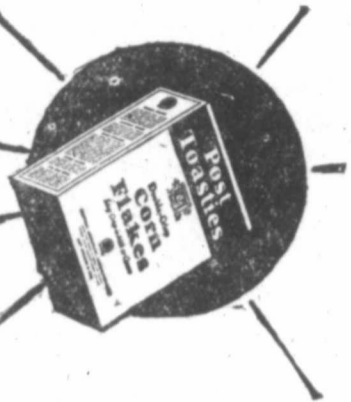

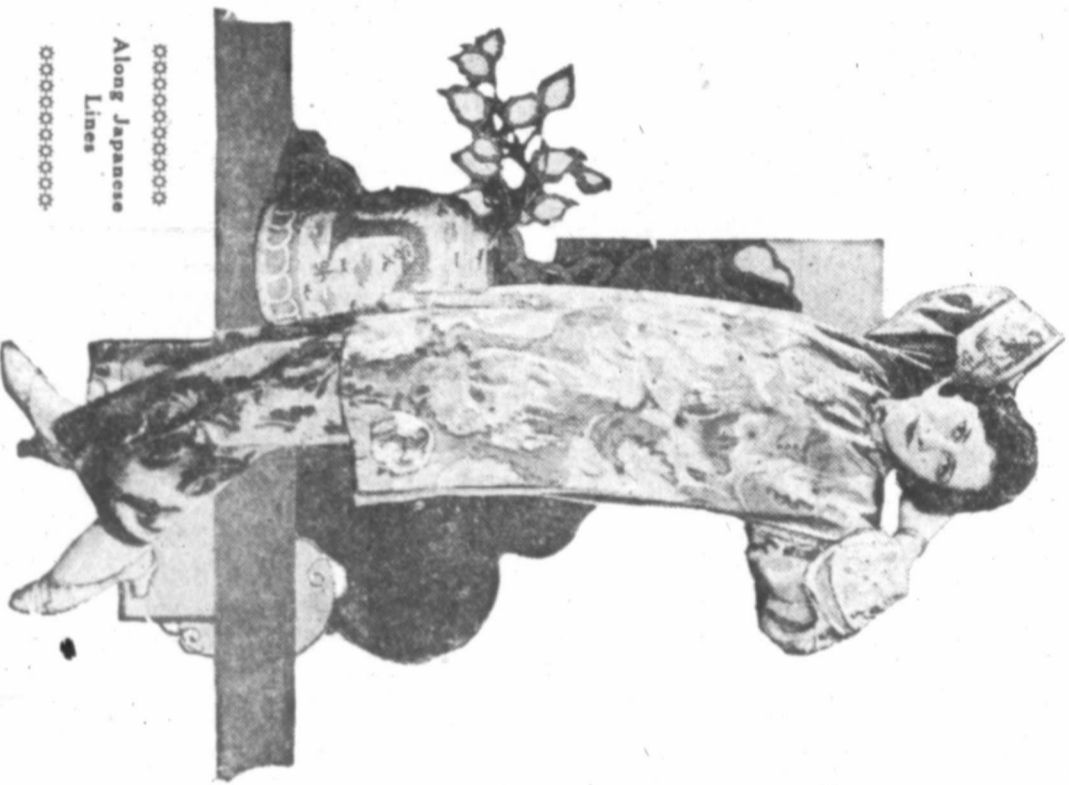

OUR TRIP TO
THE CARLSBAD CAVERN

If we may be allowed space in the Herald, we will tell of our trip to Portales, and Carlsbad New Mexico. Thence to the cave.

To speak of the crops, there was not much to encourage us till we passed Lubbock, there the scene changed for the better till we passed west and south of Portales. We spent three days at this place where Mrs. Lynde has a sister. While there we enjoyed several good meals of fresh vegetable, such as roasting ears, beans, cabbage, tomatoes, etc., on Mr. Green's farm one mile west of Portales. Mr. and Mrs. Green have made a steady go of their home and farm since going there four years ago. Green and the three boys have improved 80 acres of fine land, building a 6 room stucco house with sleeping porch and all necessary outside buildings.

This family like many others in that community have their irrigation shallow water to irrigate their entire acreage. Their principle crop is sweet potatoes. He has 65 acres and thinks he will get better than an average yield this year.

After our stay of three days there we and a portion of the Green family journeyed toward Roswell and Carlsbad, where we stayed until morning, at which time we motored to the cavern, a distance of 20 miles, reaching there in time to enter the wonderful cavern.

No, we have no words to describe this cavern! We entered the cave at 10:30 a. m. The officier advised that no souvenir be taken out of the cave, a heavy penalty being imposed for same.

The formations in this cave have been in process of formation for years innumerable and are still forming. We were told that 100 years of time were required for the shaping of one cubic inch of this formation.

This cave was discovered 23 years ago by a cowboy who was attracted to it by a cloud of bats which played in and out about sundown. It was declared a national monument and opened to the public under governmental supervision in 1923. The bat den is to the left as one enters, ex-

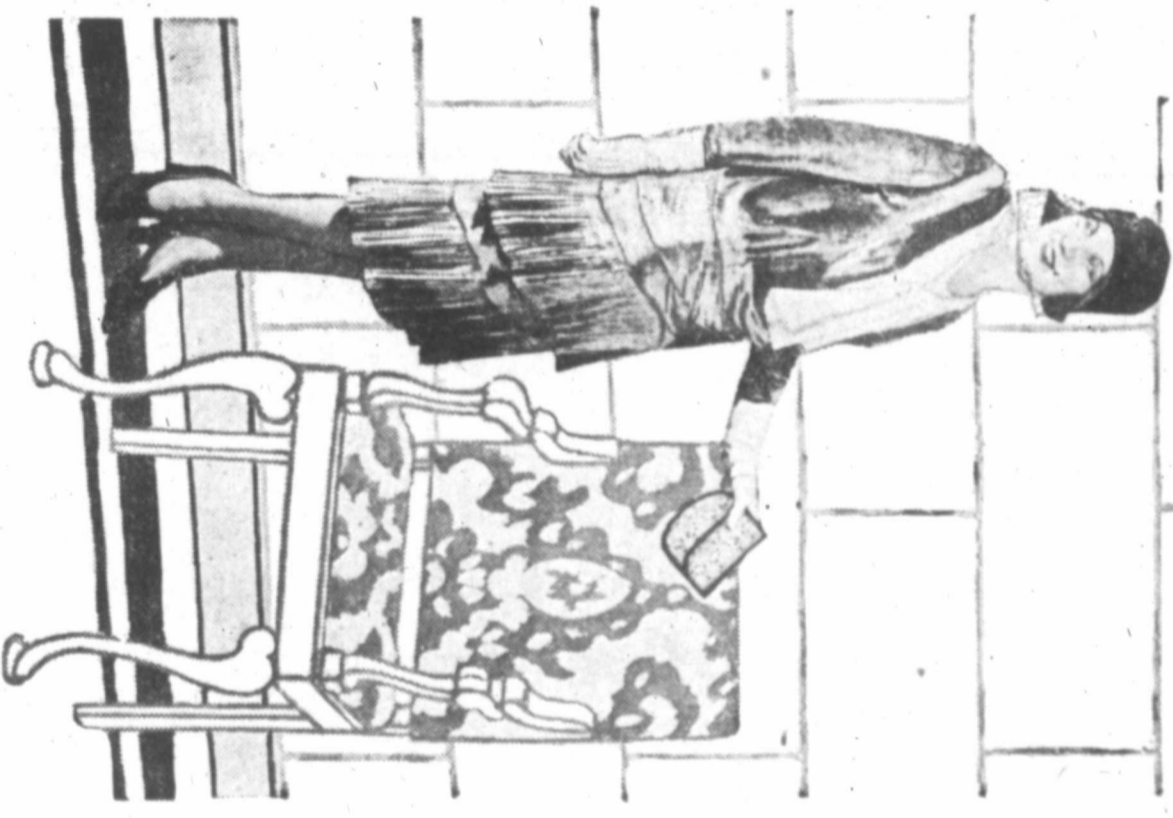

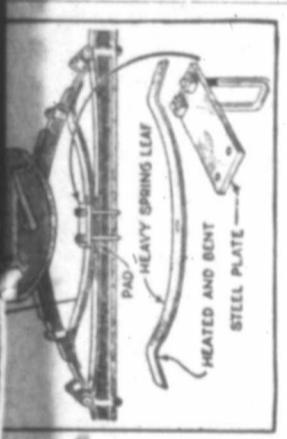

The constant movement of such a great quantity of water presented a too good-to-be-true opportunity for the development of large quantities of cheap electric power, through the construction of a string of generating plants located at strategic points. The combined water and power system is one of the largest municipally owned plants of the kind in the world.

The King of Convention Halls
The United States having developed into a nation of gatherings and might be said to be suffering from conventionalitis, a convention hall for the proper housing of possible multitudinous which may descend upon it to discuss or display this, that or the other, became almost a necessity for any self-respecting large city. Conventions have gone up "nearby and ponder" and boasts of having the largest or the finest were heard. Finally, Atlantic City "took the bull by the horns," so to speak, and settled the question, for a time at least, by building the most mastodontic hall on earth.

This giant structure covers seven acres, seats 41,000 persons in the main auditorium alone—there are a host of smaller meeting rooms with capacities ranging from 150 persons up, cost the tidy sum of \$15,000,000 and is located directly across the street from the Atlantic ocean. It holds what is claimed to be the largest stage in the world, one of the largest pipe organs ever built, a skating rink, swimming pool, ballroom capable of accommodating 5,000 persons and what not.

A 13-story building, 500 feet long and 200 feet wide could be housed in the main auditorium; railroad trains can be operated to the entrance; automobiles can be driven right into it; every seven minutes, washed and cooled in summer and heated in winter; 200,000 tons of sand were moved to make way for it and 12,000 tons of steel, 42,000 cubic yards of concrete, 65,000 barrels of cement, 25,000 tons of sand, 53,000 tons of stone and 10,000,000 brick went into its construction.

The second largest item on the autotolist's maintenance bill is for labor incident to repair work, the autotolist expending in 1928, for this item, an average of \$82. His replacement parts cost him \$55, while his average tire bill, during the year, was \$34. An average of \$21 was expended for accessories, which with the \$101 spent for gasoline and oil, make up the total of \$293 as the average cost of maintenance for each motor vehicle for 1928.

Comparing Cost.
Comparing the cost of operation in 1928 and 1927 the association's figures show that last year the cost was 28 per cent more than during 1927, when the average operation cost was \$220. Comparative figures, between the two years, however, it is pointed out by St. Mayer, president of the Automobile Club of Illinois and vice president of the A. M. A., do not indicate that operation costs are necessarily increasing, the difference being explained primarily by the fact that with better highways available each year the average autotolist uses his automobile proportionately more.

Change in Automobile Front Is Now Advised
Because of the high mortality of pedestrians being hit by automobiles, Dr. Timothy Leary, medical examiner of Suffolk county, Massachusetts, suggests that the front of the present motor car be changed so that it would not mean death to every human being who came into its path. He says the victims of skull fractures who do not die frequently show mental deterioration, sometimes with a complete change in character, and may be converted from intelligent, capable characters into inefficient semi-invalids. Crippling injuries other than those due to skull fractures add to the indictment.

Cooling Fluid Favored for New Motor Vehicle
There is a chance that when the automotive engineer starts thinking seriously of reducing wind resistance in the design of the car, one of his first thoughts will concern the new cooling fluid developed for airplane engines of the water-cooled type.
A tremendous reduction in the size of radiators for this type of plane engine has proved entirely feasible. That such an eventually might come in motorom is by no means out of the question.
It will mean leaving the anti-freeze in the radiator the year around. Some motorists do it now, through indifference, not wisdom!
