John Williams, 61-year resident, passes away

One of the best known and highest esteemed pioneer citizens of Newcastle, S. P. J. Williams, 61, passed away in the Olney hospital about 6:30 p. m. Monday, after suffering a heart attack. John had been in declining health for some time.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2 p. m. from the Newcastle Methodist Church, with Rev. Edis Sluder, former pastor, but now pastor of the Methodist Church in Springtown, officiating. He was assisted by the local pastor, Rev. E. C. Hewitt, and Rev. R. D. Williams, pastor of the Newcastle Baptist Church.

Burial was in the Newcastle Cemetery under direction of Lunn Funeral Home.

S. P. J. Williams, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Williams Sr., was born August 7, 1887, in Fort Belknap, and lived in Young County all his life. The family moved from there to Graham and from Graham to this vicinity in 1903. John was assistant postmaster for many years, and had held the position of City Secretary until his retirement about two years ago.

He was married to Charlie Tirey in 1913 in Wichita Falls. To this union was born four children, three girls and one boy. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

John was widely known and held in high esteem by all his friends and acquaintances. He was a progressive and loyal citizen of this community, ever ready to serve in any capacity for the betterment of the community. His presence in our community will be sadly missed.

Survivors include the widow; a son, Benoit Williams, Monroe, La.; a daughter, Mrs. Blanche Bogan, Fort Worth; a sister, Mrs. V. A. Watson, and three brothers, B. Henry, and Roland Williams, all of Newcastle, and two grandchildren. Two daughters preceded him in death, Martha in 1937, and Shirley John in 1944.

DECLARING TEXAS CIVIL WAR HISTORY APPRECIATION WEEK

The Highway Patrol investigated 15 rural accidents in Young County during the month of March, according to Sergeant Frank Jireik, Patrol Supervisor of this area

These wrecks accounted for five deaths, seven persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$45,130.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for Young County from January through March of 1964 shows a total of 31 crashes resulting in five persons killed, 10 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$52,655.00.

Higher Posts Planned For Women By LBJ

President Johnson held a cabinet meeting a short time ago at which he asked me to discuss the role of working women in government. The President said then, "The day is over when top jobs are reserved for men."

Already the President has directed his cabinet members and agency heads to strive to place women in top government posts in the near future.

President Johnson realizes, as did President Kennedy before him, that the talents of our women are an untapped national resource. His programs are designed to see that, in the short run, the Federal government makes maximum use of that resource and that, in the long run, an example is set for business, industry and labor — that the usefulness of the working women is demonstrated.

There are nearly 25 million working women in the United States—that is almost a third of our work force. Many of these women work from economic necessity — because they are the sole support of their families or because their families could not otherwise maintain a decent standard of living. Others work from choice, because they feel they can make a more useful contribution to their families and society by contributing their talent and energy to the work force.

It is not reasonable to expect women to make an equal contribution to a society in which they are offered unequal incentives. It is neither just nor equitable to offer women lower pay for equal tasks. It is a national disgrace, and a needless human hardship, that one-quarter of the poor families in the United States are headed by women and nearly one-third of all families headed by women are poor.

Women have made great strides in the past three and a half years.

On June 10, 1963, the Nation's first Equal Pay Act was signed into law. The Act prohibits arbitrary wage discrimination against women because

of their sex. Some 8 million women covered under the Fair Labor Standards Act are covered by the new law.

As a result of a Presidential directive Federal agencies are now required to make promotions on merit alone, regardless of sex.

The President's Commission on the Status of Women has been established.

Already there are a number of women in key posts in government. Mrs. Katie Louchheim is Deputy Assistant Secretary for Community Services; Eva Adams is Director of the Bureau of the Mint; Dr. Leona Baumgartner is an Assistant Administrator for the Agency for International Development; Mrs. Kathryn Granahan is the Treasurer of the United States; Mrs. Marietta Tree represents the United States on the United Nations Human Rights Commission; Mrs. Eugenie Anderson is our minister to Bulgaria; Frances E. Willis is the United States Ambassador to Colombo-Ceylon; and there are many more I could name.

But if much has been done, much more remains to be done. There can be no doubt that President Johnson recognizes the problem and has moved to meet it.

Efforts to lift a \$55 million annual millstone from the backs of American swine growers are showing encouraging results as the current nationwide drive to eradicate hog cholera continues. However, progress of the drive has now reached a critical stage in some areas and soon will be reached in others. This stage involves lowering the incidence of cholera infection.

It is critical because, as the incidence of hog cholera declines, there may be a tendency among owners to feel the job has been accomplished and they may relax protective measures.

One of the most important of these protective measures is vaccination. It has been estimated that at least 75 per cent of the swine herds in this country need to be immunized, to guard against widespread outbreaks of hog cholera. Vaccination also is one of the cornerstones on which the eradication program is built and it is especially important now, because spring is one of the seasons of heavy cholera outbreaks.



Hog cholera is America's worst swine killer. Pigs should be vaccinated against it.

Authorities warn, however, that successful vaccination against cholera is not just a routine procedure. There are many factors involved if the hogs are to be assured of firm immunity. Considerations entering into the picture include the condition of the pigs, history of cholera in the area, and choice of the type of vaccine which is best to use in the individual case.

Because of these things, it is wise to have a veterinarian examine the condition of the pigs, choose the type of vaccine to be employed, and do the actual vaccinating. Otherwise, the owner may not only waste the cost of the vaccination, but risk a cholera outbreak as well.

Eradication of cholera would be an important breakthrough in the fight against this No. 1 swine killer, and proper vaccination is a cornerstone in the campaign.

Florida Uses Safety Tags



Florida's 1964 license plates are novel ones. They will be "safety" tags covered with a reflective material similar to that currently used by 16 other states and the District of Columbia. Pat Tierney, Miami, demonstrates the plates, which can be seen up to 1,500 feet after dark.

They have markedly reduced night rear-end collisions in the states that have been using them. The American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators recently recommended the adoption of the reflective license plates believing their widespread use would further its aim to promote highway safety and reduce automobile accidents. Referring to the five-cent additional charge for the "safety" plates, C. Henry N. Kirkman, director of the Florida Department of Public Safety, said, "That's mighty cheap insurance."
