## 4-H Share-the-Fun Festival to be held Saturday

The third annual 4-H Share-the-Fun Festival will be held on Saturday, Feb. 19 at 7:00 p.m. in the Municipal Auditorium according to Bret A. Triplett, Assistant County Agent. This popular event consists of various acts which are presented by the members of the Young County 4-H Clubs. Each club presents an act or acts during the 6 minutes allowed and each act is scored by judges from outside the county. Blue, red, and white ribbons are awarded 4-H members participating in each of the acts according to the score their act was given.

Both junior and senior 4-H club members may participate in this event. However only the winning senior act will be able to represent Young County at the District Contest. Seniors must be 14 years of age or older.

This annual event is sponsored by the Graham and Olney 4-H Adult Leader Clubs and the proceeds are used to support the various 4-H programs projects, and events in Young County. The public is invited to attend. Tickets are available from any 4-H club member.

## Former citizen dies in Ft. Worth

Ernest Jones, 72, of 4133 Lovell, Fort Worth, passed away Thursday, Feb. 10, after an illness of several years.

He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. F. O. Jones and was born in the Belknap community March 25, 1893 and was reared in this vicinity.

He and his family moved to Plainview in the late 30's. He returned here and lived here for a number of years, but had been in Fort Worth for the past 10 years, where his wife, Mrs. Emma (Cunningham) Jones preceded him in death in Sept. 1962.

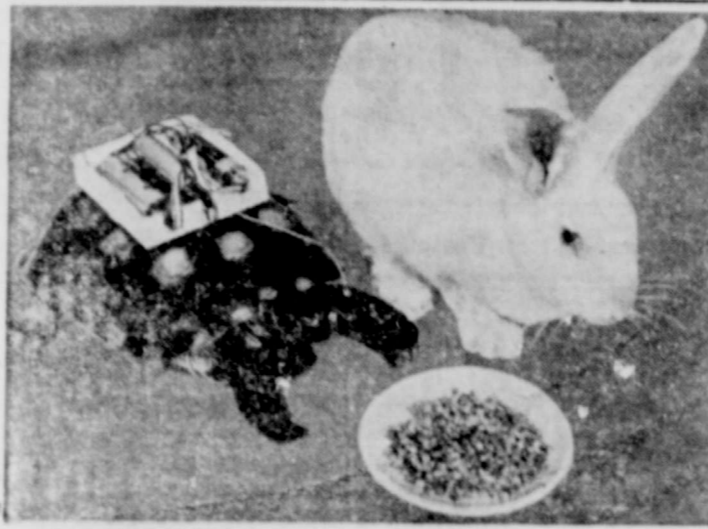

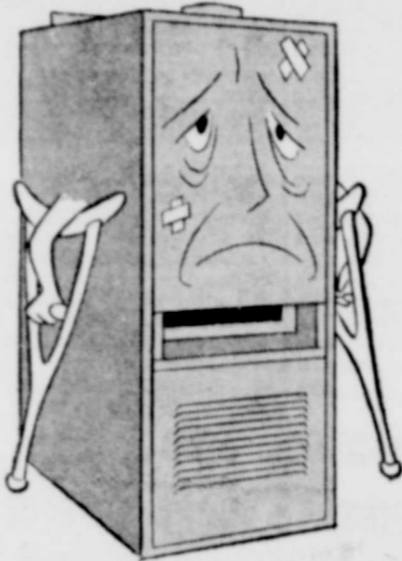

### Doctor in the Kitchen

### NUTRITION NEWS FOR THE ELDERLY?

Is there anything new, nutritionally speaking, for the growing number of older persons? What is the state of their nutrition? What, if anything, needs to be done about it. What can be done? Dr. Donald F. Watkin, of the National Institutes of Health, offers his suggestions in the Journal of the American Public Health Association for April 1965. Essentially, he sees a need for making better use of existing knowledge to keep the aging body "tuned up," so to speak, as one tries to keep an automobile in tune to prolong its life and promote smooth operation.

#### Newer Knowledge

He points out that the newer knowledge of nutrition, especially that of the amino acids and basic research in genetics, offers opportunity for helping to conserve the body during earlier life, and thus deliver it, so to speak, to the later years in better condition. He warns that this new knowledge is limited as yet, but may offer temptation to quacks and charlatans, always active in the lucrative food field, to outrun the scientists and offer people a spurious "siren call of youth to those who have made a poor adjustment to aging."

#### Eat More Sensibly

Essentially, the best we can do today with knowledge at hand is to teach, and if possible, to motivate people in their earlier years

to live and eat more sensibly, as an investment in better health for the future.

Health workers, physicians, nurses and nutritionists recognize, as Dr. Watkin points out, that nutrition among our elder citizens leaves much to be desired.

Older persons often have defective teeth or none, which keeps them from eating a normal diet. They may be too poor to afford a good diet, and too independent to ask for help. They may live alone and be unable or unwilling to exert themselves sufficiently to get and prepare food. They may suffer from digestive disturbances. In many instances they harbor long-established poor dietetic habit patterns or prejudices which grow more deeply rooted with age.

#### Caring For Oldsters

The principal challenge to those who are responsible for aging persons, especially those whose advanced age, illness or senility interfere with their self-care, is to apply the established nutritional principles with new vigor and skill. For the shut-in, communities may need "meals on wheels" programs to supply at least one hot meal a day, plus a well-planned snack.

In the home, the problem is to offer food that tempts, and to endeavor to overcome the handicaps which interfere with its acceptance and consumption. The job is a big one, and it will grow as the number of older persons increases year by year.

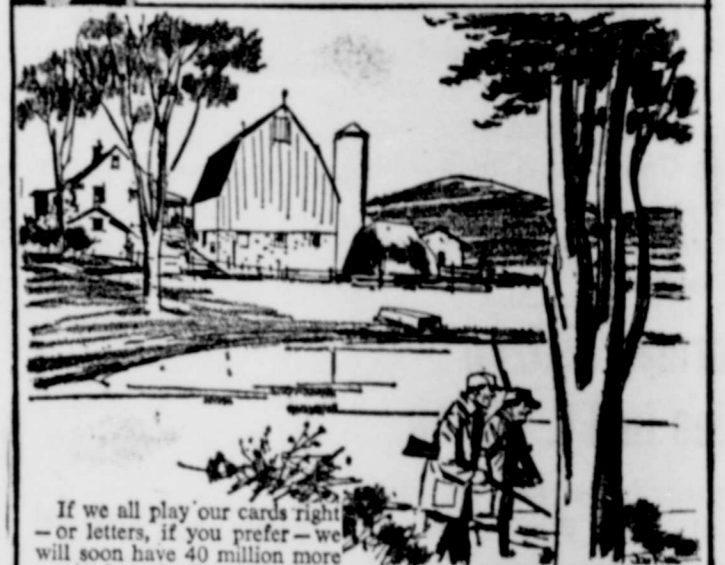

#### DOT DATE LOAF

1 cup California dates or packaged diced dates	1/2 cup diced candied citron
6 eggs, separated	2 squares (1 oz. each) unsweetened chocolate, grated
1/4 teaspoon salt	1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1/2 cup sugar	1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1 cup toasted sliced almonds	

Cut dates into small pieces (or use packaged diced dates). Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon-colored. Gradually beat in salt and sugar. Add dates, almonds, citron, chocolate and lemon rind; mix to distribute evenly. Blend in flour. Beat egg whites until stiff. Fold into fruit mixture. Turn batter into greased and floured 9 x 5 x 3-inch loaf pan. Bake in 300-degree (slow) oven 1 hour and 10 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out dry. Invert on wire rack to cool. Remove from pan. If you wish, garnish with halved or diced dates, brushing dates lightly into top of loaf. Wrap in foil, saran or wax paper and let stand overnight. Makes 1 loaf.

**There's 40,000,000 Acres For the Asking!**



If we all play our cards right—or letters, if you prefer—we will soon have 40 million more acres of cropland under soil and moisture conserving cover for periods of up to ten years. What a bonanza that will mean in pheasant, rabbit and the other species of upland game!

Under the Cropland Adjustment Title, participating landowners would receive payment for diverting their acres to non-crop uses. The more recently proposed Food and Agriculture Act of 1965 goes much further, however. It would offer incentive payments to farmers and ranchers who are willing to permit public hunting, fishing and trapping on their lands. Cost

sharing payments would also be available for the planting of wildlife habitat, the construction of ponds, the restoration of wetlands, and other soil and moisture conserving practices.

In this day of expanding population versus dwindling hunting room, hiking room and just plain outdoor elbow room, passage of the Food and Agriculture Act would be a major victory for our side. Senators and Congressmen report receiving a steady flow of supporting mail. Let's all add our cards and letters to the stream and make sure this bill passes!

#### Highway Patrol reports 7 accidents in Young County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Young County during the month of January, according to Sergeant Frank Jiroik, Highway Patrol Supervisor.

The crashes resulted in one persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$1,570.00.

April 15 is the deadline to have your motor vehicle inspected. During the past 5 1-2 months only 2,000,000 or 40 per cent of the approximately 5,000,000 registered vehicles in Texas have been inspected. This leaves 3,000,000 vehicles to be inspected in approximately two months. If the number of uninspected vehicles were divided evenly among the 5,200 official inspection stations in Texas each would have approximately 577 vehicles to inspect in about 40 working days, or about 15 vehicles per day. The inspection stations in heavily populated areas will have more than this average number to inspect.

The Sergeant urges motorists to have their vehicles inspected without delay to avoid the inconvenience of waiting lines.

Remember—no extension of the Safety Inspection deadline, April 15, 1966.

#### Jehovah's Witnesses to meet in Plainview

A newly redistricted circuit of Jehovah's Witnesses, extending from Wichita Falls to Levelland, from Altus to Haskell, will meet in Plainview, March 4-6, for a semi-annual assembly.
