## Military Directed To Double Ideas

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The Air Force seeks to more than double the rate of participation in the military suggestion program.

As the first step, it has set a goal for Fiscal Year 1966 that is twice its 1965 objective of 15 per cent. Ultimately, officials hope to obtain at least the same rate of participation from military personnel as it gets from its civilian employees.

During the past year, the Air Force civilian suggestion rate was 38 per cent, the highest in the Government.

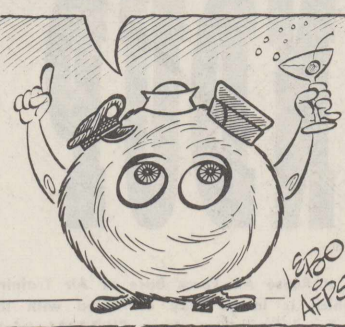
The Air Force can now use appropriated funds to pay cash

awards for beneficial suggestions, inventions or scientific achievements by military people up to the same amount paid civilians. This authority, provided by the 89th Congress in September, puts the Air Force on the spot to produce results in terms of measurable economy in operations, an all major air command letter on Nov. 1 pointed out.

The letter said the 1965 participation rate goal of 15 per cent for military personnel is being upped to 30 per cent in 1966 as a result of the legislation. The 1965 military participation rate was a record 18.13 per cent, but still far below the civilian rate.

## Procurement Officers Key In CRP

The Air Force Cost Reduction Program has three broad objectives; to buy only what is needed, to buy at the lowest sound price, and to reduce operating costs. Procurement plays a role in all three of the areas but it is more specifically concerned with the second area, that of buying at the lowest sound price.

The best method of determining the soundness of price, considering all factors of the purchase, is to permit the free interaction of the competitive forces of the market. This is best accomplished by advertising Air Force requirements or, as a second choice, using competitive negotiation with two or more potential contractors. In some cases specifications are so stringent that competition is restricted to only one source.

The decision to make the procurement through competitive means or on a sole source basis remains with the Procurement Officer. It is his responsibility to investigate the nature of the requirement, its background, reasons for purchase, etc., to determine the method of procurement.

The Procurement Officer carrying out his various duties under these demanding conditions experiences a career that is at once a challenge designed to test the best he can produce and growth that is commensurate with the finest executive development programs in industry. (ATCPC)

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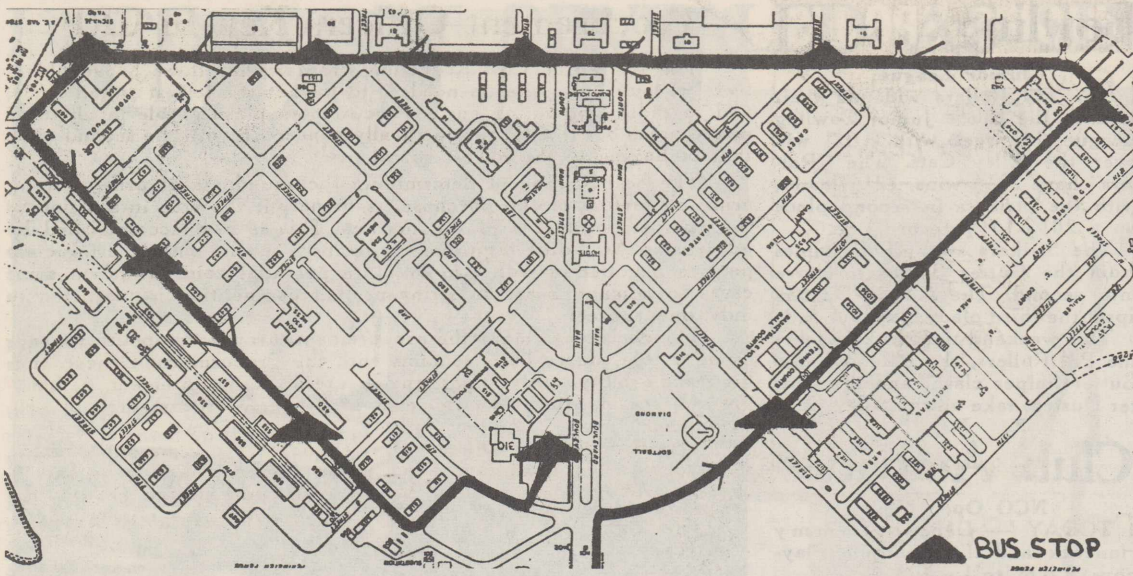

### Promotees Serve Long In Air Force

(ATCPS) — Eighty-one technical sergeants in Air Training Command, named for promotion to master sergeant in the December promotion cycle, had 10 years in grade and 17 years military service; 207 staff sergeants on the promotion list had 10 years in grade and 14 years in the service. Promotion statistics reveal that the preceding combinations of time-in-service/time-in-grade represented the peaks for promotion in the current cycle. Nineteen of the command's new

master sergeants were promoted as exceptionally well qualified (EWQ) and 45 staffs were elevated to technical sergeant via the EWQ route.

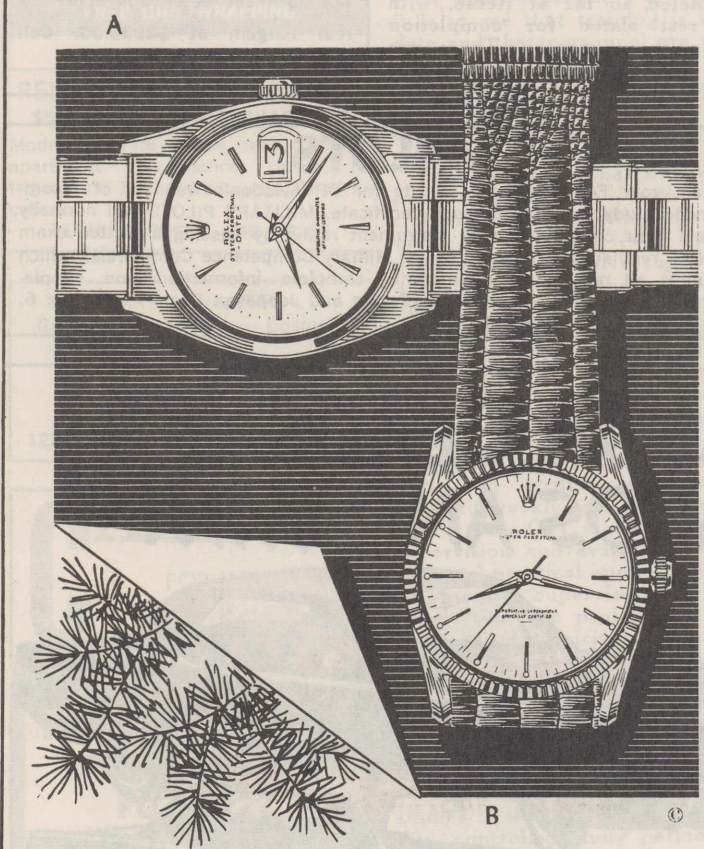


By Base Housing Committee (This newsletter has been developed for one primary purpose: To provide hints and news to help you, the Base Village resident. **VILLAGE HINTS** will be published periodically to keep you better informed of items of interest to you.)

**CLEARING FAMILY QUARTERS** Preferably upon receipt of orders, but not later than 10 days prior to your final clearance date, go to Base Housing Office, Bldg. 1167, during normal duty hours and arrange for your final inspections. This is necessary so orders and inspections can be arranged for termination of your quarters. You may enlist the service of others to clean your quarters, but all transactions will be between you and the cleaning personnel and the occupant is responsible for the quarters passing the final inspection.

There will be two inspections performed by Civil Engineering prior to termination of quarters. A preliminary inspection will be performed 7 to 10 days before the final inspection. The preliminary inspection will be scheduled by the occupant (call Ext 400). During the preliminary inspection you will be advised on areas to be cleaned (walls, floors, appliances, etc.) and procedures to be followed. The final inspection will be performed by representatives of Civil Engineering and Housing Supply. Quarters should be adequately cleaned and ready for inspection by the pre-established time and date.

All personal property must be out of the quarters prior to check-out. After the quarters have been inspected and approved by the inspectors, your keys will be picked up and clearance will be signed. Quarters will be vacated at this time. The occupant will hand-carry his clearance to Base Housing and turn it in and pick up his termination orders. The occupant must have these orders before he can draw his basic allowance for quarters at his next station.



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### Program Presents Star Phenomenon

**NCO Wives To Hear New Officer Slate**

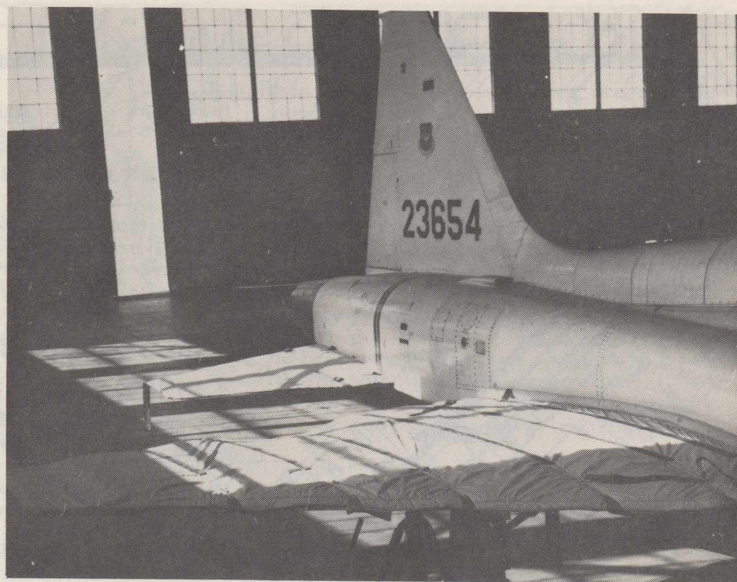

**Reese T-38's Get Winter 'Sweaters'**

What are well-dressed T-38's wearing at Reese this season? "Sweaters!"

Better known as hail protection covers, these "garments" are the result of a recent Air Training Command directive to all bases equipped with the aircraft. Each of these bases is required to manufacture 50 covers.

These covers will protect the honeycomb structure in the aircraft's wings from possible damage during a hailstorm, reports TSgt. James E. Barber, NCOIC at the parachute shop, whose unit is responsible for the manufacture of these covers at Reese.

Eight sets of covers have been completed so far at Reese, with the rest slated for completion within three months. There are four pieces in each set, one for each wing and the elevators.

The covers are pad-like protectors, and are made of a cushioning material covered with Herculite Marine Fabric. They will be installed whenever a hail warning is given by the Base weather detachment.

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# HARD WORK REVEALED AS SECRET OF OJT SUCCESS

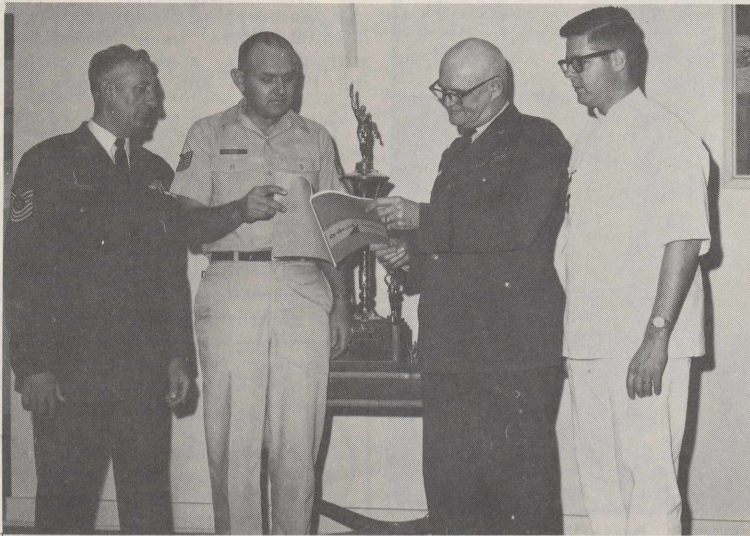

Want to have the best on-the-job training program at Reese this quarter? Take a tip from MSgt. James D. Bibbs, OJT monitor and coordinator for the 3500th Base Hospital, whose program captured the base OJT award for July-September with a prize-winning score of 96.

"Get the cooperation of your people and you can't go wrong," says Sergeant Bibbs.

The award, which is presented quarterly by the wing commander, is based on the number of personnel in each level of training. There are three levels, numbered 3, 5 and 7. The number of personnel tested and qualified determines the percentage of points awarded for any given test cycle. Other factors considered are non-progression, non-participation and results of the Skill Knowledge Test (SKT) administered by the base OJT section.

Sergeant Bibbs says assignees to the Hospital's program fall into two categories — direct duty assignees who are sent here im-

mediately upon completion of basic training at Lackland AFB, and a small number of personnel who are technically schooled and have the background information and basic theory to enable them to perform at the apprentice level.

Upon arrival at Reese, the assignees become trainees and are assigned a position within their particular specialty which has been predetermined during earlier stages of their training. They are then assigned a supervisor and a trainer.

The Hospital's major sections each have supervisors whose job it is to see that training is up to date and that personnel are meeting their training schedules. Each supervisor is responsible for approximately 7-10 men, while each trainer is usually limited to no more than three trainees.

Each supervisor has a technical knowledge of his field, while trainers may be at either the technical or specialist level. At the present there are five supervisors and five trainers under Sergeant Bibbs.

Sergeant Bibbs describes the entire program as a "coordinated effort", all the way from Lt. Col. David W. Davis, the Hospital commander, down to the newest assignee.

Quality control is insured by oral and written examinations prior to weekly tests administered by the base OJT section and close supervision and evaluation of the trainees' practical applications and SKT results. Supervisors are monitored from the professional level by Hospital physicians and nurses.

"The base OJT section gives us tremendous support, effort, and assistance in identifying potential problems through weekly test result reports," Sergeant Bibbs relates.

Personnel falling behind in their studies is the main problem area, this, controlled study periods are set up after normal duty hours says Sergeant Bibbs. To counter

program to "hard work, continuous monitoring of trainees, and an outstanding job by the supervisors and trainers." He added that the goal for this quarter is a 100 per cent rating.

Two additional problems facing the program which must be over-

come are keeping the trainees on schedule and the retention of trained personnel, relates Colonel Davis.

"We are doing our best to follow the Air Training Command motto to 'Prepare the Man'," says Colonel Davis.

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and are monitored by trainers and supervisors. "This tends to motivate, supervisor, trainer, and trainee," says the sergeant. He added that only about 5-10 per cent of the trainees ever need these study periods.

The training program is based on what each man is doing at a particular stage in his training as specified in the Job Training Standard. Prior to the administration of the weekly tests by the base OJT section, trainers and supervisors are responsible for seeing that each man is prepared and proficient in his work before reporting for these tests.

Test scores are used as an indication of how well the trainee is performing. If the tests indicate a high rate of failure, both trainer and trainee are checked to discover where the fault lies.

How well is the program succeeding? During the past four years only three individuals have failed to make the grade in the Hospital's program.

Before coming to Reese, Sergeant Bibbs served as NCOIC of Nursing Services at the 86th Air Division (TAC) Hospital at Ramstein, Germany. A veteran of the Medical Service Corps, he has been in the field for 14 years.

Colonel Davis also attributes the success of the Hospital's OJT

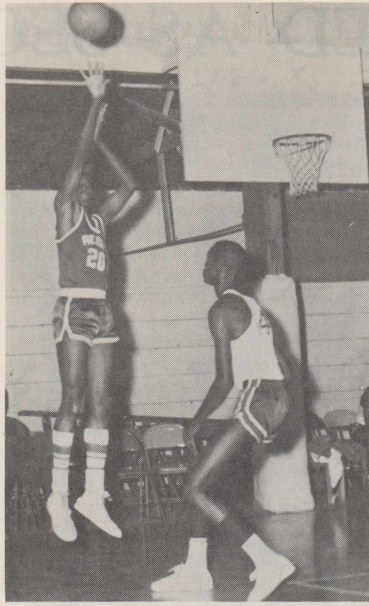

## Judgment, Quick Emergency Action Win Awards For Pair

Air Training Command TOPS in Safety Outstanding Performance Awards have been presented 1st Lt. John A. Grimm and A2C Dean R. Duskin. Presentation was at the last wing staff meeting, with Col. Dudley E. Faver, wing commander, making the awards.

The lieutenant, instructor pilot in the 3500th Pilot Training Squadron, received the award for operations, while the airman assigned to the 3500th Field Maintenance Squadron, was honored in the support area. TOPS is the abbreviation for "To Promote Safety."

Lieutenant Grimm Oct. 7, his citation said, was on a dual instrument training flight with a student when difficulty with the throttle was noted. He attempted adjustments but was unsuccessful, whereupon he shut off the gas and landed.

On the runway both tires blew out but the landing was made without injury or heavy damage to the aircraft.

The lieutenant was lauded for sound judgment and positive action in a critical emergency and for averting serious injury to himself and his student, while saving a valuable aircraft.

Airman Duskin was credited

with saving a T-37 aircraft from burning. His letter of recommendation stated that he was acting as a fire guard late at night when he noted an approaching aircraft shooting fire from an engine. He signalled the maintenance man moving it to halt and leave the aircraft.

Airman Duskin was credited with quickly getting a fire extinguisher and then a second extinguisher to put out the fire before the fire department could be summoned and reach the spot.

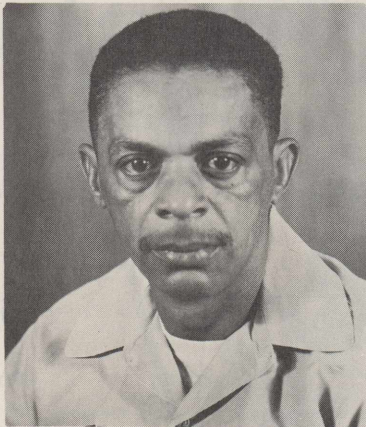
In performing the feat, the airman suffered burns to his eyes which brought five days of hospitalization. He, also, was credited with sound judgment and action which saved the aircraft.

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The Air Force has called for more local emphasis on civilian employment assistance provided members approaching retirement time.

A report covering the first year's operation of the joint Department of Defense — Department of Labor Civilian Employment Assistance Program shows 28,011 active-duty Air Force personnel received orientation briefings through June 30, 1965.

This figure is encouraging, the Air Force noted in an all major air command letter. At the same

time it reminded personnel staffs of their responsibility to support the program and urged commanders to expand the sources of information given at the briefings.

The cooperative program to help career military personnel obtain civilian jobs after retirement was established last year by the Department of Defense and the Department of Labor's Bureau of Employment Security. It is intended to provide, in two phases, employment orientation, counseling, testing and placement assistance.
