### SAFETY PROGRAM PRESENTED AT HIGH SCHOOL

6. The power of petroleum products.
7. Household wiring and overloaded electrical circuits.

## 20 year old Graham man stabbed to death with knife

Two Mineral Wells men were being held in Young County jail Wednesday morning facing murder charges in connection with the stabbing death of 20-year old Glen Dale (Bud) Carnley of Graham.

Carnley was dead upon arrival at Graham General Hospital. Officers Sheriff John Edwards and District Attorney Jack Q. Neal were called to the scene and said Carnley suffered a great loss of blood from a leg wound inflicted during an argument on the Brazos River 10 miles south of Graham off State 254.

Jailed were Allen Lafayette Cook, 56, and his son, Willie Ray Cook, 24, both held in lieu of \$10,000 bonds set by Peace Justice J. L. Miller.

Officers said Carnley and a party of three other men went fishing Tuesday afternoon at a spot on the river across from a point where the Cooks and three other men had established a camp for cutting cedar fence posts.

Officers quoted one of Carnley's party, Jackie Carter, as saying the woodcutters were firing guns and the fishermen shouted across the river and asked them to stop.

An argument ensued, Carter was quoted as saying, and the woodcutters came across the river and attacked the fishermen. The rest of the party fled but returned shortly to find Carnley suffering badly from loss of blood.

Carnley was dead by the time he arrived at Graham. Others in the fishing party were reported to be Charles Hays and Kenneth Borden all of Graham. An oil field worker, Carnley is survived by his widow and two children.

asked to give? One pint. There are approximately 12 or 15 pints in the human body, depending on weight.

5. Does it take long? No less than an hour. The actual donation takes only about 5 minutes.

6. What precautions are taken for my protection? Before you are allowed to donate, doctors and trained nurses will check your temperature, pulse, hemoglobin, blood pressure, and medical history.

7. How long does it take the body to replace the pint donation? The fluid blood is replaced within a few minutes. The iron content requires several days for replacement through food.

8. How many blood groups (types) are there? There are four main groups of blood: A, B, AB, and O. Each is either Rh Positive or Negative.

9. Do patients pay for blood? No one has paid for Red Cross blood. (Hospitals make a reasonable charge for crossmatching and administering the transfusion and share a part of the Blood Center's processing cost.) Moreover, residents of participating counties in the Red Cross Regional Blood Program can receive blood without charge even in other areas, if the hospital will accept the blood. Be sure to notify your community or county blood program chairman or the Red Cross Blood Center in Wichita Falls if you become hospitalized away from home and need blood.

10. Am I eligible to give blood? Yes, if you're between 18 and 59 and pass the physical check-up. (Written permission of a parent is required for unmarried persons un-

der 21). Blood can be donated at 8 intervals, but no more often than 5 times a year.

REMINDER: It is advisable not to eat fatty foods for 4 hours prior to making a donation. Too much fat content in your blood may cause a reaction in the patient who receives the transfusion. You may drink black coffee, soft drinks and fruit juices and eat dry toast (no butter) with jam or jelly, boiled or poached eggs and lean meat.
