## HI-WAYS and By-ways

EASTER SUNDAY

Leaving home Sunday afternoon with no particular destination in mind, first turning south down the road to Murray. Passing the spot where Cribbs Station once stood. Here the stage coach stopped to pick up and unload passengers, and weary travelers stopped their wagons and rested between Ft. Griffin and Ft. Belknap. At the Murray crossroad, flipped a coin heads to right, tails to left. The Fishcreek Baptist Church where old timers worshipped. Around a bend in the road, looking to our right where the Hamilton Ranch has operated so long.

Budding trees, lush green fields and pastures, contrasted by little hills that looked like big bumps covered with rock and no vegetation. Old log cribs crumbling houses, an old chimney, all leaning earthward, as if tired yet symbolizing the ingenuity, blood, sweat and tears shed by the pioneers who conquered this land.

Off the beaten path a bit to visit a beautiful and well kept cemetery where members of the Donnell and Cunningham families are buried. Some of the headstones denoted those who fought in Missouri Regiment in Civil War. An old house stood on a hill nearby, now vacant, we yearned to browse inside. It must have been a mansion in its day.

On to Eliasville, pausing to view the site of the old mill run by the Donnell family. Here people from far and wide brought corn and wheat to be ground into bread stuff. Dr. Cunningham in his book "History of Eliasville" gives a vivid description of this old mill in operation. The steep, slippery banks made it difficult for laden wagons to ascend and descend. A spirit of neighborliness prevailed, each man unhooked his team and helped the other until all the wagons had reached level ground.

An Indian Reservation was once near here, but not knowing its location we delayed that trip for another day. In all of this part of Young county the Indian and white man fought it out for supremacy.

Before reaching Ivan we stopped to browse in South Prairie Cemetery. Mr. and Mrs. Henry Wesley of Ivan came to visit the grave of her mother, Mrs. Maggie Martin. They told us of an older cemetery east of Ivan, called Veale Creek. This too showed loving care and respect for departed members of old families in this country. Surrounded by an antique iron fence, beautiful native cedar trees, it was peaceful and quiet. Here we found the grave of a great aunt, Charity Layne Cretsingler and her husband, Henry Cretsingler. My mother had visited her kin in this community at the age of 16. She never forgot the dances and socials she attended on this visit. Grave-stones of the Caudill, Stringer, Barron and other families whose descendants are our friends.

Leaving this hallowed spot we traveled to Fox Hollow on Possum Kingdom Lake. Here the Caudill, Stringer, Barron and

other families farmed, reared families, and did their part toward civilizing this country. We knew it when people lived here, it seemed strange for this this land to be covered with water.

Passing through Bunger community we spoke of the R. D. Berry family. A house surrounded by cars, caused us to make a bet this was the home of this fine family, and their children had come to spend Easter with them.

Passing through Graham from any direction, stately old homes set back from busy streets, beautiful old trees, give this little city an air of dignity and culture.

The cedar shaded Wray cemetery marks the vicinity where the Wrays, Bullocks, Burches and others originated. The old Sloan home with a dug-out opening into the house, proving split-level homes are not a new form of architecture.

Old Fort Belknap with the Redbud trees a mass of bloom. Thinking of Barbara Neal Ledbetter (who works so hard trying to write and preserve the history of her native land and its people) and others who are interested in compiling a complete file for the archives.

The beautiful and well kept grounds, and home of the Doc Blanton's, is impressive to all who travel highway 24. The H. W. Creel home, where the welcome mat is always spread before the door. Pete and Ora Gilmore had company. C. M. Watson home seemed quiet. They were probably with Mrs. Heard at the hospital. The sign pointing to Profit Baptist Church, organized in 1904, and some of the third generation of its founders still attend.

Reaching the gate that leads to home, our trip over highways and byways had been completed in three hours. We spoke of some of the dates on headstones where we had visited this afternoon (some born about a century and a half ago) and tried to imagine how long it would have taken to cover this 100 miles in covered wagon drawn by oxen or horses. There were no paved roads then, and often a road had to be hewn with an ax before it could be traveled. Such is the jet age.

We will be taking other trips to no particular destination, and we will chide ourselves for not bringing Wiley Burch, Noble Timmons, Merl or Slats Woodriddle along to point out old land marks and other points of interest.

A cattle problem which is only ten years old in this country, but is spreading fast, may cause losses on many of our farms again this fall and winter.  
 The problem is rhinotracheitis, sometimes known as "red nose." Today it has spread to two-thirds of the states, and is still advancing.  
 First warning of the disease in dairy cattle may be a sudden halt in milk flow. Symptoms in beef cattle include drooling, nasal discharge, and sometimes a cough. Later, the sick animals have difficulty in breathing and lose weight rapidly.



Farmers should watch for signs of a new cattle disease, "Rhinotracheitis," now spread to two-thirds of all states.

Although the disease is spreading rapidly, there is a comforting side to the picture, too. Rhinotracheitis can be prevented by vaccination. If done properly, vaccination has proven quite effective.

In all cases, the vaccinating should be done by a veterinarian. No treatment should be started until the veterinarian has checked the sick animals. The important reason for this is that rhinotracheitis resembles several other diseases, such as shipping fever, virus diarrhea, mucosal disease and calf diphtheria. Because the disease is still so new, the chances for confusion are great without an expert opinion.

Rhinotracheitis is spread by direct contact between animals. For this reason, it can be brought onto the farm by replacement animals which can spread it when they mingle with the home herd.

Rhinotracheitis in this country will probably get worse before it gets better. It is still spreading, and is causing heavy losses. But alertness and prompt action are good safeguards if cattle owners will use them. As with all disease problems, a knowledge of the disease, what it looks like and what to do about it are our best defense.

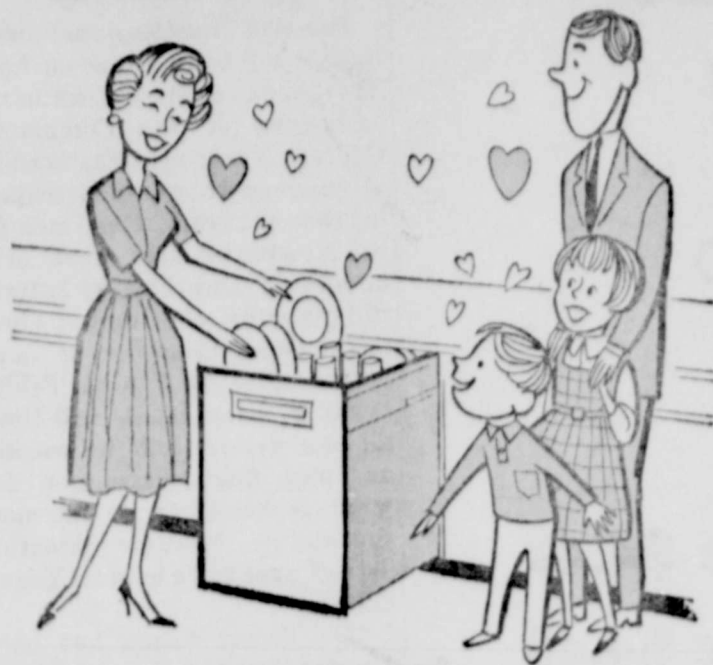
