Travis Julian Eddleman, age 54, a well known and life long resident of Young County, succumbed to a heart attack in a Wichita Falls hospital at 4:30 a. m. Tuesday.

Funeral services are pending, awaiting word from a son with the Army in Germany. Lunn Funeral Home has charge of the body.

Travis was born September 4, 1911 at Padgett, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Arch Eddleman, a pioneer family of this vicinity. He had lived his entire life in Young county and had many friends who regret to hear of his passing.

He was married October 18, 1929 to Bid Russell in Altus, Okla. A stock farmer in the Padgett community, the Eddleman's recently bought a home in Newcastle where they were living at the time of his death.

Survivors include the widow; three sons, Howard (Puncher) of Woodard, Okla.; Julian, with the U. S. Army in Germany; and Steve of the home; one daughter, Mrs. Alex Dooley of Graham.

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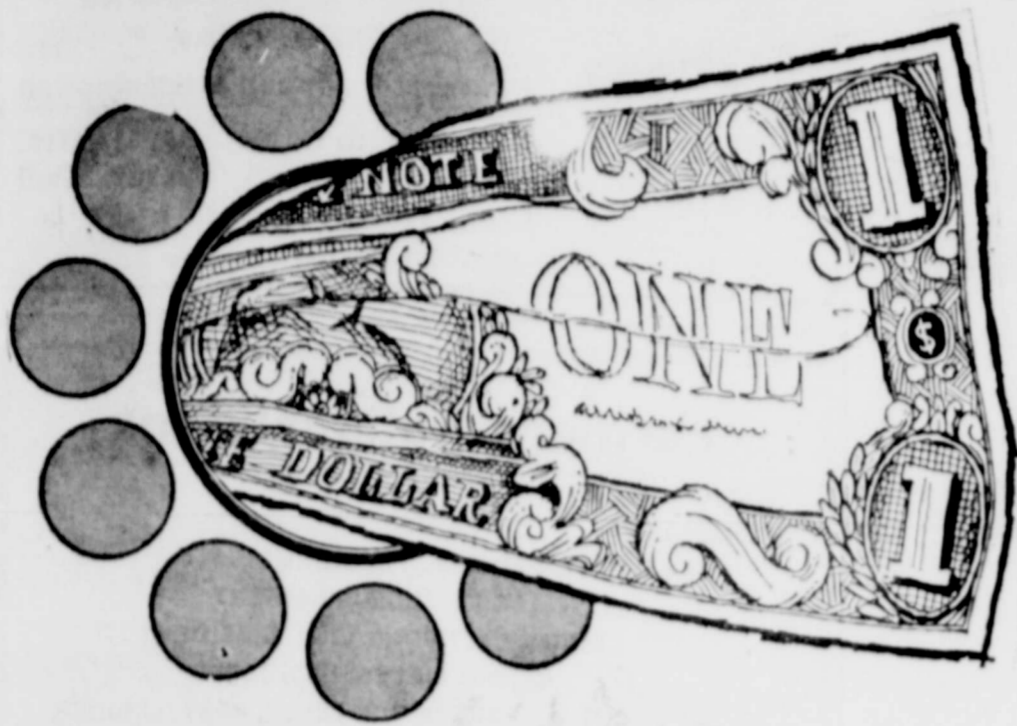

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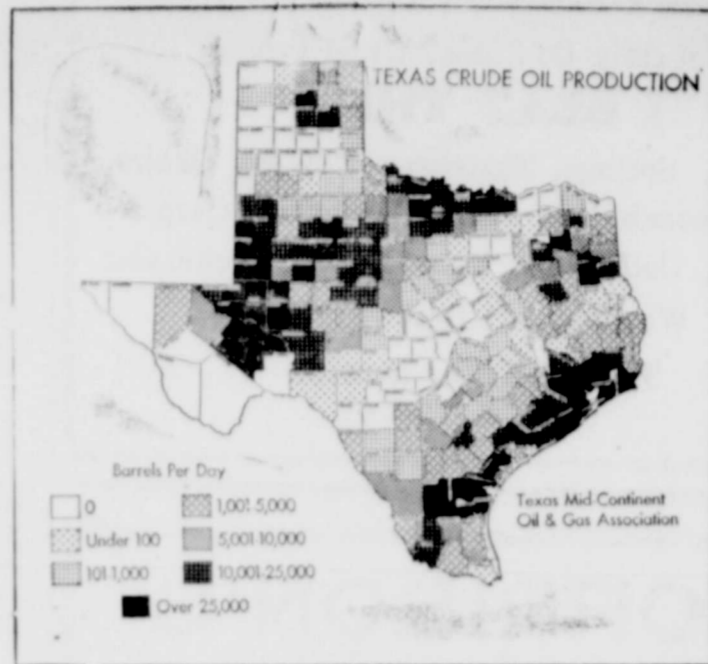

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Historical Society meeting hold enthusiastic meet

Some 300 residents of Texas and Oklahoma gathered at Fort Belknap Saturday for the annual meeting of the Fort Belknap Historical Society.

Robert S. Weddle, publisher of the Menard News, gave a dramatic and documented account of Spanish Col. Diego Ortiz Parrilla's punitive expedition against the Indians. He recounted the 1759 Spanish Indian encounter at

old Spanish Fort, about 100 years older than Belknap. It is located in Montague county. Belknap, one time county seat, is three miles south of Newcastle.

The delegates were also treated with opportunity of seeing sketches and paintings of Mrs. Sally Gee Pettus of Goliad, a well known artist of historical sites.

The crowd was also entertained with a musical program of Spanish cultural heritage by brightly costumed dancers from TWC.

The historical society was told of hopes of building another barracks to accommodate the ever-expanding archives of the society.

Added to the archives were microfilms of scrolls listing membership in the Army companies stationed at Fort Belknap according to Mrs. Barbara Ledbetter, assistant archivist. Other acquisitions

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were a pair of school slates of vintage 1879, an 1853 copy of Harper's magazine, and a picture of Rev. Pleasant Tackitt, frontier Methodist minister.

At the noon hour a barbecue luncheon was served under the grape arbor.

Amendments

Campaigns are now underway for and against the 10 proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on November 2.

The amendment to increase the terms of office of the governor and statewide officials to four years should be defeated. Also Amendment No. 1 to increase the state college property tax levy for building purposes from five to 10c should likewise be defeated. Others to vote against in-

clude increasing the Veterans Land Fund to \$200,000,000; exempting certain hospitals from local property taxes; permitting the Legislature to raise salaries of Speaker of the House and Lieutenant Governor and to increase lawmakers' expense allowances from \$10 to \$20 a day; and lengthening terms of state representatives from two to four years.

Opposition to four year terms is growing throughout the state. The voters should study and inform themselves on each Amendment to be voted upon Nov. 2. A light turnout is expected—but there shouldn't be, as these amendments are more important than in choosing someone for a state office.
