DEAR MISTER EDITOR:

The Superintendent of documents final got around to sending us that book on babysitting. Red Ewing brought it to the country store Saturday night and all the fellers was agreed it was well worth the \$5,280 it cost the taxpayers to get it wrote.

Newcastle Bobcats and Throckmorton Dominate 7-B All-District Team

The Newcastle Bobcats and Throckmorton Greyhounds set the pace in District 7-B All-Star selections. The Bobcats had seven, the Hounds seven, Lockett five and Valley View five, on the 24 man squad.

The team was led by Newcastle's Donnie Hulse, who was named to both the offense and defense team. Hulse was the leading ground gainer in the district and leading scorer. He gained 1598 yards rushing which was a new school record and scored 126 points in just nine games. Hulse was the only man named to both teams. He is a 160 pound senior. Two other Cats were placed on the offense team. John Taack, the Bobcats strong side tackle was also named. Taack was also Field Captain and offensive line leader for the Cats. He is a 155 pound senior. Jim Mitchell, the Bobcat's fine blocking pivot man was selected for the team. He was the smallest Center in the district, but was considered as the most vicious blocker in the district. Jim is a 135 lb. senior.

The Cats placed three men on the defense besides Hulse. Guard Wayne Fields, who is an offensive FB was selected. He is a 148 pound Soph. Both Bobcat linebackers were selected. They were without a doubt the toughest the toughest team to run against in the district. Both were fast, and both had desire. They are Harold Whiteley, 137 pound Junior, and Mike Mitchell, 136 pound Soph.

Hewett A. Ribble, 68, a retired driller and resident of Graham most of his life, died Friday in a Graham hospital, after suffering an apparent heart attack.

Ribble was born Oct. 22, 1896, in Bunger community, the son of the late pioneers, Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Ribble. He married Mesie Caudill Aug. 5, 1920, in Graham. He was a member of the Bunger Church of Christ and was a veteran of World War I.

Services were held 2 p. m. Sunday from Morrison Funeral Home Chapel with burial in Gooseneck south of Graham.

Survivors include the widow; a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Chastain, Graham; three brothers, O. C., Weatherford; Roy, Graham; C. B., Fort Worth; four sisters, Mrs. Lottie Askew, Graham; Mrs. Nellie Cunningham, Olney; Mrs. Margie Ragsdale California, Ethelene Ribble, Abilene, and five grandsons

R. E. Myers donates books to Olney library from U of T

Austin, Texas (Spl.) Olney Public Library, Olney, Tex., is among the public and school libraries receiving a set of selected University of Texas Press-published books under a program sponsored by the U. T. Ex Students' Association.

Mike Myers of Austin, a native of Olney, is giving the books in memory of his grandfather, R. E. Myers, a pioneer citizen of Olney.

Robert E. Myers arrived in Olney in 1896, at the age of 22. He had left Missouri with a round trip ticket to Texas, thinking it would be an interesting place to visit, but not to live. He recalled before his death in 1963, that the folks back East considered Texas to be pretty rough country when he was a young man. "I found out soon, tho, that I liked the people and atmosphere, so I never did use the other half of that roundtrip ticket," Myers said in a news story on the occasion of his 62nd wedding anniversary.

Myers married Sadie Hunt December 2, 1900. She had come to Olney with her family in 1890, when there was only one store and a few adventurous farm families.

Myers varied career included serving as Mayor of the town, as justice of the peace, city judge, city secretary, water superintendent, public weigher and manager of a cotton gin.

The donor of the books and grandson of the pioneer, Mike Myers, graduated from Olney High School in 1954. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Myers, still reside there, as do several other relatives. Young Myers, an administrative assistant to Governor John B. Connally, has obtained two degrees from the University of Texas, his BBA in 1959, and his LLB in 1963.

The collection donated by Myers, a member of the ex-students' association, includes 60 books dealing with Texas and the Southwest.

The "Texas Books for Libraries" program is part of the Ex-Students' Association continuing education program.

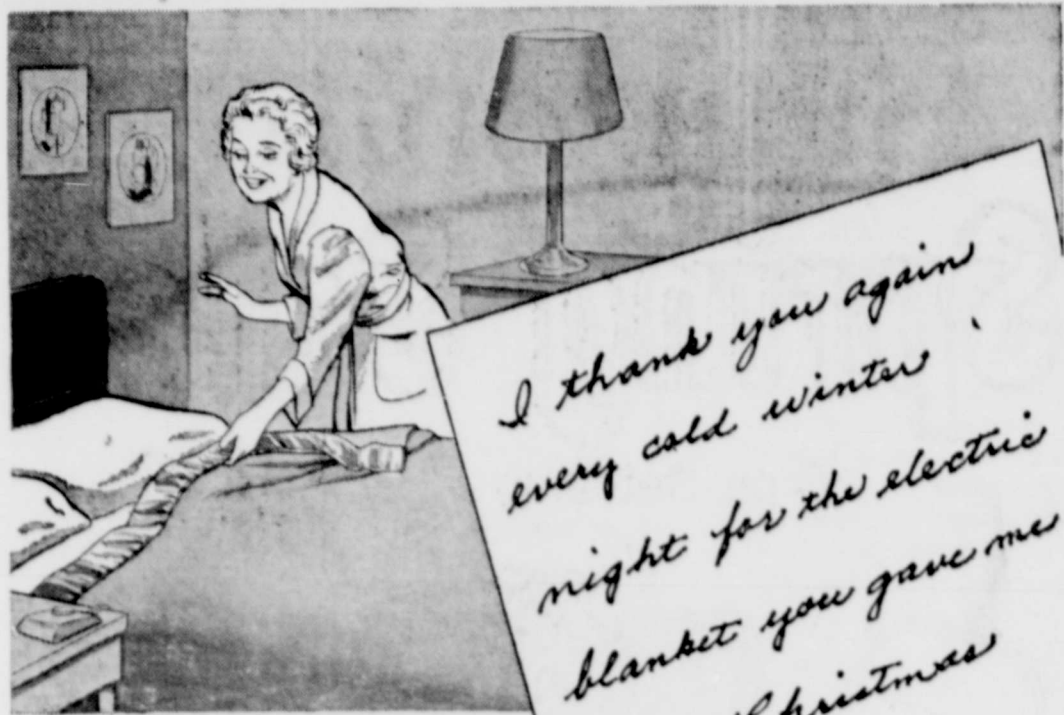
