### Notice to livestock owners

Complaints have been made in regard to livestock running at large in the corporate limits of the City of Newcastle, Texas.

City Ordinance No. 31, states that it is unlawful for livestock of any kind to run at large within the corporate limits of the City of Newcastle. Any person or persons permitting any animal belonging to him or them to run at large within the City limits shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$200.00. Every day constitutes a separate offense.

The co-operation of everyone is needed, especially of those who own livestock, to see that they do not run at large and destroy other people's property.
