Survey of Graves Newcastle Cemetery being made

A fifteen page survey of all graves and tombstone inscriptions in the Newcastle Cemetery has been made by Mrs. Barbara Ledbetter. Mrs. Ledbetter placed all recorded information in the Fort Belknap Archives and also left a mimeographed copy of all survey information with Mrs. Thetus Routon, city secretary, at the city hall, and the Newcastle Register office.

This piece of survey material will be used by the Newcastle Cemetery Association to help contact folks interested in the continued upkeep of the cemetery.

Some unmarked graves in the Newcastle cemetery have been identified by relatives, and Mrs. Ledbetter recorded such information. Many graves are still unmarked and unidentified. If any readers of the Register have knowledge of information about unmarked graves in the cemetery, please go by the City Hall or Register office and give such information to them in order that it may be recorded and added to the survey.

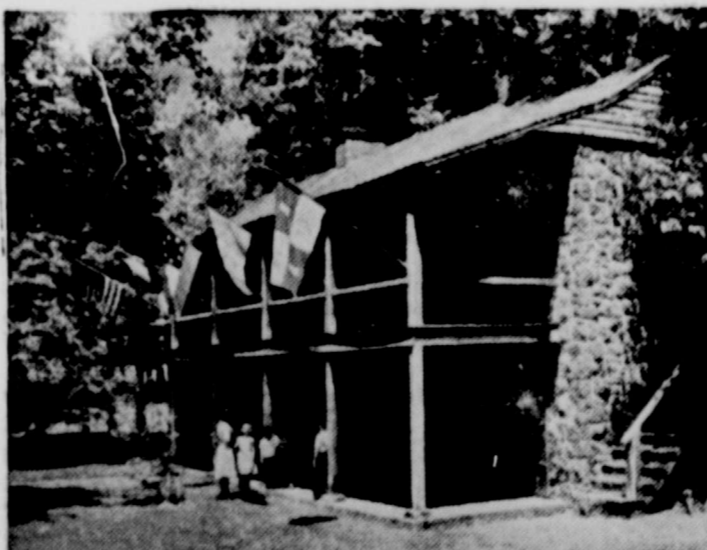
The couple will spend their honeymoon in Colorado Springs. For her traveling outfit, Mrs. Engelking chose a white lace suit with pink accessories.

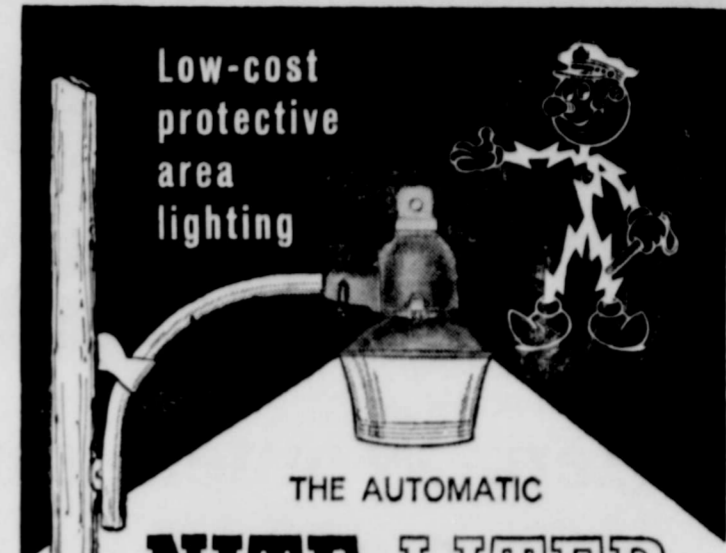

District Attorney Jack Q. Neal is prosecutor in the case and John C. Moore of Mineral Wells is representing the defendant.

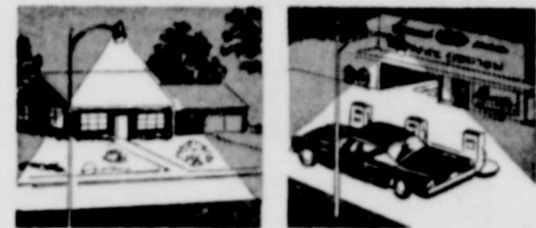

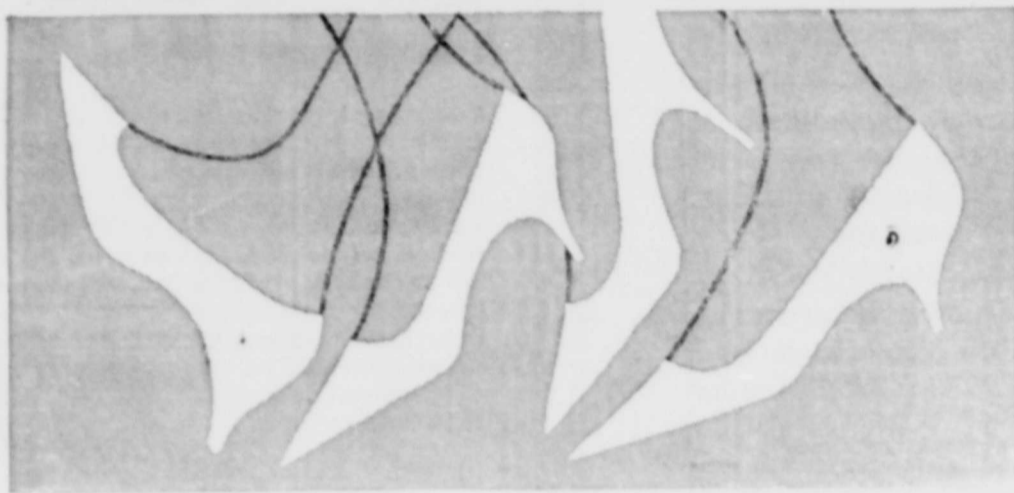

Operation Motorcide

While the drivers of Texas are making plans for 4th of July trips, the Texas Department of Public Safety is getting ready for "Operation Motorcide," a three day vigil of tabulating all traffic deaths in the state. Major Harry Hutchison, Regional Commander of this area for the DPS, reported today the State is approaching the midpoint in the year amid definite indications that traffic deaths will hit an all time high again in 1964.

"If we continue to take lives at the present rate, 1964 will become the most deadly year in Texas history for traffic fatalities," he said. "Motorcides" at this time are over 150 more than at the same time last year, and considering the trend of increased accidents and casualties, we have every reason to expect that traffic deaths will exceed the previous all time high in Texas of 27.9 in 1963.

Traffic deaths this year have consistently been in excess of fifteen percent over 1963, an indication that over 3000 lives will be lost on our streets and highways this year.

Operation Motorcide will be placed in effect from 12:01 a. m. July 3rd and continue through 11:59 p. m. July 5.
