## Bobcats Trounce Windthorst 24-0

The little Newcastle Bobcats got the football season off to a good start with a 24-0 win over the Windthorst Trojans.

The Cats gave away about 12 pounds per man, but with the fine play selection of QB John Tomlinson moved for a touchdown the first time they got the ball. Tomlinson moved the ball to the Trojan 25 with the belly option and dive plays, and Hulse made the last 25 yards on the TB power sweep.

The Cats stopped the Trojans after three plays and on fourth down Windthorst punted, and returned 22 yds. out to the Cats 42 yard line as the first quarter ended. A Hulse pass to Jack Clayton covered 34-yards and a Bobcats TD early in the period.

The Cats recovered a Trojan fumble at the Windthorst 49. After a five yard penalty Tomlinson hit Hulse with a 30-yard pass and Hulse traveled the last 20 for a touch-

down. With time about gone in the first half, Hulse hit on the dive play, and broke for the side line, and with Terry Creel and Jack Clayton giving key blocks, went 70-yds. for the final TD. The Cats failed at each point attempt.

The last half was all Windthorst, with the Trojans taking the opening half kickoff and going to the Cats 25. The Cats defense held, but fumbled the ball back to the Trojans. The defense held again, but the Cats fumbled on the first play again, and once again the defense held. The Trojans intercepted a Cat pass at the Cat 30-yard line, and the defense stopped Windthorst on the 19-yard line. The entire third period and four minutes of the fourth was played between the Bobcats 35 and 15 yard line. During that time the Cats had the ball only four offensive plays, but Windthorst made only three first downs during that time.

With seven minutes left the Cats moved to the Trojans 18 yard line, the big play being Freshman TB Preston Pitts 25 yard romp. The little Cats did a fine job containing Windthorst's two fine big backs, Melvin Pennantz, 180 pound TB, and Leslie Conrady, 190 pound FB.

The Cats had several outstanding defensive boys. Alton Beckham had a great night with five solo tackles and seven assists. Alton is the biggest Bobcat at 160 pounds.

Other defensive standouts, Tackle John Taack, Guard Wayne Fields and James

Walker, Linebackers Mike Mitchell and Harold Whiteley, and End Jim Mitchell.

Word has been received here that Mrs. Fred Webb, 47, and her mother, Mrs. Rube Griffith, 70, died from injuries received in a two car collision two miles west of Monahans at the intersection of Hwy. 80 and Interstate 20. The accident occurred at 7:50 p. m. Sunday and the victims died about 10 p. m.

Fred Webb, 50, who lives in Pecos, and his father-in-law, Rube Griffith, 70, were seriously injured. Webb suffered a broken arm, dislocated knee and abrasions. Griffith suffered multiple fractures and lacerations. Both men are reported in fair condition.

Fred Webb, a Newcastle native, is the son of Mrs. H. P. Moore, and a brother of Mrs. Johnny Hughes, both of whom live in Newcastle. Mr. and Mrs. Rube Griffith and Mrs. Fred Webb were also former citizens of this community.

Funeral services for Mrs. Fred Webb were held at Pecos at 10 a. m. Wednesday. The body will be brought to Rising Star where it will lie in state until after the funeral.

## Water Rates Raised to help meet cost

The City Council held their regular meeting Monday night and the main discussion of the evening was the water situation, the cost of hauling and other means of providing water for the community.

The City Lake is completely dry and this town will be without its own water supply until sufficient rains fill the lake again. An emergency exists and it is up to the people of this community to cooperate and be as conservative as possible with water in order to keep the rates down.

Monday night the Council set the rate at \$6.00 for a minimum of 2000 gallons, and \$3.00 for each additional 1000 gallons used. This rate will not meet the actual cost of hauling. The Council also discussed the feasibility of buying a truck and hauling water themselves, which to us seems to be the best way out, as it would cut the cost of hauling considerably.

We have been informed that some people are still using water like we had a lake full, and some are still keeping livestock on their premises. It takes lots of water for cows and horses that could go for human consumption. If possible, they should be moved some place out of town. Removal of all fowls and livestock from the city will remove the intermediary host or reservoir, for any encephalitis bearing mosquitoes that might be lurking in some stagnated water hole, tin can or weeds.

The co-operation of the entire citizenship is needed to make the burden as light as possible on everyone concerned. This is no time for quibbling.

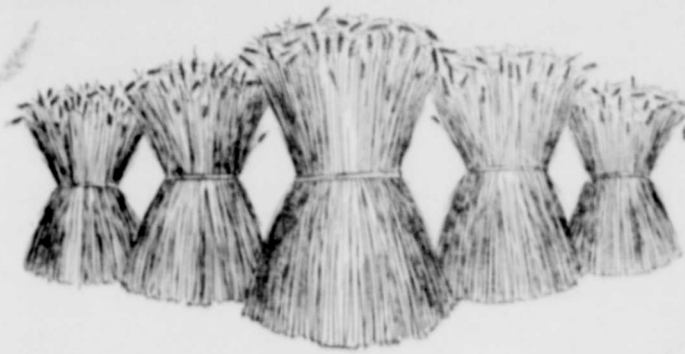

A Service Of The Thor Research Center For Better Farm Living

On farm or in town, you'll find yourself "ace high" with your youngsters if you build them the handyman project we're outlining today—a playhouse!

The playhouse we have in mind is comparatively easy to build utilizing 1x2, 2x2, and 2x4 boards for framework and 5/8-inch tempered hardboard for wall and roof panels. The playhouse has a height of 5 1/2 feet to the peak of its gable, is 8 feet 3/4 inches long and 4 feet wide, with interior area of approximately 25 square feet. It has windows on all sides for adequate ventilation during hottest weather and the windows can be covered with wire screen or if you desire.



This easy-to-build playhouse will make a big hit with your youngsters. Free plans available.

Be sure you make the ground perfectly level for the playhouse base before erection. Pre-assemble wall and roof panels by making the support frames from 1x2s and 2x2s and nailing the tempered hardboard sections, cut to size, to their individual frameworks. Make the base of similar boards and mount the hardboard floor on the base.

Playhouse assembly then is a matter of screwing the bottom part of each wall panel frame to the base with 2 1/2-inch lag screws and bolting the wall panels to each other at the sides with 3/8-inch by 2-inch carriage bolts. Roof assembly is comparable to the wall panel process.

Use crosscut or combination semi-high speed or high speed steel blade in cutting the tempered hardboard panels to size with your portable electric saw. You'll save time in drilling bolt holes and pre-drilling screw holes by using an electric drill, for you'll have lots of assemblies to make. Put the finishing touches on edges and surfaces of the playhouse with your electric sander before applying paint.
