## "Mama Pounds" 55 Year Resident of Newcastle

On the last day of this year, "Mama" Pounds will be 82 years of age and she has spent the larger portion of the three-quarters of a century in her hometown of Newcastle, Texas. Allie Pounds is affectionately called "Mama" Pounds by all who know her.

Allie Ferris was born near Smithwick, Burnet County, Texas on December 31, 1883. At an early age she moved with her parents, James Monroe and Martha Jane (Stanford) Ferris to Indian Territory. There she grew to womanhood and on October 29, 1905 in Navajo, Oklahoma, she married Robert Aaron Pounds.

The days as a youth spent in Indian Territory she remembers best. Her father was a U. S. Marshal in the territory.

Their job was to keep some semblance of law and order in the Oklahoma badlands. Allie can "spin the true tales of the old west" and has spent happy hours doing so. This writer in 1955 tape recorded some of the colorful stories of the territory days as told by her.

She remembers well a story about her father, and U. S. Marshall Tiddle in their capture of "Red Buck", Oklahoma's badman of the 19th century.

Newcastle 1909

"Mama" Pounds moved to Newcastle with her husband and one son in 1909, and has lived here ever since. She remembers quite well her first trip via train. Her first impressions were of dislike for the boomtown. She quickly made friends and found herself engaged in church work and she soon forgot her first impressions. She says that life has been hard down through the years but she cherishes the friends she has made in over a half a century in this little place.

When asked what her hobby might be, she said she was always too busy with necessary chores of running a household to have a hobby. She reads her Bible daily but her eyesight now prevents her from doing so. Her children and grandchildren read to her now.

She is one of the last survivors of the Ladies' Prayer Meeting and Missionary Group which formed in 1909 and 1910 in Newcastle. She fondly recalls her many friends who have departed this life. She often recalls how they used to meet for prayer meeting three times each week. Mama Pounds now is able only to attend Sunday School and church on Sunday.

When queried about changes she would have made in her life, she was quick to quip: "No, not one." Her family and friends is all she owns and she treasures each dearly. "Mama" Pounds has an enviable record of Sunday School attendance. She wears her 28 years perfect attendance pin. She has attended church and Sunday School in the Assembly of God Church for many years. The attendance records were instituted in the Newcastle church some 28 years ago and Allie Pounds hasn't missed since. In fact, she was one of the charter members of the pentecostal movement in Newcastle and she has always been a faithful supporter of her church. Her pastor, Rev. H. D. Moore, is the most recent of a long list of ministers she has known and loved throughout the years.

## Short course in beef production for adult farmers

A beef production short course for adult farmers will be held Oct. 18-21 under the sponsorship of the Newcastle High School Vocational Agriculture Dept. according to Mr. Wayne Hales, Supt. and Ward Pendleton, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Mr. W. W. (Bill) Holtzapple, beef production specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the TEA and the Dept. of Animal Science at Texas A&M University will be the instructor for the course.

Mr. Holtzapple is a graduate of Texas A&M. He majored in Agricultural Education with much of his work done in livestock production.

Upon graduation he taught Vocational Agriculture at Hearne for one year, and he served as County Agriculture Agent for nine years in San Augustine County. This is his third year with the Specialist Program. Mr. Holtzapple has had much experience in working with beef cattle and poultry as the main enterprises.

He has worked with commercial and registered breeders in that area and has carried on a very active education program in beef cattle production.

The short course at Newcastle is scheduled to begin Monday October 18 at 7:30 in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be decided on at the first meeting.

**WANTED BY THE FBI**



ALSON THOMAS WAHRLICH

Wahrlich, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives," is wanted for unlawful interstate flight to avoid prosecution for the crime of kidnaping. He allegedly abducted a 6-year-old Arizona girl in Tucson, Arizona, on April 16, 1964, and brutally beat, choked, and sexually molested her before leaving her abandoned in the same city. A Federal warrant was issued at Tucson on April 28, 1964, charging Wahrlich with unlawful interstate flight to avoid prosecution for this offense.

A white American, Wahrlich was born in Rensselaer County, New York, on February 4, 1936. He is 5' 2" tall, weighs 135 to 140 pounds, wears glasses, has blue eyes, brown hair, a medium build and a medium complexion. He has a scar on his left shoulder, a vaccination scar on his left arm, a scar on each side of his abdomen, and a tattoo of a heart and the name "Cindy" on his left arm.

Wahrlich has worked as a truck driver, ranch worker, dishwasher, house trailer repairman, hospital orderly, insurance salesman, and ice cream truck vendor. He is very interested in guns and strongly prefers traveling by personally owned car. Wahrlich reportedly has mental blackouts, has been previously imprisoned for aggravated assault, child molesting, and a crime against nature. He reportedly is armed with a pistol and is said to carry a surgical scalpel in his trouser's pocket. Consider him armed and extremely dangerous.

Should you receive any information concerning the whereabouts of Alson Thomas Wahrlich, you are requested to immediately notify the nearest office of the FBI, the telephone number of which may be located on the first page of local telephone directories.

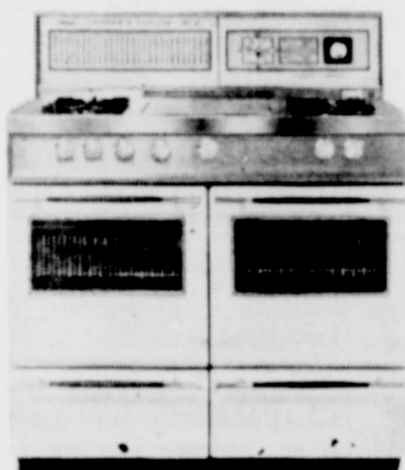

**MAMA POUNDS**

W. A. Ferris (now Moore) found his place in Texas history while Texas was yet a Republic. In 1837 the Texas Congress made him a surveyor of Nacogdoches district. He surveyed most of what is now downtown Dallas (once a part of Nacogdoches District) and his surveys, map, and historical pa-

pers are a part of Dallas county history.

W. A. Ferris, born in New York in 1810, spent most of his early adulthood on expeditions to the Rocky mountains. Upon leaving New York he was cognizant of history because he kept journals and they have been the primary source of many books published by and about Ferris. Space does not permit even a brief bibliography of the published historical works by and about Ferris. The libraries and research centers have them catalogued. The Fort Belknap Genealogical Society in 1964 observed "Ferris Day" at its May meeting.

of America's pre Revolutionary War clan is being written by an outstanding historian and genealogist, W. R. Conger of Dallas. He is known throughout the state of Texas.

"Mama" Pounds, whose American ancestry dates back to 1710 and Queen Ann's War attends the large Ferris reunion which is held in Oklahoma at the site of the old homestead, still owned by the Ferris family.

Her brothers and sisters have visited in Newcastle many times. They are: Willie, Warren, Eugene, Arthur, and Aaron Ferris; Mattie Jones, Fannie Cornelius, Lucy Allred, Laura Sprinkles, and Cora Ferris.

**Husband's Family**

Robert Aaron Pounds (1881-1931) was a native of Parker county. His parents, Newton Aaron and Cornelia Josephine (Turner) Pounds, came from Gibson county, Tennessee and settled in Parker and Young counties in the 1870's. N. A. Pounds was a pioneer cowman in Parker and Young county and he registered on May 24, 1880 in the Young county records, the cattle brand LBS.

N. A. Pounds' first wife Sarah (Roach) Pounds died in 1879 and lies buried in Fort Belknap civilian cemetery.

R. A. Pounds' grandparents were North Carolinians: Aaron and Nancy pounds.

Allie Pounds says that her greatest asset in life is her children. They have unselfishly cared for her in the evening of her beautiful life. She is quick to give her Lord credit for her every blessing. She enjoys the visitors who come to her home in the southwest part of Newcastle.

"Mama" Pounds has 6 children: Edgar Lee, Sadie Irene, Robert James, Lucy Mae, Ferris, and Clara Belle. She has 8 grandchildren and 6 great-grandchildren. One grandson, Bobbie Ferris Pounds, is the only grandson to perpetuate the family name.

Just another one of this writer's life's little joys is to have known someone like my friend, Allie Ferris Pounds.
