

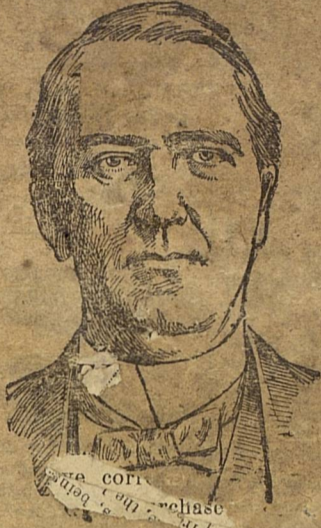

But the nation that puts expediency before right, will wander in the wilderness all its days. It is a grievous fact that so many public leaders and teachers are so devoid of faith in eternal right, that they are turning the nation away from its noblest ideals in an insane search for expedients, Mr. Sheldon himself is not wholly free from this disposition. The minister of an omniscient, omnipotent and beneficent God, who has made men free to choose between good and evil, should think twice before proposing to coerce their choice by law. Mr. Sheldon does this when he puts prohibition—not temperance nor abstention, but prohibition—at the forefront of social reform.
