## Donnie Hulse named on all-state



Eleven schools were represented on the first all-state Class B schoolboy football team ever selected by the Texas Sportswriters Association.

Donnie Hulse, Newcastle's splendid little tailback, has been named to the first all-state team that was selected by the Sportswriters Assn. Hulse is the first Bobcat to be elected to all state since the mid fifties.

Hulse led the little Bobcats to a 7.3 record this year. Donnie scored 124 points in his last year to set a new rushing record of 1,598 yards. Donnie also holds the four year record of 3,641 yards. He punted 27 times for an average of 42.5.

Donnie's college plans are indefinite. Several coaches and schools are interested in him. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Hulse.

Twenty other schools had players named to the second and third teams. Only one other player from this area named to one of the teams, Saint Jo end Tommy Arledge was picked on the third team.

Helm, a native of Wise county, was born August 15, 1887. Floyd Helm, brother of the late R. H. Helm, was formerly a citizen of Newcastle, and will be remembered by many of the old timers, who will regret to hear of his passing.

Rites were at the Episcopal Church in Henrietta with Rev. Warren Luce, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Hope Cemetery.

A native of Briar, Wise County, Helm had been a resident of Wise County most of his life. He was born August 15, 1887.

Helm received his 50-year pin as a Mason two years ago. He was a 32nd Degree Mason and a member of the Maskat Temple Shrine.

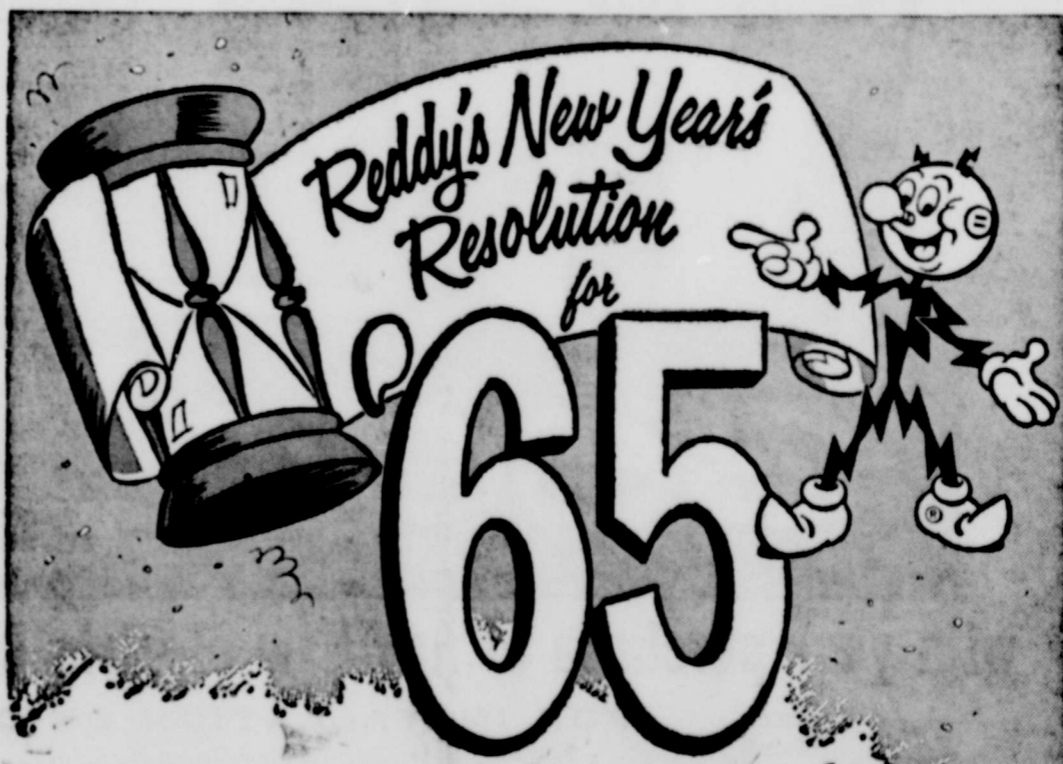

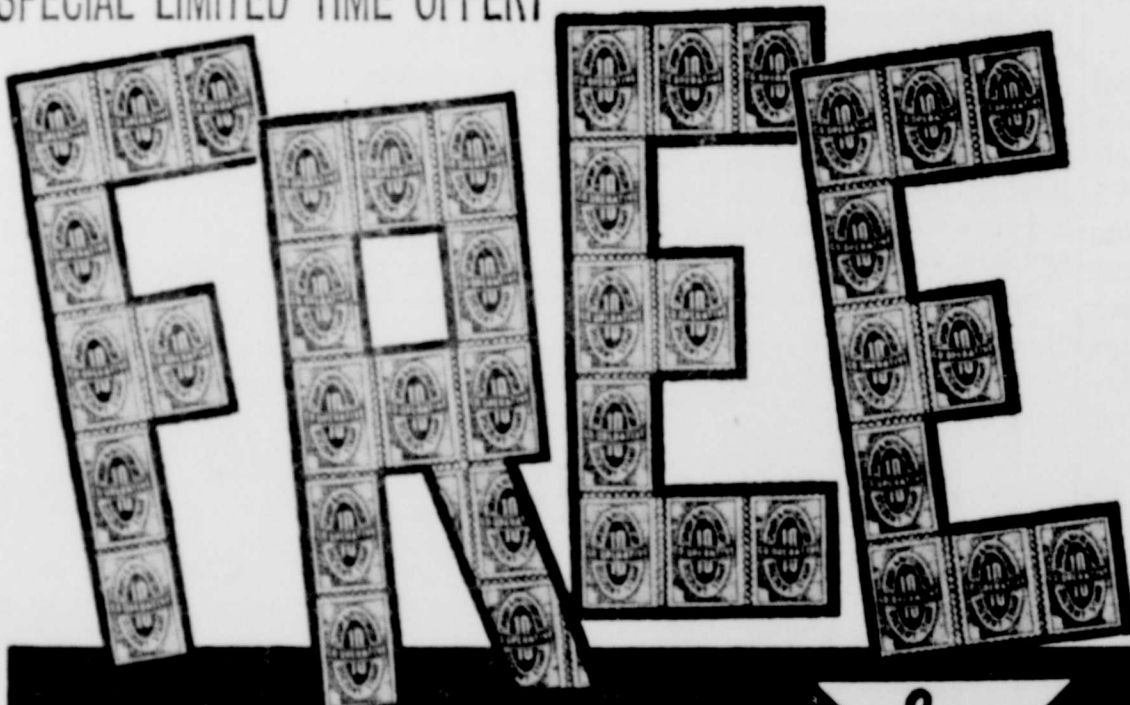

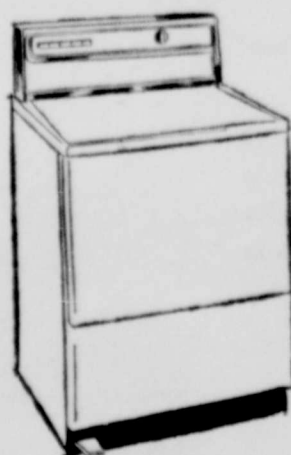
