Medlan Chapel to be marked with historic medallion

The historic Medlan Chapel Primitive Baptist Church near Graham, Texas, has been named a Recorded Texas Historical Landmark, significant to the history of this community and state and worthy of preservation.

Having met the requirements for this high state designation, the Texas Historical Building Medallion with interpretive plate will be affixed to the outside of the building, Mrs. J. W. Bullock, chairman of the Young County Historical Survey Committee, stated.

The aluminum markers with Swedish steel effect are not only durable but beautiful and require practically no maintenance.

The official inscription for this historic marker states:

"Medlan Chapel Primitive Baptist Church built 1882, of native sandstone quarried one mile from site with lime rock burned for mortar. Pews hauled by ox wagon from Sberman. One of the earliest houses of worship in Young County. Church and land donated by A. B. (Uncle Archie) and Aunt Betty Medlan, 1888."

Sponsored by the Young County Historical Survey Committee, this historical marker will be dedicated Sunday, January 30, 1966, at 2 p. m. in the Chapel, according to Mrs. J. W. Bullock, county chairman. The public is invited.

Final date cotton reapportionment January 28

Cotton growers were reminded today that the final date to release or to request additional reapportionment cotton is January 28, 1966.

L. B. Creel, chairman, ASCCC, said special attention should be given to this new deadline since it is earlier than for previous years.

A producer may retain total allotment for history and base purposes by receiving diversion payment on 12.5 pct. and releasing the releasing the remaining allotment

Wool growers urged to file for payment

Growers were urged today to file their applications for 1965 marketing year payments under the National Wool Act at the earliest possible date but at least by the end of January. The applications cover marketings of wool, lambs, and mohair during the calendar year 1965 for which all sales details were completed not later than December 31.

L. B. Creel, chairman, ASCCC, points out that payments under the program will also be necessary on mohair sold during 1965. The payments represent the amounts necessary to bring the national average prices received by growers up to the previously announced incentive levels under the National Wool Act. The levels for 1965 are 62c a pound for shorn wool and 72c a pound for mohair; the incentive price for pulled wool will be at a level comparable to that for shorn wool.

Since payments under the program are based on the national average prices for marketing during the entire year, it is important that sales reports be as complete as possible before the average price determinations are made. That is why ASCCC is stressing application filings before January 31.

Payments for the 1965 marketing year are scheduled to begin in April of 1966. Marketing completed after December 31, 1965 are considered as 1966 marketings and therefore will not be eligible for payments until early 1967.

Doctor in the Kitchen
by W. W. Bauer, M.D.

POISON IN THE KITCHEN

This is supposed to be a column about nutrition, and poisons can scarcely be classified as nutrients. Nevertheless, they have a place in this space, because too often they get into the food in place of good nutrients.

This can happen in two ways. One is by the eating of substances which are naturally poisonous, such as mushrooms of certain varieties, and the bulbs of some garden flowers which have been known to be consumed in place of onions. Such food poisoning is readily prevented by the simple expedient of not eating wild mushrooms, and by keeping garden bulbs out of the kitchen.

Also Non-Food Poisons

Another way in which food can be poisoned is by the accidental introduction of poisonous substances into food during its preparation. This can happen whenever poisonous substances are stored in close contact with edible ones.

It is most likely to happen where space is limited, as in small kitchens, kitchenettes or trailer homes. In such cases, the storing of poisonous substances in the same cupboard or on the same shelf with foodstuffs, may cause the poison to be used in place of an edible ingredient. Such accidents are not uncommon.

A toxic substance may resemble such a white crystalline food-stuff as cane sugar, or a seasoning like salt, and may be used

under the misapprehension that it is sugar or salt. A colorless liquid substance may be mistaken for vinegar.

The simple solution for such problems is never to store poisons anywhere needlessly. If you are troubled with ants or roaches or flies, or pestered by rats or mice, try to get rid of them without using poison. If you do use it, follow the package directions carefully, and dispose of the remainder when your purpose has been accomplished.

Keeping residues of poison around the place in case of possible future need is just asking for trouble, especially if there are children. If you must keep poisons for continuous use against persistent pests, never store them in the kitchen or in a store-room where foods are kept.

Poison Control Centers

You probably have a list of telephone numbers commonly called, in or near your kitchen. Why not add to it, while you think of it, the number of your nearest poison control center; also inquire whether in case of emergency, a person should be taken to the Center or to the hospital. Practices differ in different communities.

The time to consider poison hazards is before the "accident" happens. There isn't much point in a nutritionally balanced diet laced with a deadly poison which should never have been in the kitchen.

13 accidents investigated during December

Memories of 1965 are slipping quietly away for most people, but for those maimed in automobile accidents and the families of others who were killed during the year, 1965 will be remembered always with dread and sorrow.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 13 accidents on rural highways in Young County during the month of December, according to Sergeant Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county for the calendar year of 1965 shows a total of 128 crashes resulting in 4 persons killed, 74 injured, and an estimated property damage of \$80,417.00.

The patrol supervisor reminded all motorists to think about reducing the deaths even more in 1966 than in 1965. This reduction can be brought about by strict observance of traffic laws and defensive driving practices. Remember, everytime you drive you have a motive, that is, to drive to live.
