WHAT TO DO IF THE LIGHTS GO OUT IN YOUR HOME

If the lights should go out suddenly in part of your home, the cause may be an overloaded or a "short" circuit. Here is what to do to restore service:

If your home is equipped with a fuse box:

- First: Disconnect lamps and appliances that were in use on the circuit that went out.
- Second: Open the main switch. Make sure your hands are dry and stand on a dry surface while doing this.
- Third: Replace the blown fuse with a new one of the proper size, usually 15 amperes.
- Fourth: Close the main switch to restore service.
- Fifth: Check lamp and appliance cords for signs of short circuits before you reconnect them. Worn places in cords or plugs that permit wires to come together are frequent causes of "shorts."

If your home is equipped with a circuit breaker panel:

- First: Disconnect lamps and appliances that were in use on the circuit that went out.
- Second: Push the open circuit breaker handle to the extreme "off" position.
- Third: Return the handle to "on" position.
- Fourth: Check lamp and appliance cords for short circuits before reconnecting.

If the lights go out in all parts of your home, check to see whether your neighbors have lights. If their windows are dark, there may be a local power equipment failure. Report the interruption to our office.

If you are bothered with frequent blown fuses, your home may lack sufficient circuit capacity to carry your electrical load. Installation of additional circuits will remedy this situation.

Never put a penny behind a blown fuse and never replace a blown fuse with a fuse of a larger size. This eliminates the protection provided by the correct sized fuse, and may result in permanent damage to the circuit wires within the walls of your home. Such damage may lead to fire.

Talented Texans Return from 4-H Club Congress in Chicago

Four Lone Star state youngsters who shone brightly in 4-H work were rewarded recently with a trip to Chicago.

The teen-agers, winners in state competition, attended the 1965 National 4-H Club Congress Nov. 28-Dec. 2.

They are Helen Hilton, 18, Palestine, clothing award winner; Marylu Henderson, 17, also of Palestine, safety; Sam Speir, 15, Manchaca, leadership, and Sammie Novosad, 17, Bryan, agriculture.

They met 4-H winners from other states and socialized with them at a dance in Chicago's famous Aragon Ballroom. Their itinerary also included tours of some of the city's other outstanding points of interest, such as the Art Institute of Chicago, the Chicago Natural History Museum, and the Museum of Science and Industry.

Miss Hilton made 186 garments in her seven years as a 4-H'er and estimates she saved her family over \$900 on clothes during that period.

She grew up on a small farm and now is a freshman at Stephen F. Austin College studying to be a teacher. She was the guest of Coats & Clark Inc. of Chicago.

Miss Henderson's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond W. Henderson Sr., are both 4-H leaders.

Marylu has given more than 55 safety demonstrations and has become well versed in such things as mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and fire prevention.

General Motors sponsored her congress trip. Young Speir's 4-H leadership training has been of practical importance to him. His father died when Sam was seven and he was forced to assume additional responsibilities at an early age.

"Leadership training has helped me in taking responsibility in the home, church and community," he says. Speir, who came to Chicago under the auspices of The Sears-Roebuck Foundation, is interested in an agri-business career.

Novosad works on his family's 178-acre farm, but he plans eventually to enter Texas A&M to study dairy judging, a field he became interested in through his 4-H work.

Sammie has raised more than 660 fryers and 43 swine over the years. His other 4-H projects include beef, field crops, dairy, tractor maintenance and leadership. But livestock and dairy judging were his favorite 4-H projects.

Sammie's dad, Joe Novosad Jr., is a 4-H leader. Young Novosad visited Chicago through the courtesy of International Harvester.

Austin, Texas.—A substantial tax increase will be needed next year to provide for fast growing state colleges and universities.

Frank Erwin, chairman of the Committee for the Governing Board of Texas Colleges and Universities, estimates that higher education expenditures will go up \$100,000,000 for the coming biennium—above the present \$432,000,000 budget. That's a hike of nearly 25 per cent.

Some authorities feel that increased expenditures for education will run closer to \$170,000,000.

Erwin predicted that college-university enrollments will double by the early 1970s and admitted that the task of providing facilities for all appears virtually hopeless.

Texas, he said, must be as enthusiastic in support of new taxes for education as they were in backing increased appropriations last year.

Other sources said the higher education budget looming next year may reach
