Chartered bus planned for trip to Spearman

The Publicity and Goodwill Committee of the Graham Chamber of Commerce has agreed to co-sponsor a chartered bus to Spearman for the big kick-off celebration planned by that community, for the departure of the Rolling Hills Wagon Train on May 14.

Gov. John Connally has been invited to participate in the devotional services and breakfast prior to the Wagon Train's departure on the morning of May 14. A family style dinner is planned the evening of May 13 for local and out of town guests.

Along its route to Graham the Wagon Train will participate in the Quanah Frontier Celebration, May 22, 23, 24; Jacksboro-Fort Richardson Celebration, May 29, 30, 31; Olney Rodeo Celebration, June 2, 3, 4; Fort Belknap Celebration, June 6; and finish this 400 mile trek with the Graham P-K Roundup Rodeo and Pioneer celebration, June 10, 11, 12, 13.

The 41 passenger chartered bus or buses will be co-sponsored with interested persons from Olney, Jacksboro, Ft. Belknap, and Graham. The bus will leave Graham about 10 a. m. May 13, and return from Spearman the next evening, May 14. A chartered bus, or motor caravan, will be planned by Quanah; and it is possible the two groups would go together from Quanah to Spearman.

Mrs. Manley died when her car crashed head-on with another car containing five people, killing four members of the family of Carl Songer, 31, of Lubbock. Songer was reported in fair condition at an Olney hospital.

Mass funeral for Mrs. Songer and her three children killed in the crash were held in Lubbock Sunday.

Mrs. Manley is survived by her husband, Wayland Manley, and a young daughter, Lisa, of the home.

The accident occurred two miles west of Loving.

Rain, hail and wind hit Proffitt territory

Up to Saturday this vicinity had received about one inch of rain from thunderstorms all around us, but none directly over us. In the Proffitt community they received two and three inches of rain accompanied by a strong wind and hail. The hail storm chopped up several grain fields on the southside of the river, including Thomas Wilkinson and Woodrow Owens places. It traveled on north across the river hitting the Berry, Tate and Furr farms as well as others. The hail extended on north to the Grover Furr place west of Olney where it cut up a 250 acre grain field. We lost track of it there. We understand the loss could not be estimated at this time.

The city of Olney suffered considerable damage from a windstorm. The east plate glass window of Lunn Furniture Co. was knocked out; the roof on the Masonic hall ripped off, the roof on the Olney Enterprise suffered considerable damage; as well as other business and residence buildings.

Social Security Benefits Amount to \$1,721,998.00 in Young County in 1963

More than 2300 residents of Young County are now receiving a monthly social security check according to figures released by Erton F. Tate, Wichita Falls social security district manager.

Mr. Tate's report listed the number of Young county beneficiaries as 2,384 at the end of 1963, an increase of 160 over corresponding figure at the beginning of 1963. The dollar benefit amounts total more than \$1,721,998.00 yearly.

Retired workers are the largest single group of social security beneficiaries in the county. There are 1,270 in this group and their old-age insurance benefits total \$88,110.00 monthly. The following table shows the number and amount of monthly benefits paid in Young County as of Dec. 31, 1963.

In releasing the figures, Mr. Tate pointed out that the social security benefits are important to the community as well as to the people who receive them. "It is a fact," he said, "that almost every dollar of social security benefits coming into the county is spent each month in local businesses for food, clothing, shelter, and other essentials. In this way, the benefits have a stabilizing effect on the local economy."

Tate forecast that the number of social security beneficiaries will continue to increase in the future, but at a much slower rate than in the past ten years. He said that, nationally, the social security benefit rolls increased from about 5 million people in 1954 to more than 19 million at the end of 1963. This rapid growth in the beneficiary population resulted from major amendments to the Social Security Act from 1950 to 1961. He cited several amendments which extended social security coverage to self-employed business and professional men, farmers and agricultural workers, and other groups. As a result, several million people whose work was brought under social security are now receiving benefits.

One change—lowering the age at which older people can get benefits from 65 to 62—accounts for 1.8 million out of the 19 million now entitled to benefits. The amendments also introduced a new protection under social security—disability benefits—and 1.5 million disabled workers and their dependents now receive benefits under the disability provisions of the law.

If automation is wisely planned it will create jobs rather than eliminate them.

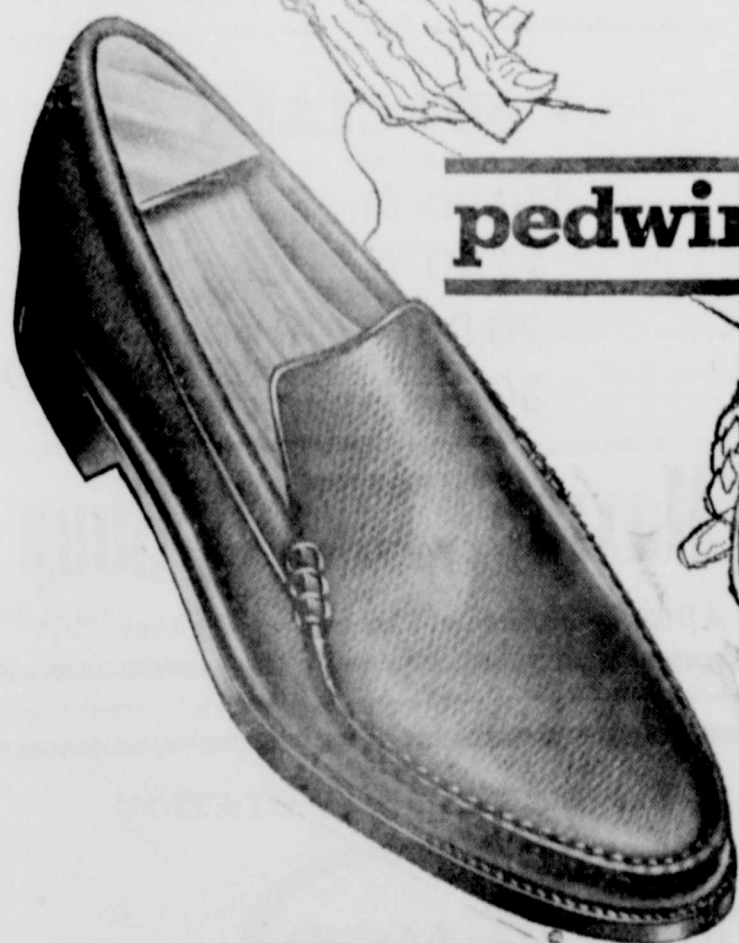
