14 more tombstones in Young County

There are 14 tombstones in Young County that were erected ahead of schedule for 1964. The stones mark the graves of persons who died in traffic accidents on rural highways in the county during the year.

But the suffering wasn't confined to those who were killed. The Department of Public Safety recorded 126 mishaps on rural highways in the county during 1964. Those accidents injured 89 persons and they spent countless days in the hospitals. Properly damage from these accidents amounted to \$103,450.00. During December there were six accidents on rural highways in the county according to Sgt. Frank Jirek. These crashes resulted in 4 persons injured and an estimated property damage loss of \$1,970.00.

Texas drivers have killed more people during 1964 than any other year in the state's history. The total may reach over 4,000.

Texas school lunch menus feature USDA beef and chicken

Texas schools participating in the national school lunch program have been allotted 8,022,000 lbs of frozen beef and 2,490,000 lbs of frozen chicken bought by the U. S. Department of Agriculture during 1964.

This represents Texas' share of the 51.9 million lbs of chicken and 178.5 million lbs of frozen beef purchased to help schools meet protein requirements for lunches served under the school lunch program.

The allotments will provide about 1 1/2 servings of beef per child per week, and 7 1/2 servings of chicken per child during this school year.

Around 3,320 schools operated cafeterias under the national school lunch program in 1964—the largest single feeding operation in the state. These cafeterias feed nearly 30 percent of the students enrolled in elementary and high schools.

Under the program, USDA contributes cash and foods accounting for about 1-5 of the cost. Children's meal payments make up around 60 percent of the cost and local and state sources pay the remaining 20 percent.

The State Education Agency will allocate the beef and chicken among Texas schools participating in the national school lunch program and the State Department of Public Welfare will make distribution.

A retired welder and machine shop owner, Sarsfield died at 7 p. m. Monday, in a Graham hospital.

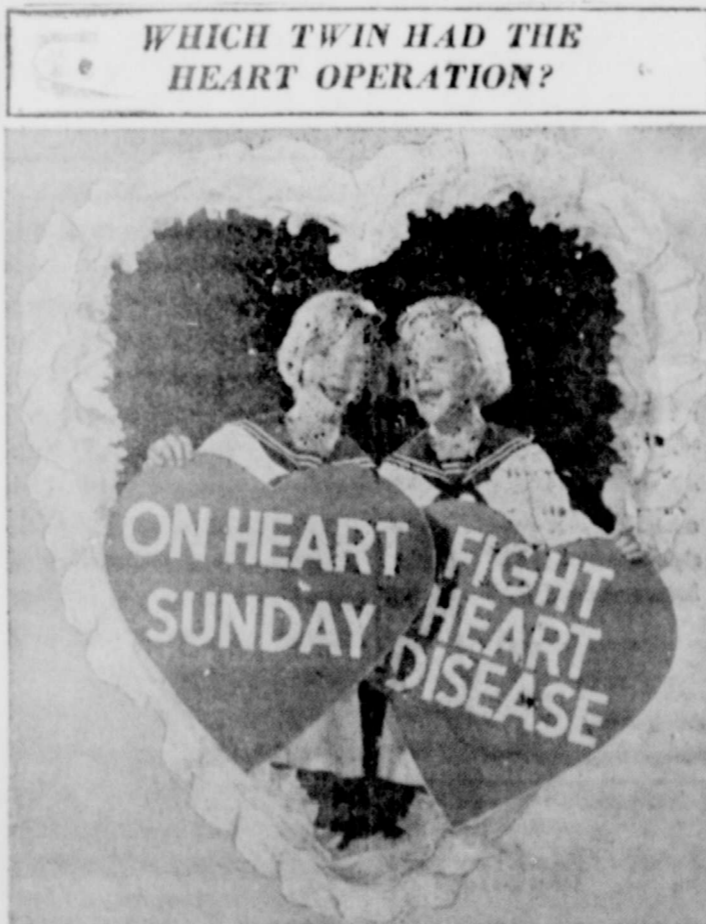

A reader who has been experiencing difficulty with slippage and inefficient operation on his tool grinder's V-belt says, "I never thought a V-belt could give trouble. What could be wrong to cause this sudden slipping? I'd appreciate any suggestions you may have."

V-belt drives require little attention for the most part but they do need occasional inspection for the following factors:

Keep the pulleys and belt free from oil, dirt, and grease by occasional cleaning. Make sure the belt has the right tension—from 1/4 to 3/4 inch for every foot of belt between the pulley shafts.



Correct tension will eliminate V-belt slipping and inefficient operation.

Check the pulley grooves to make sure they aren't bent or worn. Such pulleys wear out the belt rapidly. Check pulley alignment by placing a straightedge against the two pulleys. Make sure the alignment is as near perfect as possible.

Be sure the top (wide section) of the belt is flush with the top of the pulley. If the belt is so worn it is riding the bottom of the groove, it should be replaced. There should be clearance at the bottom of the pulley groove and bottom (narrow section) of the belt. If not, friction properties of the side of the groove and belt are lost and slipping can occur.

This looks like a long list but actually all of these factors can be checked in but a little time—and the checking should be done periodically to catch defects before slipping and inefficiency occurs.

Since V-belt drive mechanisms are widely used in general farm and home shop applications with portable motors, it is important to be alert to the simple rules of maintaining them.

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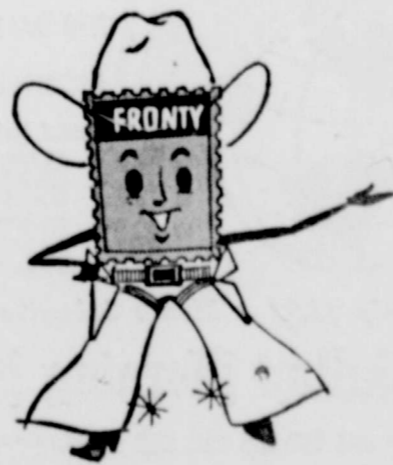
