Throckmorton Couple killed In Olney crash

Olney, Texas — Mr. and Mrs. Henry L. Smith of Throckmorton were killed in a car-truck collision on the southeast of Olney early Friday morning.

Officers were continuing investigation Friday morning. The auto and a wheat truck collided. The truck driver Charlie Smith of Haskell, reportedly suffered only shock.

Henry Smith was owner of a dry goods store in Throckmorton and was active in the American Legion and served as veterans' service officer.

The Smiths had lived in Throckmorton since about 1936 after moving from Haskell. They were active in the Church of Christ.

He was a brother of the late John Lee Smith of Lubbock, former lieutenant governor of Texas.

Investigating the accident were Highway Patrolmen, J. C. Brown and B. J. Green and city officer Lloyd Keeter.

Investigating officers said Meyers was driving a truck and trailer loaded with potatoes east on the highway when the accident occurred.

Reaves and Mullins were in an empty cattle truck owned by Texas Meat Packing Co., of Dallas and headed west. This truck overturned and burned.

Rescue workers at first thought there were four bodies in the twisted wreckage.

As long as you pay Them, deduct them

When you start adding up the deductions on page 2 of your 1964 federal income tax form, don't forget state gasoline taxes. Do a little adding up and you'll be surprised at how much you paid during the past year.

State gasoline taxes range from 5 cents a gallon in Texas, Kansas, Missouri, Illinois, and Hawaii, up to 8 cents in Alaska. These, of course, are added on to the 4 cents a gallon federal tax which is not deductible.

A motorist who drives 10,000 miles in a year and who gets 15 miles to the gallon on his car, pays between \$60 to \$80 in gasoline taxes. More than half of this is paid in state taxes which are deductible. As long as you pay them, you might as well deduct them.

MEET THE FOLKS

MRS. O. R. DENTON

Mrs. O. R. Denton, affectionately called "Aunt Molly," by her many friends, has lived and witnessed history in the making. Born October 23, 1865, one of 15 children born to Mr. and Mrs. John Dials, ten of whom lived to be grown. Her father came

from Mississippi over a hundred years ago and settled in Hunt county, near Greenville. Her mother, Harriet Arberry was a native Texan. She grew up on a farm, doing her part of the work, stating, my father thought plowing was too rough for girls, but we had to pick cotton, which was a lot harder. She often acted as baby sitter for her own brothers and sisters and children of neighbors, adding "I just loved little children and they loved me." Her father was a cavalryman

in the Civil War, taking along his own fine horse and rifle. She remembers many incidents concerning this war as told by her father. He was neither wounded nor taken prisoner during his two years duty. She has often watched her father and brothers mold bullets. Mr. Dials was famous for his expert marksmanship, and indulged in his favorite sport which was hunting. This, besides being enjoyable also meant meat for the table.

Square dances singings, and other neighborhood gatherings made up the social life of her area. All children learned to ride a horse at an early age, as this was their only means of transportation. As a young lady she often rode miles, accompanied by her favorite beau, to one of these affairs. Sometimes twelve or fifteen would travel in a wagon, and that was real fun, she added.

She was married to Orville Rice Denton, May 26, 1886. He had a fine pony and borrowed a buggy, so we went to the court house in Greenville, and was married by Judge J. S. Sherrill. Mr. Denton was a school teacher and she often substituted as teacher for him and a brother who also taught. However her husband did not like this profession and after taking a course in telegraphy, became a railroad station agent. This meant moving many times. The family lived in Louisiana, Arkansas, New Mexico, Kansas, and many Texas towns. Since she had a pass and could travel free, she made many trips, especially to visit her parents and family in Hunt county. She is the mother of five sons, two died as children and the other three have since passed away.

My brother Sidney Lee was a natural born fiddler and could play any tune after once hearing it. He often played the fiddle and I would sing. Aunt Mollie still loves to sing, especially old hymns. Nothing makes her happier than for a visitor to ask her to sing or recite. Another profession, as she calls it, was reading aloud I've read everything she adds. She blames crocheting for her near blindness now and wishes she had kept account of the hats and bags crocheted for others.

A strong, healthy woman, she had never been a hospital patient until a few years ago, having suffered a severe burn on left leg, when her dress caught fire from an open heater. She had never had a hypodermic injection.

A doctor was not present at the birth of her five sons, until this accident.

Her mother and friends delivered the babies successfully, she laughingly said. There was never time enough to get a doctor.

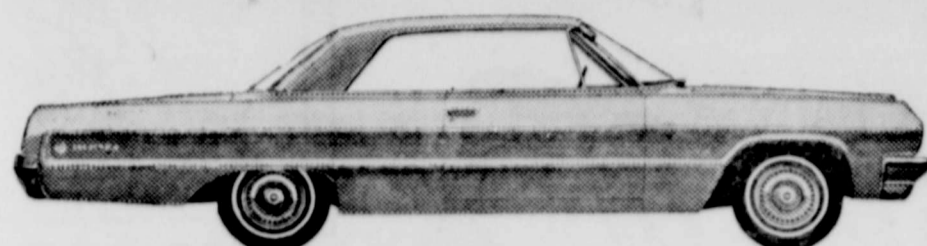
Her husband died in 1941. In 1948 she came to live in the home of a niece, Mrs. Mable Wells, in Profit. Here she

shared a room with her sister, Mrs. Ada Crain, mother of Mrs. Wells.

We sat with Aunt Molly January 27, the afternoon Mrs. Crane was buried. She spoke of their childhood experiences brothers and sisters and sadly remarked she would miss Ada, as they had always been so close, and asked to sing a song for her sister.

Oh! Come Angel band, Come and around me stand, Oh! bear me away on your snowy wings To my immortal home.

She has always enjoyed speaking. Recently reciting a long reading learned as a child, around ninety years ago. Though

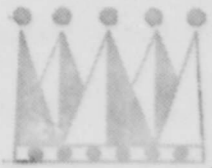

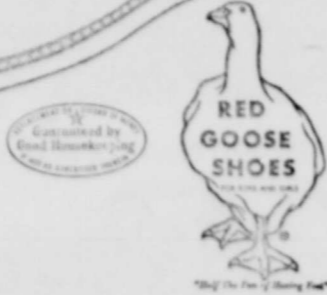
