Barbecue luncheon at Belknap Society meeting Saturday

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The annual historic meeting of the Fort Belknap Society (open to the public) to be held at the restored Old Fort October 19th will this year feature the authors writing on Old Fort Belknap, with the program beginning at 9:45 with Midwestern University presenting a military review.

Dr. Rupert Richardson's book "The Northwest Texas Frontier 1846-1876, will be the featured presentation. Dr. Richardson is at present Chairman of the Texas Historic Survey Committee and President Emeritus of Hardin Simmons University of Abilene. Dr. Richardson, an historian of note on Texas history, has been at work for several years collecting the material for the book. Dr. Kenneth Neighbors of Midwestern University and archivist of Fort Belknap archives, will review the book.

Mrs. Barbara Ledbetter's book, "The Fort Belknap of Yesterday and Today," recently released, will be cited as will Carrie Crouch's History, long a favorite for source material.

An historic play written by Catherine Young Clack of Burkburnett, Texas, will be presented by the speech-drama department of Texas Wesleyan College directed by Mason Johnson. The play depicts a memorable visit of Mrs. Albert Sidney Johnston to Ft. Belknap in 1855.

The Belknap Junior Historian Youth Panel, presented in Texas Attorney General's Youth Conference at the State Capitol in August, will be repeated for the Historical Society. Five teenage historians, headed by Mack Cook of Breckenridge and John Tarleton College, compose the panel.

Dr. John Stephens of TWC, Fort Worth, will enumerate recent generous gifts of TWC to Belknap.

As an entertaining note, Senator George Moffett will give intimate glimpses of the Bonanza TV cast as he observed in Hollywood.

Mrs. Ben G. Oneal, President of the Belknap Society, will preside.

Mr. Clarence Daniels, president of Farmers National Bank, Newcastle, will receive reservations for the barbecue luncheon. Open to the public.

John George, born December 10, 1886, in the True community, one of seven children born to the late Mr. and Mrs. W. H. George, pioneer settlers in this county. All of his brothers preceded him in death except Jim Bob George, who lives at Wagoner, Okla. His mother was the former Martha Graham. John had lived in Young County all his life. He had never married.

John was honest in all his dealings with his fellow man, was widely known and had many friends and acquaintances who will regret to hear of his passing. He was a retired farmer.

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Pilot point method of teaching explained at PTA meeting

The PTA met Oct. 10, at 2:30 p. m. in the school auditorium. Mrs. Petty opened the meeting by prayer.

The business followed, where two delegates were nominated and elected to attend the State Convention. Mrs. R. D. Williams, president, to be one of the delegates and the other is yet to be selected. Mrs. Williams presented the Supt., Mr. Hales, who in turn, assisted by Mr. Murphee and Mr. Rose explained the Pilot school system. This system is a method of teaching that has been

worked out so that smaller schools can offer more subject matter and stay up with the larger schools.

We have 173 students this year, which is 20 less than last year, giving us one less teacher, so that some of the classes had to be combined in order to carry on.

Mr. Hales brought out that most children are willing and eager to learn and that if the child has the right home influence and is taught love and respect and love of God, they hardly ever give any trouble in school.

The National test given our students showed Newcastle to be in the upper 50 percent in the nation and 25 percent in State, which is very good.

Mr. Murphee presented facts showing changes in the business world and the world at large and we must accept these changes and change our school system accordingly.

An open question and answer period followed.
