Strong wind causes considerable damage

About 6:30 p. m. last Friday this community was hit by heavy winds, rain and some hail. The cloud came straight from the south with such force that considerable damage was left in its path.

TV arias were toppled, windows broken, awning lifted off, out houses or small barns completely destroyed, trailer houses destroyed, roofs ripped off, carports damaged, in fact so much it is not possible to identify each incident. The only good thing that can be said is, that it passed as quick as it came.

The storm was preceded by a dust storm accompanied by hail, and rain which overturned Mrs. Standifer's trailerhouse, demolished Julian Farmer's barn, rolled over a trailer at the school and almost every business house suffered some kind of damage. Tree limbs were scattered, and some blown down.

Considerable damage was reported in the Belknap community. No injuries have been reported.
