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OUR ELECTION MACHINERY

The revelations almost certain to be brought out in the course of the attempted recount of the Texas senatorial election are being overshadowed already.

For that matter, it has probably been some time since complete returns for the State have been compiled.

The disclosures incident to collecting the ballots in the senatorial contest probably give a true and average picture of the way in which the precinct boxes are handled after an election.

AMARILLO NEWS

That was quite a compliment the Amarillo Daily News paid Floydada the other day—a whole page advertising, run free of charge, illustrated and generally prepared in a most pleasing manner.

The advertisement called attention to the development of the country surrounding Floydada, the marketing facilities here and some of the noteworthy features of the town and country.

Incidentally The News did what nearly everybody else does occasionally—made an error in the advertisement and corrected it.

A FAMILY AFFAIR

For a good many years persons who have had some knowledge of the practical workings of elections in Texas—at least this part of it—have been aware that all the rules and regulations of the Terrell Election Law have not been strictly observed.

Apparently about the same situation prevails the state over, see indications at the re-count of the senatorial ballots in Washington as reported by the daily press.

SHOULD THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT BE CRITICISED?

W. A. Robbins, in a letter to the press this week recalls the issues of the county campaigns last year, tells of the conditions of the county's finances at that time, and points to the fact that the present commissioners pledged themselves to a policy of strict economy, a business administration and to strictly confine themselves within the county's income.

By this means, he says, the court "practicing strict economy and holding expenses to the minimum," has been able to pay \$25,000 of the outstanding obligations and have no overdrafts on the books.

Continuing further he says: "This showing is commendable and should appeal to every intelligent thinking citizen. On the basis of this showing they deserve the support of the taxpayers of this county, and if upheld, will be able in the future to reduce taxes and lighten the tax burden."

"Owing to the financial condition the court has held in abeyance all petitions and requests urged that would increase the outstanding indebtedness, thereby incurring criticism.

DANGER OF THE IMPORTATION OF THE PINK BOLL WORM INTO NORTHWEST TEXAS

The people of northwest Texas should understand that the pink boll worm of cotton exists in all cotton growing countries west of the Pecos River, including El Paso, Hudspeth, Presidio, Brewster, Pecos, Reeves and Ward, and also exist around Carlsbad New Mexico.

The pink boll worm is small enough to conceal itself in a single cotton seed. It is carried from one place to another usually through movement of some cotton products, seed cotton, or cotton seed, or almost any other cotton products may carry infestation.

The club decided by a unanimous vote that there should be a camp house erected on the auto camp grounds, and ways and means of erecting and paying for same will be put under way at once.

For the protection of the cotton industry in northwest Texas we ask the people most vitally concerned to cooperate with us in preventing further infestation of this dangerous pest.

Kansas City Stock Yards, Feb. 25—The upward turn in hog prices which started last Thursday continued today with a 10 to 15 cent advance. This

gain returned the \$7 quotation and took the general market 25 to 30 cents above the low point last week. Cattle receipts continued moderate and while most prices were quoted steady there was an improved tone in the trade. Demand for stock and feeding cattle was active. Sheep and lamb prices which eased off late last week were higher again today. Receipts today were 11,000 cattle,

11,000 hogs, and 7,000 sheep, compared with 11,000 cattle, 12,000 hogs, and 9,000 sheep a week ago, and 13,900 cattle, 25,275 hogs and 7,425 sheep a year ago.

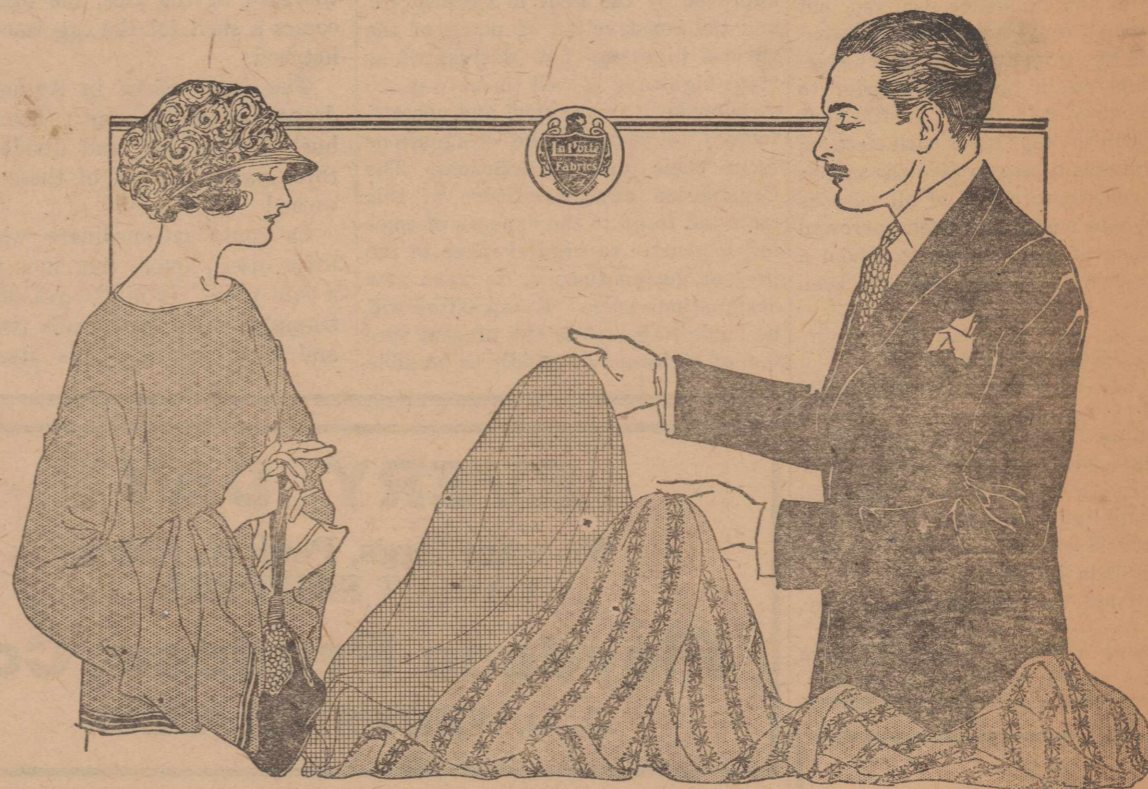

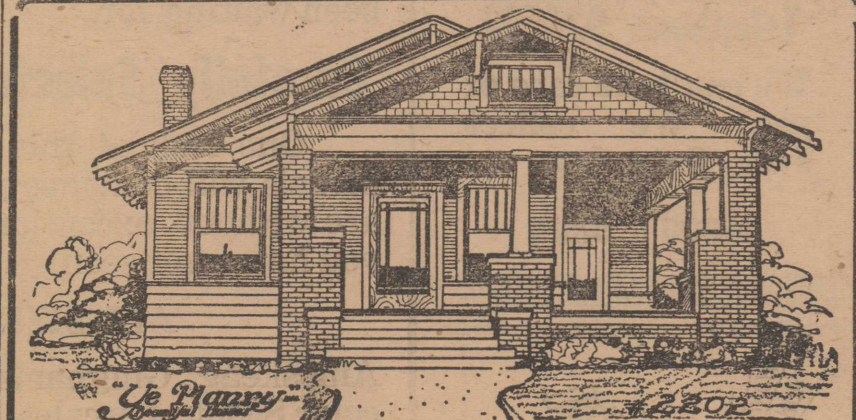

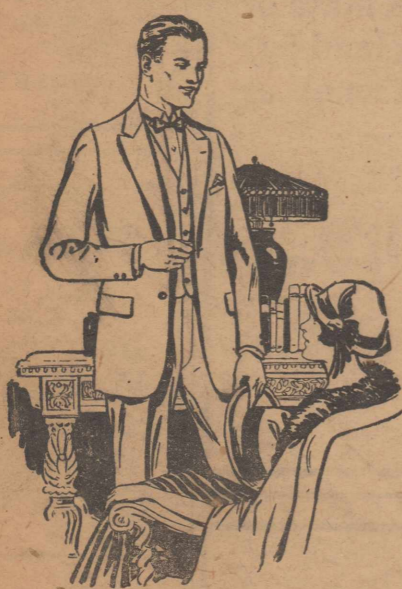

Miss Jettie Pharr and little Maurice Wright are reported to be improving after having the measles.

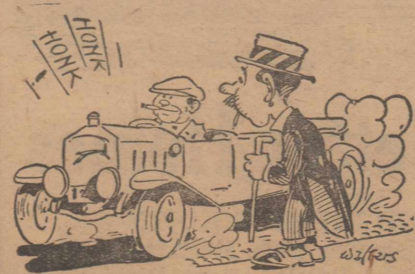
