Rolling Plains Wagon Train to be at Fort Belknap June 4-5-6 Giant Jamboree to Serenade Wagon Train June 4-5

People of Newcastle and Fort Belknap area sponsoring Giant Jamboree

On the evening of June 4-5, the folks of Newcastle and Fort Belknap area will play host to the Rolling Plains Wagon Train, and will sponsor a giant Jamboree on the grounds of the historic old fort on the Brazos River. The Jamboree will feature entertainers from Young, Archer, Cooke, Wichita and Jack counties. Both evenings' festivities start at 8 o'clock and spectators are cordially invited to come early and stay late.

JUNE 4th JAMBOREE

Entertainers will serenade the Wagon Train members and visiting entertainers already booked for this gigantic jamboree include: The Lowack Instrumentalists; the Charleston exhibitionists from Archer City, Miss Connie Atchley and Charles Brock; Shumaker Westernaires and a Barbershop Quartette from Wichita Falls; Keith and Kenneth Aulds, imitators and impersonators from Carrollton and Archer City; a musical combo made up of college students from Gainesville Junior College and several individual musical numbers make up the open air program for the evening. The Jamboree will come to a close with a Grand Finale of all musicians on the program during the evening. This Jamboree should be the biggest thing the old fort has seen since her days of occupation by the Cavalry.

Newcastle and Belknap folk invite the visitors to wear their western and frontier clothing to any all activities during the Wagon Train's encampment at the fort.

JUNE 5th

The open air Jamboree on the evening of the 5th will feature western and folk music by Young County entertainers. During the afternoon hours on Friday from 3 to 5 p. m., Mr. Delbert Thompson will have all Wagon Train Mules hitched to ropes and all will be in a horse-shoe shape. This is for the benefit of visitors who wish to photograph all mules during their stay at the fort.

If you wish to have a full evening of entertainment on both June 4th and 5th then come to the Fort and you will not be disappointed. The grounds will be well lighted for this occasion and a stage platform has been constructed for the Jamboree. Make your plans now to be there—because you can't afford to miss this "big doings."

Terrell, 76, a retired oil lease broker and life long resident of True and Newcastle, with Rev. Don Campbell, pastor of First Christian Church in Olney, officiating, assisted by Rev. Rev. R. D. Williams, pastor of Newcastle Baptist Church and Rev. E. C. Hewitt, pastor of Newcastle Methodist Church.

George Terrell passed away in the Olney Hamilton Hospital at 1 a. m. Friday, May 22, 1964. He had been ill for a week. Burial was in the True Cemetery with Lunn Funeral Home of Olney in charge of the arrangements.

Pallbearers were: Modrel Watson, Woodrow Taack, Owen Livingston, Bosley Larimore, Wilfred Watson and Luther Larimore.

George Anderson Terrell was born October 26, 1887, near True. He was the son of the late George W. and Nannie Penn Terrell, a prominent and pioneer family in

the True community. George Terrell was married January 5, 1913, to the former Dora Watson, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Watson, prominent early day settlers of the True community, at the home of her parents. She preceded him in death June 18, 1959.

He united with the First Christ Church at an early age. He was an active member of the Fort Belknap Genealogical Society. George was a progressive citizen and was always behind any progressive movement for the betterment of the community in action and deeds. He was an optimist, never looking at the dark side, being cheerful and congenial at all time, and generous to his fellow man.

Survivors are one son, Wendall Terrell, and one granddaughter, Deborah Jane Terrell, of Newcastle; two sisters, Mrs. E. H. Remington of Newcastle, and Mrs. C. G. Watson of Breckenridge; two brothers, W. P. Terrell of Graham, and Lloyd Terrell of Wichita Falls.

Civil War Centennial to be celebrated at the Fort on Saturday June 6th

The Rolling Plains Wagon Train is coming to Fort Belknap June 4. The train leaves Olney Thursday morning and will be met at the City limits by City officials and Proffitt Riding club as an escort to Fort Belknap. The caravan will stop in Newcastle at the City Hall; where they will be greeted Mayor Horace Morgan and others. Refreshments will be served by the town merchants in appreciation, and hearty welcome to Newcastle and Fort Belknap.

The escort will direct thru the south wagon gate for their three day camp at Fort Belknap. A welcoming committee will be on hand to greet them, including Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Thompson who are providing a home for the mules during their stay.

The Fort Belknap Historical Society is giving a reception Thursday from 3 to 5 p. m. in the Fort dining room. Everyone both men, women, boys and girls are invited to join in this gesture of friendship and goodwill. Visiting and getting better acquainted will be the diversion of the afternoon. All may come and go at their convenience.

A music festival will be held both Thursday and Friday night.

Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Hipp have designated June 5 as Ladies Pioneer Day and the train group will direct the crowning of a Queen and selection of her Court at a coffee in the dining room from 9:30 to 11:30. The Queen's Court will be selected from descendants of pioneer families of the area, and will reign thruout the day. They will be mounted on parade June 6 for the YCHSC Centennial Civil War Observance, which will celebrate ending of Civil War. Assisting will be the TSHSC and the Fort Belknap Historical Society. Registration begins at 9:30 as parade forms. Program begins at 10 a. m. with a military opening by a unit of the Texas National Guard under command of 1st Lt. Hill. Civil War will be the theme of the program in song, word, and a skit of the Elm Creek Indian raid. Judge Thompson will give welcome address and be master of ceremonies.

A group from the TSHSC, including Dr. Rupert N. Richardson of Abilene, will be present and have charge dedicating two Memorial Markers, Camp Belknap, and one in memory of Col. W. C. Young, for whom Young County is named. Others appearing on the program will be Rev. Hubert Foust, Mrs. Ben G. Oneal, Dr. Kenneth F. Neighbours, Mrs. Horace Ledbetter, Zebbie Bar-B Que of the Wagon Train will serve dinner from the Chuckbox of the train at \$1.25 a plate. Reservations can be made with Clarence Daniels at Farmers National Bank, Newcastle. A pilgrimage to all places of interest in the afternoon will be made including a visit to the old Fort Belknap Cemetery one-half mile east of the fort.

Mrs. Mable Wells is the mother of seven boys and two girls also a grandmother to 23, and great-grandmother to 8. She describes herself as just a house wife and mother, whose home has always been headquarters for all the kinfolks and friends—and still is. Her husband died several years ago.

The daughter of Ada (Dial) and William Young Crane, she was born in Hunt County. The family moved to Floyd county in 1903, and learning of this move she vowed she was going to catch a Cowboy.

Shortly after the family had settled in their new home, she met a good looking young rancher, Hawes Wells. They "went together" pretty steady until he sold out and moved back to his former home in Proffitt. They corresponded the following seven or eight years until she came to help her aging grandparents in Mineral Wells, Texas. Young Mr. Wells lost no time in making the journey to call on her. He would make this trip via horseback, which meant staying over night on the trip, usually at Finis.

Three months later, Jan. 17, 1909, they were married at the home of an Aunt. They boarded the train for their future home at Proffitt. The train "took the long way home" necessitating an overnight stay in Ft. Worth. Arriving in Graham the following day they went immediately to the livery stable where Mr. Wells had left his team and wagon. He hauled a load of oats to Graham as he started this trip, sold them to have money for a housekeeping outfit and a supply of groceries. They bought a cook stove, second-hand table and bed and drove to Proffitt.

Their honeymoon cottage was a one room house with a lean-to. Water had to be hauled in barrels on a slide or wagon from the tank. She has only in the last few years learned that peo-

ple had to have two baths per day. "I wasn't extravagant with dish water either, and of course the old No. 8 wash tub served for bathing." This house had a dirt floor which wasn't so bad as it did not have to be scoured. "I was as happy and proud of this home as modern brides are of all the push buttons, and fine new furniture," she added.

She joined the Proffitt Baptist Church in 1910 and has always been an active member. At times she plays the piano or leads the congregation in song. She has also been a member of the Proffitt HD Club for about a quarter of a century.

In addition to rearing nine children, she cared for an aunt, Mrs. Mollie Denton and her mother Mrs. Ada Crane for 16 years. Mrs. Crane passed away in January of this year, and Aunt Mollie is in a convalescent home. The big 10 or 12 room house is lonely and quiet now, and she couldn't bear it if her brother, Morris Crane did not live with her. She is active in every way and misses having someone dependent upon her. She has just finished removing many coats of paint and restor-

ing the beautiful brass bed which was bought the day after her marriage.

Recently Mrs. Wells and her brother visited relatives in Houston for a few days. This was the first time in 55 years her house had been vacant overnight. She buys a new Buick every year or two and drives anywhere she wants to go.

She is deeply religious, possessing the gift of wit which makes her a joy to be with. Outspoken and frank she does not hesitate, nor is she afraid to express her opinion of others or any subject, but has respect for another's opinion. 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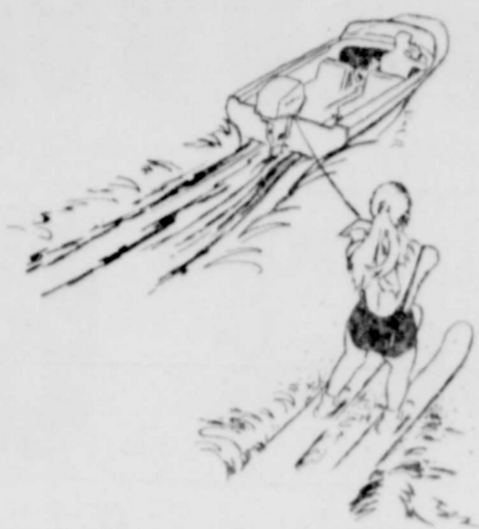

Annual three day Rodeo at Olney begins June 1

Presence of the Rolling Plains Wagon Train from Spearman will be a highlight of the 17th annual three day rodeo at Olney, June 1, 2, 3.

The train's widely-publicized 500 mile trip from Spearman to Graham, will bring it to Olney the afternoon of Tuesday, June 2, and it will be a part of the traditional Kid Day Parade, slated at 4 p. m. The train will remain here for the Tuesday and Wednesday night performances of the rodeo.

Launching the 1964 edition of the three day celebration will be the big street parade at 5 p. m. Monday, June 1, featuring floats, riding clubs, bands and other colorful entries. Supper will be served by a caterer at Olney's Tom Griffin Park between parade and rodeo time.

The rodeo grand entry is scheduled at 7:45 p. m.

Activities the second day, Tuesday, June 2, will include a junior rodeo at 9 a. m., the kids parade featuring the Wagon Train at 4:30 p. m., chuck wagon supper at the Wagon Train, and the rodeo performance.

On Wednesday, June 3, the West Central Texas Cutting Horse Association will conduct a cutting horse contest, with competition beginning at 1 p. m. at the Olney Livestock arena. The cutting horse finals will be during the evening rodeo performance.

The Possum Kingdom Drill-ettes of Graham will set the pivots for the 8 o'clock grand entry Wednesday night.

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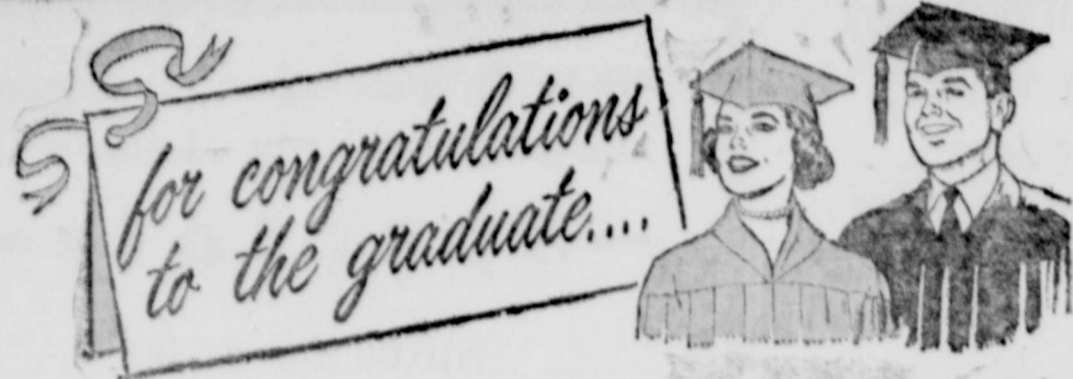

HISTORICAL MEDALLION DISPLAYED AT FORT BELKNAP DURING GENEALOGICAL MEETING MAY 16

Mrs. Blanche William Bogan of Fort Worth made available for display on May 16th meeting, the famous President Monroe Medallion.

The medallion was taken from the body of Chief Little Buffalo, a Comanche Indian, during the October 13, 1864, battle fought on several ranches in Young County between ranchers, Rangers, and the Indians. It was taken by Sam Williams, a young rancher and Indian Fighter of the Fort Belknap area. The medallion bearing the profile bust view of President James Monroe is some four inches in diameter, and is on the heavy chain that was worn around the neck of Little Buffalo.

Sam Williams, older brother of the late Henry C. Williams Sr., recovered it from the dead Indian's body and it has been among the Williams' family treasures for 100 years. It is still one of their most valuable items. Mrs. Bogan is the daughter of the late S. P. J. Williams of Newcastle, and the great-niece of Sam Williams.

Mrs. Horace Ledbetter, who read a paper on the battle, as told by Henry C. Williams Sr., was called upon to show the medallion and tell its story to the audience in attendance at the Genealogical meeting. This display of the medallion was a highlight of the meeting.

The year 1964, 100th anniversary of the battle, was a very appropriate time for Mrs. Bogan to make the medallion available.

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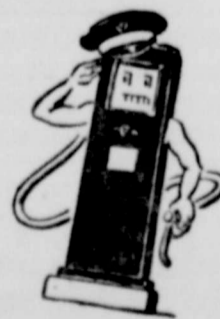
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
