## Bobcats blast Throckmorton Greyhounds 29-12

The Newcastle Bobcats ended five years of frustration Friday night by defeating Throckmorton 29-12. Newcastle hadn't defeated Throckmorton since 1960.

Scoring started in the first quarter when Mike Mitchell fumbled the ball on the Newcastle 17 yard line. Throckmorton scored in four plays making the score 6-0. The extra point attempt was no good.

Newcastle fumbled the ball two times in the first quarter and it looked like the Bobcats were not going to jell, but in the second quarter Preston Pitts scored on an end sweep from the 39 yard line to tie the score. Try for extra point was good, making the score 7-6.

With 2:03 left in the second quarter Mike Mitchell scored on a drive from nine yards out. The extra point was no good, making the score at half time, 13-6.

Throckmorton completely dominated the third quarter with Newcastle having possession of the ball only two plays, one of those being a fumble which set up Throckmorton's second score. Bill Nacol swept right end from 20-yards out for a TD. The try for extra point failed, making the score 13-12.

With 11:23 left in the game QB John Tomlinson hit Mike Mitchell for a 45 yard TD. The two point conversion was good by the same pair, making the score 21-12.

Late in the fourth quarter John Tomlinson spirited 51 yards on a punt return for the last TD. The two point conversion was good on a pass from Tomlinson to Aaron Hughes, making the final score 29-12 in favor of Newcastle.

The Newcastle Bobcats play Lockett at Newcastle Friday night at 7:30.

## J. W. Murpree makes report on conference

Newcastle was represented at the San Diego Conference on Rural Education by J. W. Murpree, recently elected vice-president of the Texas Small Schools Association. Mr. Charles Bitters, Texas Project Director, Mr. Truett Day, President of the Association, Mr. C. W. Wright, president-elect, Mr. Murpree, vice-president, drove to the conference.

The conference started Sunday, October 11 and lasted four days. Among the topics studied and discussed were:

1. Regional approach to educational data processing.
2. Approaches to teaching reading.
3. Research and innovation in small schools.
4. Various school problems.
5. Educational bills.

Of course, those people from Texas were interested in the projects of other states that are similar to the Texas Small Schools Project. Other projects are at present being conducted in the states of Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona, Nevada and Utah. These states make up the Western States Small Schools Project.

Murpree believes that the Texas project is one of the better projects. It seems to have more individual participation and has not had financial support from various foundations.

Mr. Charles Bitters was recognized and commended on several occasions for the work he has done and is still doing as Director of the Small Schools Project. It was pointed out that this was the first convention in several years in which the Texas Association was represented by all three of its officers.

The conference was considered to be a success and very worth the time of those who attended.

## 1500 in Young Co. eligible for medicare coverage

Enrollment of the Young County older people in the new medicare program indicates that an overwhelming majority of those on the social security rolls are choosing to participate in the voluntary medical insurance portion of the program, Joe Nesbitt, social security field representative for Young County announced today.

The Social Security Administration had completed its mailing of information and medical insurance enrollment cards to 15 1/2 million social security beneficiaries 65 or older by October 31, Nesbitt reported.

About 1500 beneficiaries in Young County are eligible for medicare coverage, Nesbitt said.

The medicare program set up under the 1965 social security amendments, provides two different kinds of health insurance benefits for practically all Americans 65 or older. The basic hospital insurance plan will pay much of the cost of hospital and hospital-related expenses. A supplementary medical insurance is available on a voluntary basis at a cost of \$3 a month. This plan helps to pay doctors' fees and certain other medical expenses. The two health insurance programs do not begin until July 1966, and no monthly premiums are due before then.

Social security beneficiaries can sign up for medical insurance coverage just by checking "YES" on the enrollment card, signing their name, and returning the card, signing their name, and returning the card in the prepaid, addressed envelope which comes with it. The \$3 monthly premium will be deducted from their benefit checks when the program starts in July.

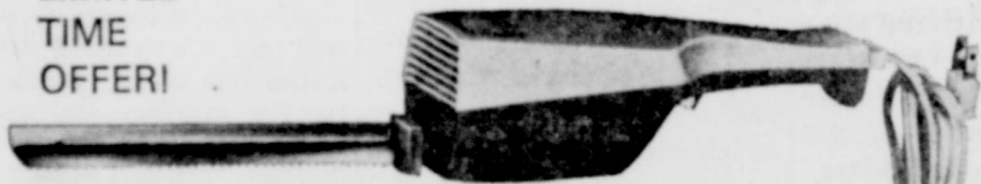

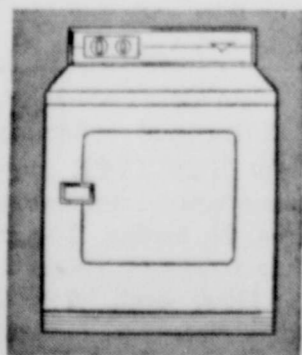

This is not freedom of the press. This is responsibility of the press.

Newspapers have no extraordinary rights.

People do.

Men have the right to a public trial and the right to know what happens in courtrooms. These are rights written into the Constitution and affirmed by the Supreme Court in 1829 when Mr. Justice Bagley wrote: "It is one of the essential qualities of a court of justice that its proceedings should be public."

If people are to know the truth the newspaper must report the news.
