242 votes cast in Newcastle box; Larimore high man

Voters turned out Saturday to bring up a total of 242 votes in the Newcastle box. This was due in part to the Commissioners' race, as two of the candidates were former residents of Newcastle and reared in this community.

In the race for Commissioner Precinct 3, Larimore led the field with a vote of 109; Bishop came in second with 91 votes, and Self the incumbent, garnered 44.

Junior high kittens win district track championship

Lead by sprinter hurdler Preston Pitts the little Junior High Kittens won the district championship last Wednesday afternoon at the Bobcat track. The Kittens not only won but almost doubled second place Throckmorton. The Kittens had 146 points to Throckmorton's 75. Woodson had 64, Bryson 44, Windthorst 30.

Pitts was by far the top point getter. He had 43 points for his days work and four first place ribbons and one second. Pitts won the 100 yard dash in 11.2 (p), won the 70 yard hurdles in 10.1, won the broad jump with a jump of 16' 8 1/2", was second in the high jump with a leap of 5' even. Pitts also anchored the record breaking 880 yard relay team. Pitts was given the baton about 15 yards ahead of Naol of Throckmorton, and easily beat him by 25 yards for a new meet record of 1:48.1. The old record was 1:51.1. Other team members on the record breaking relay team were Claud Kinser, Leon Parsons, Danny Casteel.

Casteel had a good day also, picking up 23 points by a first in the pole vault at 8' 8" and in the hurdles and the relay.

Leon Parson picked up 28 points by winning the 330 in a time of 43.3. He ran a leg of both relays and was second in the broad jump and fifth in the high jump.

For Better Farm Living

On farm or in town, you'll find yourself "ace high" with your youngsters if you build them the handyman project we're outlining today—a playhouse!

The playhouse we have in mind is comparatively easy to build utilizing 1x2, 2x2, and 2x4 boards for framework and 1/2-inch tempered hardboard for wall and roof panels. The playhouse has a height of 5 1/2 feet to the peak of its gable, is 6 feet 3/4 inches long and 4 feet wide, with interior area of approximately 25 square feet. It has windows on all sides for adequate ventilation during hottest weather and the windows can be covered with wire screening if you desire.



This easy-to-build playhouse will make a big hit with your youngsters. Free plans available.

Be sure you make the ground perfectly level for the playhouse base before erection. Pre-assemble wall and roof panels by making the support frames from 1x2s and 2x2s and nailing the tempered hardboard sections, cut to size, to their individual frameworks. Make the base of similar boards and mount the hardboard floor on the base.

Playhouse assembly then is a matter of screwing the bottom part of each wall panel frame to the base with 2 1/2-inch lag screws and bolting the wall panels to each other at the sides with 1/2-inch by 2-inch carriage bolts. Roof assembly is comparable to the wall panel process.

Use crosscut or combination semi-high speed or high speed steel blade in cutting the tempered hardboard panels to size with your portable electric saw. You'll save time in drilling bait holes and pre-drilling screw holes by using an electric drill, for you'll have lots of assemblies to make. Put the finishing touches on edges and surfaces of the playhouse with your electric sander before applying paint.
