Services were held at 2 p. m. Sunday in the South Side Baptist Church. Burial was in the Olney Cemetery under direction of Luna Funeral Home.

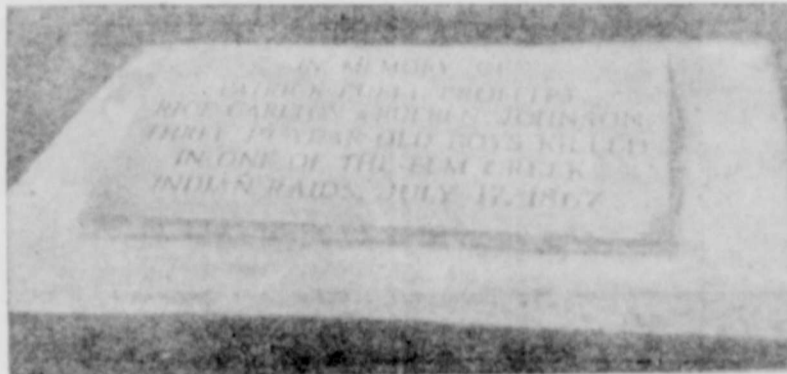

## State of Texas Now Recognizes the Site of "Little" Elm Creek Raid of 1867

The notorious Elm Creek raid of October, 1864, in Young County is often called the "Big" Elm Creek Raid and the raid on Elm Creek taking place on July 17, 1867, is usually referred to as the "Little" Elm Creek Raid. Nevertheless, a new memorial,

a state recognized marker, now appears on State Highway 24, about eight miles southwest of Newcastle, Texas.

The State of Texas, in an accelerated program toward historical markings, has issued a new marker for the site on the



highway closest to the spot where the engagement between the Indians and three 19 year old youths took place. The three youths were sons of area ranchers.

Wilbarger's Indian Depredations and McConnell's, The West Texas Frontier, handles the details of the battle in a handsome manner. In the final analysis, the youth's gave their lives in protection of the western frontier, and the State of Texas is now recognizing their heroism by issuing the marker.

Long before the state had historical markers on their program, a group of history minded citizens of the Proffitt com-

munity built a marker in honor of the three men. The marker has stood for many, many years on the highway, just across the highway, and a few feet east of the present location of the new marker. Their efforts in behalf of local history should not go unnoticed. They were members of the Kutch-Manning Pioneer Association.

The three youths were buried on the John W. Proffitt ranch and their graves in 1867 became the nucleus of the present Proffitt Cemetery.

The land where the battle took place is now on the Mutt Creel place, a few yards north of the Newcastle-Throckmorton highway.—BNL.

## Patrons asked to cooperate with rural route men

Postmaster Hankins today appealed to postal customers on rural routes to help their rural carriers make mail deliveries during bad winter weather.

The Newcastle postoffice has one rural route covering the area.

Mr. Hankins said at the same time he hopes all authorities concerned with rural routes where snow and other bad weather hampers the carriers will continue to cooperate to help the mailmen get through.

The postmaster listed these points of particular concern:

1. Approaches to rural mail boxes must be kept open by customers.

2. Obstructions to delivery of mail on rural routes should be removed or minimized to the fullest extent possible.

Where rural boxes pose a problem, the carrier may leave form 4056, "Your Mailbox Needs Attention," a notice to keep box approaches clear by promptly removing all obstructions, including snow, which may make mail delivery difficult or impossible.

Unless approaches are cleared, it may be necessary to temporarily withhold delivery of mail, the Postmaster pointed out.

Rural carriers are not required to perform service on foot when roads cannot be traveled with the vehicles normally used, but they are expected to make every reasonable effort to serve as many of their patrons as possible without physical exertion or added financial cost, he explained.

If excessive detours are necessary to effect delivery of mail, customers should temporarily relocate their boxes on the new line of travel, arrange to receive their mail through other patrons' boxes, or make other arrangements for their mail until travel on the roads affected can be resumed.

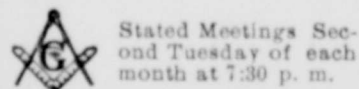

At a time when much is being heard about so-called "new" diseases, it is well to pause a moment and remember that some animal health problems which have been with us for a long time still are causing heavy losses to farmers.

One of these is calf scours. Although there still is no sure cure for the condition, there are a number of ways of treating this complex disease effectively.

Calf scours is most common among dairy calves, because of conditions under which they are commonly raised. It generally affects animals under two weeks old. While it is believed that there are many causes of the infection, the ones most often considered are faulty nutrition, poor management, and exposure to infectious bacteria.



Calf scours causes many losses among calves under two weeks of age.

Symptoms of calf scours depend on how acute the attack is. In very acute cases, calves only a few days old may be found in an apparent state of shock with cold muzzles, weak and rapid heartbeat and unable to stand. Death usually occurs before scouring begins. However, in less acute cases, calves are listless, stop eating and develop severe scours.

Unfortunately pneumonia may develop as a secondary infection in scours cases and this so-called pneumonia-enteritis complex often is fatal.

Veterinarians now have more tools than ever before to fight calf scours and this increases the chance of saving more animals. But very prompt action is important, so an immediate call to a veterinarian can often make a great difference.

Prevention also is important in dealing with this infection. Special attention should be given to management, pen sanitation, feeding and isolation of sick animals. Here, again, the veterinarian can be helpful in planning such a program on a sound basis.

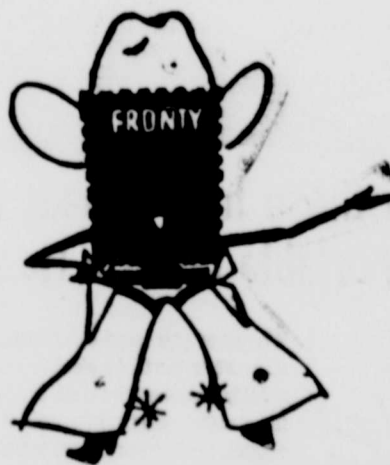
