Johnson Sweeps Nation Young County in Demo Column

Lynden B. Johnson and H. H. Humphrey were swept into the office of President and Vice-President, over their Republican opponents, by one of the biggest votes in the history of this nation.

The campaign was bitter, but the people have spoken in no uncertain terms of the leadership they desired. The new president has called for unity that this nation might go forward in peace and prosperity.

All of the Democratic candidates carried Young County by overwhelming majorities. The Newcastle box gave the Democratic ticket a big majority. The vote in Newcastle box follows:

THE VOTE IN YOUNG COUNTY

Breaking a 40-year old total vote record, Young County gave Johnson-Humphrey ticket 3,395 to 1,600 for Goldwater-Miller. The vote was 5,175.

Yarborough 3,073, Bush 1,930; Purcell 3,454, Corse 1,567; Connally 3,802 Crichton 1,135; Preston Smith 3,785, Houston 1,110; Carr 3,834, Trice 1,130. All three amendments carried.

Resident of Young County for 75 years



Aunt Fannie Steadham

In Cedar Hill, Dallas County, Texas, December 9, 1882, was born Sarah Francis Dollins Steadham. "Aunt Fannie" as she is affectionately known, came to Young County at the age of seven. She has remained and for the last 22 years has lived in Newcastle.

Fannie is the daughter of Theodore and Mary Jane (Hendricks) Dollins, and the granddaughter of James and Pamela Dollins, who all resided for many years in Dallas county. Mary Jane Hendricks was born in Arcadia, Mo.

During the Civil War many interesting and unusual things happened. One of those unusual things occurred in Aunt Fannie's family. James Dollins "signed up" as a volunteer for service in the war although he had a family. The day came for his departure for the war and his youthful son, Theodore Dollins, reported for duty in his father's place. He fought with the Confederacy and came home with only one injury, a bullet in his left arm, and it was never removed. James and Pamela, who were farmers, are buried in the Indian Mound Cemetery.

Sarah Francis Dollins married Edward Cornelius Steadham on December 26, 1905. Ed Steadham was born January 13, 1877, at Forrestburg, Montague County, Texas. His father, Benjamin Steadham was a farmer. He had brothers: Eli, Edward, Howell, Park, and sisters: Duskey, Nina, Rhoda and Delia.

Sarah Francis' sister was Mary Elizabeth Dollins. Her brothers were William Riley (married Annie Price), Charles Thomas (married Cora Rose), and John Henry (married Cora Fields).

Aunt Fannie has spent many hours piecing quilts and reading her Bible. She has read the Bible through three times and comments that her daily reading of the Bible has given her inspiration. "I would not want to live if I didn't have my Bible," she quips. She has been a member of the Baptist Church and the Dollins' have been Baptist "as long as anyone can remember." Her husband was Presbyterian but later joined the Baptist Church where he became a deacon.

Commenting on politics, Aunt Fannie stated that the death of President Roosevelt hurt her deeply, and that President Kennedy's death "broke her heart. I have been a life-long democrat and if I live until November I

plan to vote accordingly. I love my country."

Aunt Fannie is the mother of nine children—the first died in infancy. Harry Franklin, Edgar Herman, Wm Paul, Author "Doc" Weems, Theodore Benjamin (deceased), Roy and Coy (twins) and Henry Clay. She has 17 grandchildren.

While talking with Aunt Fannie, one can't help but immediately notice a kind, courteous and friendly attitude. My thoughts continue to be that everyone in America ought to have the privilege to sit or rock awhile, talk awhile, and laugh awhile with the elderly folk in Newcastle. Their intelligence, their sense of humor, their wholesome outlook and their attitudes of life in retrospect, are something to be envied by the whole world. They are humble; they are plain; they are good Christians. Most of them sum their life with the comment, "I have had a good life. We never had much, but we had happiness." Aunt Fannie is one of those.—BNL.

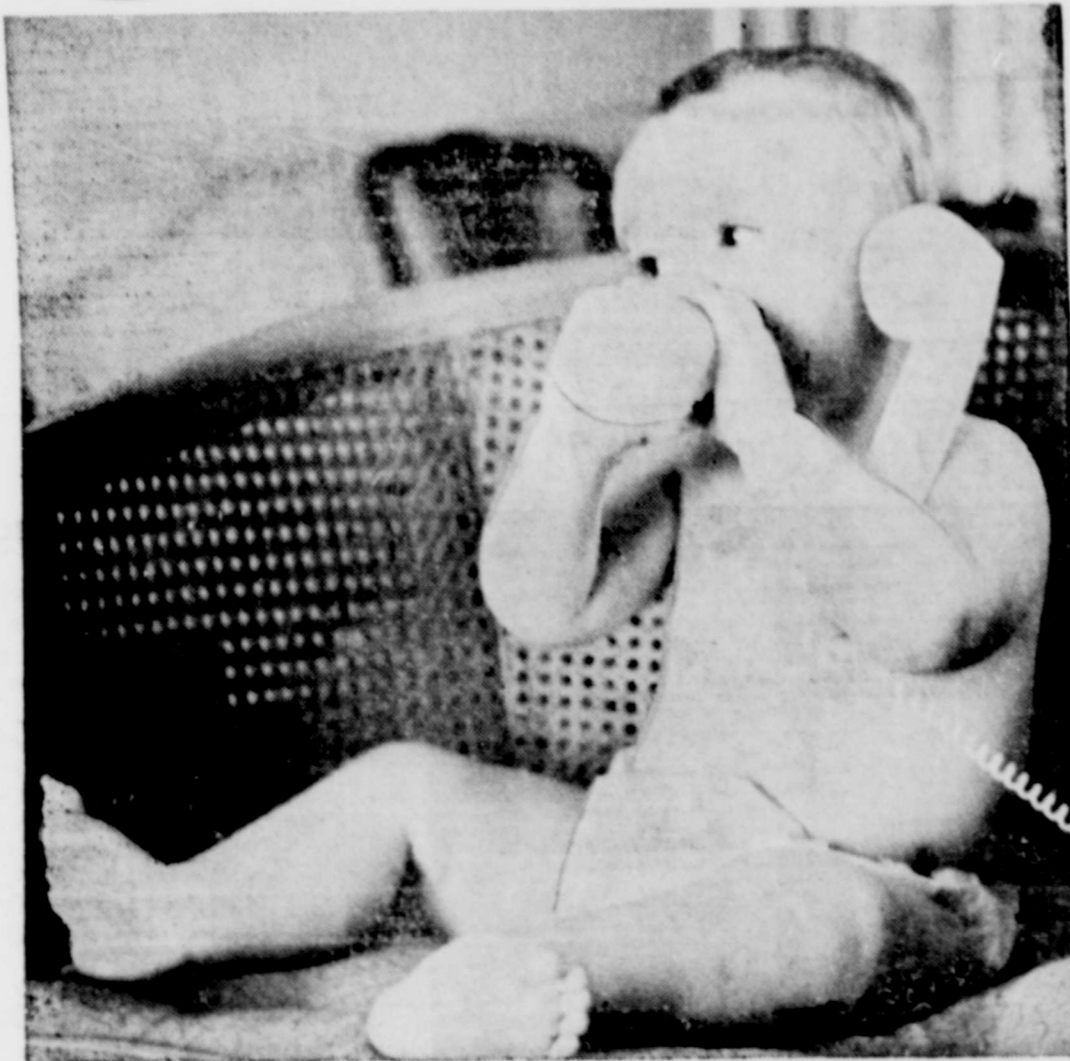
Olney theaters under new management

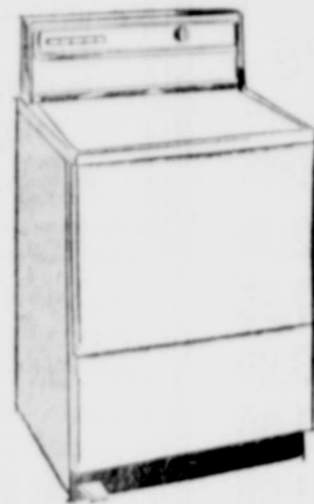
