OUR TRIP TO
THE CARLSBAD CAVERN

(continued from last week)

The bat den is to the left as one enters the cave and extends back about 1600 feet.

The largest rock in the cave is 300 feet high. A hole 300 feet deep is just below it and a cavity of 200 feet extends above it.

The elevations are determined by a aneroid carmeter. The lowest place is in the Kings Palace, 750 below the entrance. The deposits hanging from the top are "stale cities" and those extending from the bottom are stalmites which form a column when they meet. The largest of these are about 60 feet high. The entire cave is a fine formation of calcium carbonite which is soluble in water.

To speak best we can, it seems that nature in those formations has chosen the most lavish array that can be conceived—the beautiful colors for the approval of all eyes which behold these formations. Recognizing ensembles of these, it seems, is the keynote of all who have gone through this cave.

If any accessories could be given those formations, so to speak, that final note that accounts for its chic would be out of harmony, etc.

MUST LEARN THE NATURE
OF OUR FARM LANDS

Mr. Neal Farr has observed that the lower places on the farm lands here, where it has been standing under water during rainy weather in the years past, has adopted itself to the use of more water than the higher places. These lower places, then, will require more water than the higher places.

On this bases our terracing system may prove slightly unsatisfactory on dry years. The higher places will be lightly benefited by the terrace, while the lower places which produces best on dry years will be shorter. This is no occasion of alarm for the land will re-adjust itself and the terrace will serve its good purpose.

In our feeble opinion, no good argument can be made against practice of terracing.
