

Prepared by American Foundation for Animal Health With the approach of the fall rainy season, livestock producers should begin to watch for a condition known as "foot rot" which sometimes develops in cattle and sheep

Wet weather and muddy lots, or moist and unsanitary conditions in dairy cattle stalls, seem to play a part in this disease. The feet become damaged and softened by muddy or wet conditions. Or, they become injured by rocks, or sharp objects. Then the disease organisms which cause foot rot gain entrance to the feet and begin their destructive work.



Wet, muddy lots and stalls predispose livestock to the problem of foot rot.

The affected animals fail to gain, become unthrifty, milk production drops, and often the feet become permanently damaged.

There are certain warning signs a farmer can watch for. . . . when cattle or sheep limp, or begin to show foot discomfort, it is time to have a veterinarian check them over and see whether foot rot may be causing the trouble. The disease can move rapidly through an entire herd.

Animals suffering from this condition can be cured if treatment begins soon enough. The veterinarian sometimes trims away the badly-infected tissue and uses drugs or ointments to kill the germs and promote healing. Sheep are sometimes run through a foot bath after their hooves are rimmed


As preventive measures, authorities suggest the following: Keep livestock out of muddy pastures and away from stagnant pools. Stalls for dairy cattle should be kept dry, clean and sanitary, and hind feet should be checked at intervals. It is also a good idea to segregate newlypurchased livestock for a time, to make sure they do not carry in this infection to the home herd. Above all, if animals show signs of tender feet they should be examined, and treatment should be started with all promptness.




