## Richard Routon, 75, prominent citizen, dies after long illness

Richard, (Dick) Routon, 75, a long time citizen of Newcastle and a retired gin-ner passed away about 3 p. m. Tuesday in the Hamilton hospital, in Olney, after a long illness.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday from the Methodist church in Newcastle, with Rev. Van P. Morrison of Mineral Wells, officiating assisted by Rev. E. C. Hewitt, pastor, and Rev. R. D. Williams, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Born in Crockett, Texas, Oct. 31, 1888, Routon had lived in Young county most of his adult life and in Newcastle for more than 40 years. He was married at Graham in 1914 to the former Miss Fannie Sparks.

Dick, as he was familiarly known by his friends and acquaintances, was widely known over this part of the country as he had operated a cotton gin in Newcastle for about 30 years. He was a highly respected citizen and held in high esteem by all. He was a member of the Methodist church and was active until his health failed. Newcastle loses a loyal and staunch citizen, and his many friends will regret to hear of his passing.

Survivors include his widow; 2 daughters, Mrs. T. M. Blanton, of Newcastle and Mrs. A. A. Crowover of Waco; 4 grandchildren, 1 great grandchild; 1 sister, Mrs. C. Lee Jones of Graham; 1 brother John Routon, of Michigan.

## To the voters of Precinct 3

I would like to thank you the voters of Precinct 3, for the support you have given me during the time I have served as your precinct commissioner. It has been my pleasure to serve in this capacity during the past thirteen (13) years. I have tried to the best of my ability to conduct the business of this precinct in fair and equitable manner and have tried to be fair and reasonable with all persons living in this precinct. I feel that I am aware of the problems of the people residing in this precinct, having made my home here most all my life. I believe that most of you are familiar with the manner in which I have maintained the roads in the precinct. I have worked hard for designation of farm-to-market roads and during my tenure in office, miles of farm to market roads have been designated and built, also, there has been extensive improvements to state highway 109 and state highway 251 between Newcastle and Olney. In order to get a farm to market road designation, it is necessary for the county to purchase and fence the right-of way and considerable sums of money have been spent in order to obtain these roads.

The price of road machinery and labor has increased materially over the last few years, but the amount of taxes paid by the people of Young county, as their property has decreased during my tenure in office. Since I have been on the commissioners' court, Young county has not issued any evidences of indebtedness in the way of bonds or warrants and the tax rate has dropped from \$1.40 on the \$100.00 assessed valuation to \$0.95, and as you know, the assessed value of property in Young county is only approximately 20 per cent of its actual or real value. The Commissioners court has only purchased those items that we felt were necessary to efficient operation of the county's business and have at all times tried to operate as conservatively as possible. At this time, Young county has sufficient money to cooperate its business for 1964 and does not plan on buying anything that money is not available to pay for.

During the time I have served as your commissioner I have tried to maintain all of the county lateral roads and bridges in the most practical manner possible, having graveled most all of the more extensively used roads and have repaired by graveling most all of the places that get bad during wet weather. I have replaced hundreds of old wooden bridges with permanent type drainage structures.

I have tried to serve all the people of Precinct 3 in a fair and equitable manner and it is upon this record that I ask your support in 1964. I feel that I am qualified by experience to serve in this capacity.

## Young County's First School

During this national educational week, it might be fitting at this time, to reflect upon the story of Young county's first school.

The first known school in Young county was the school located on the Brazos Agency Indian Reservation, located in the southmost part of Young county and some 15 miles southeast of old Fort Belknap. The school was among the things promised the Indians in the 1846 original peace treaty between the Indians of America and the federal government. The U. S. government was to provide the Indians with schools, a blacksmith, farmers to train them, a sutler store, and a minister of the gospel of any faith and a school teacher to teach in the school.

The first teacher in the original log cabin school was a Mr. Richard Sloan. After buildings were erected in the early fall of 1857, Mr. Sloan reported for duty on the reservation. He stayed a very

short time, a matter of months, and was soon sent to another teaching job on the Comanche Reservation some 40 miles away from Ft. Belknap. A replacement for Mr. Sloan was found. Mr. Sloan's salary had been \$00 dollars for teaching 12 months of the year.

The teacher replacement on the Brazos Agency Indian Reservation school was Mr. Zechariah Ellis Coombes. Mr. Coombes, his wife, Rebecca, and his son, Billy, reported for duty at the reservation school during the summer of 1858.

Mr. Coombes found a school equipped with 4 long log benches, a wood stove, some McGuffey's eclectic first readers and blueback spellers along with quills and slates, the Bible, a bell, and Ray's eclectic arithmetic.

Some days the school had as few as 4 to report to the school. On other days there would be as many as 22 or 32 students. His school record would appear as follows:

their children to school because of the distance the scholars must travel. The villages were scattered along the banks of the Brazos river, from Dry creek to Indian Springs. The Tonkawa were located in Tonk Valley, southwest of Graham. Most students had to travel about 5 miles to attend classes at the Brazos Agency Reservation school. Mr. Coombes had one thing in his classroom that teachers of today would not need. He did not know one word of Indian language, and

he therefore, had an interpreter at all times. During the year 1858-59 he had 2 interpreters; George Williams, a Delaware Indian, and Delaware J. cob.

Major Robert S. Neighbors, and Capt. Shapely Prince Ress were the overseers of the school.

Provision for clothing for the young Indian children was the duty of teacher Coombes' wife. She made pants, dresses, coats, and shirts for the Indian students. Indian children were accustomed to going without clothing, and even white boys on the frontier often were dressed only in a shirt.

The school was discontinued in 1859. The Indians were removed to Indian Territory, north of the Red river. Major Neighbors had the sad duty to go along with the tribes

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until they were delivered to safety in Indian Territory.

One interesting incident happened during a school day on the reserve. A young Indian chap came to school only to relate to the teacher his dream of the night before. He had dreamed the Comanches were coming. Upon his oral recitation of his dream, the Indian children in the school room fled to the brakes of the river, parents joined them shortly, and not an Indian student reported to school for some 2 weeks. This was the kind of thing that hindered the education of the children.

Many people visited the experimental school on the frontier of Texas. Sometimes the number of the visitors during the day outnumbered the students in attendance. The teacher would have spelling matches for the entertainment of the visiting parents or dignitaries.

The visitors to the school were officers of the army, Indian chiefs of all tribes, wives of the frontiersmen, and farmers and ranchers of the area.

This was only 106 years ago, and it happened right here in our own county.—B. N. L.
