SCS Notes

Sand storms are wind erosion at its worst! Besides losing valuable topsoil, it can literally burn a young cotton plant to the ground. Running a sand fighter over a field is an excellent way to prevent this from happening, but there is an alternative. A wide range of programs have slowly but surely been taking effect in regions where there is an abundance of cropland.

The Food Security Act of 1985 (FSA) requires windstrips every so many feet depending on the type of dominant soil or a crop rotation system involving rotating a high residue crop with cotton each year depending once again on the type of dominant soil on highly erodible land (HEL).

This would help by keeping a farmer from having to make so many trips across a field fighting the sand, thus saving time and money. The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) has helped by taking highly erodible land out of crop production and establishing it back to permanent grass under a 10-year contract, The Great Plains Conservation Program helps to provide assistance for terraces and other conservation practices.

In the long run, these conservation programs will be a great asset to farmers and ranchers. If you have any questions about any of these programs or if you still need a conservation plan on highly erodible land, please call the Soil Conservation Service at 573-1268.

Experts allege drug link to new leader

ASUNCION, Paraguay (AP) — A new era begins Saturday in Paraguay, where Gen. Andres Rodriguez presides over a country that for 34 years had only known Alfredo Stroessner as its leader. Rodriguez ousted the dictator in a coup in which up to 200 people were reported killed.

Rodriguez was sworn into office Friday, immediately named a cabinet - most of whom who once reported to Stroessner and promised his new government "will respect the human rights of everyone to make democracy a reality.'

But an expert on Paraguayan affairs was quoted Saturday as saying Rodriguez "has an exceedingly unsavory reputation" and saw his takeover as an attempt "to stave off democracy and maintain a privileged posi-

"Rodriguez has reportedly proair taxi service to people smuggl-ing drugs northward," The New York Times quoted John Hoyt Williams, a professor of Latin medals on his shirtfront, as he American history at Indiana took the oath of office in the 19th State University in Terre Haute, Ind., as saying.

The Cox newspaper chain, Rodriquez is considered by law enforcement authorities in Paraguay to be the country's No. 1 drug trafficker.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater, asked about U.S. reports of Rodriquez's alleged drug ties, told reporters, "We won't characterize our relationship to him at this point."

Rodriguez, 64, who had been Stroessner's second-in-command in the army since 1961 and whose daughter is married to Stroessner's son, launched the revolt Thursday night. At least 40 tanks rumbled through Asuncion streets, blasting loyalist troops and police for hours.

The fierce clashes shattered windows, riddled buildings with

bullets and left some streets stained with blood. The bodies of a dozen soldiers lay Friday in front of the presidential guard headquarters, which was roofless and pockmarked by gun-

The Roman Catholic Churchrun Radio Caritas said the death toll could top 200, but officials at the main military and police hospitals refused to give figures on casualties, and the new government made no estimate.

Stroessner, 76, was detained at an army base, about 30 of his followers were arrested, and the hierarchy of the government and ruling Colorado Party replaced.

Stroessner was ordered out of the country, and unconfirmed reports said he was going to Chile. Gen. Mario Mardones, Santiago police commander, said he believed Stroessner was leaving Paraguay Saturday, "but we vided protection, airfields and an do not know where to. Not necessarily Chile."



Reluctant hero is found dead at home

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -Death came to Oliver W. Sipple without any of the fanfare that once anguished the disabled ex-Marine, who became a reluctant hero when he foiled an assassination attempt on President Gerald another," he said in the lawsuit,

A friend found Sipple, 47, dead in his San Francisco apartment on Thursday, apparently of natural causes. A framed letter of commendation signed by Ford hung on the wall.

Sipple gained unwanted fame on Sept. 22, 1975, when he lunged for a .38-caliber chrome revolver aimed at Ford by would-be assassin Sara Jane Moore outside a San Francisco hotel. His move caused Moore's shot to go astray, hitting a building instead.

Afterward, Sipple telephoned news outlets and begged them not to mention his name, his address or "anything about me."

"I'm not a hero, I'm a live coward," he said later. "It's probably the scariest thing that ever happened in my whole life."

But reports about Sipple, some mentioning his homosexuality, were published anyway.

Sipple filed a \$15 million invasion of privacy lawsuit against several newspapers, claiming he his life-saving action, Wahl said. was abandoned by his brothers For Results Use Snyder Daily

his sexual orientation by reading published accounts.

"My sexuality is part of my private life and has no bearing on my response to the act of a person seeking to take the life of which was filed five days after the assassination attempt.

He lost the five-year court battle when Superior Court Judge Ira Brown dismissed the suit.

"I think that his life was a very tragic life," attorney John Wahl, who represented Sipple, said Friday. "He did some very heroic things. He was 100 percent disabled from his service in the Marine Corps, then he went out of his way, endangering his life, to save the life of President Gerald Ford — then he got punished for doing it."

Sipple, who was on disability because of mental problems relating to his combat experiences in the Vietnam War, had originally come to San Francisco from Detroit so that he could live as he wished without upsetting his family, according to Wahl. However, that all changed by the published accounts of his personal life.



Third World debt dominated the group of seven meeting

Bush administration still publicly endorses the Reagan administration's approach toward solving the \$1.3 trillion Third World debt problem and is searching for

WASHINGTON (AP) — The ways to make that approach more workable.

Discussion on Third World debt dominated two days of meetings that wrapped up Friday between finance officials of the noncommunist world's seven most powerful economies — the United States, Japan, West Germany, Great Britain, France, Canada and Italy.

The meetings had been billed as a get-acquainted session for the new Bush administration as it completed its second week in of-

Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady, who was host for the discussions along with Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan, said that a review of conditions around the world showed the global economy was dards because of the growing performing reasonably well, an burdens they face in servicing opinion that was seconded by his their huge debts. fellow finance ministers.

Tatsuo Murayama, the new Japanese finance minister who was attending his first Group of Seven meeting, said that he believed prospects for the world economy were brighter than they were five months ago because currency fluctuations had stabilized and inflation appeared

to be moderating.
Brady said that the seven countries had a "thorough discussion" regarding Third World debt with no decisions being taken.

"Several ideas were discussed for strengthening the agreed-on strategy based on the same principles we consider valid," Brady said. "Growth, economic policy changes and reforms in the debtor countries, the continued need for external financing (by debtor

nations) and continued observance of the case-by-case method."

These were all goals of the Baker plan, drafted in 1985 by Brady's predecessor, James A. Baker III. Baker, who is secretary of state in the Bush administration, crafted an approach to Third World debt that stressed increased loans in exchange for economic reforms made by the developing countries.

While the United States repeatedly rejected calls to forgive some of the debt, America has found itself increasingly isolated on the debt issue as political stresses have risen in debtor countries. These nations are suffering falling living stan-

Tower vote is ue soon

WASHINGTON (AP) - New allegations against Defense Secretary-designate John Tower aren't expected to delay further a vote by the Senate Armed Services Committee on his nomina-Republican on the panel.

Sen. John Warner, R-Va., declined on Friday to say what the information dealt with. But other sources indicated it concerned Tower's personal life, and specifically alcohol and women.

"It's just another chapter in an ongoing investigation," Warner said. "I don't attach any more significance to this chapter than to any other."

He said an FBI report on the subject should reach the committee "on Monday and ... we can proceed to a vote Tuesday or Wednesday."

Congressional sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the FBI was looking into allegations concerning "Tower's behavior at a party last year in Houston."

CBS News reported that the allegations involve an alleged liaison in Houston between Tower and a woman from an Eastern bloc nation, along with an allegation of excessive drinking in the past year.

According to ABC News, the new allegations include a report from an Air Force colonel which said Tower had 14 separate liaisons with women while he headed the U.S. negotiating team in Geneva after leaving the

The committee had been expected to vote Thursday to recommend Senate confirmation of Tower.

On the heels of an Arctic cold front that chilled most of the state, temperatures dipped to below 4 degrees, causing the 4-inch steel pipe that delivers natural gas to the town of 2,200 to pull apart, said officials of Lone State Gas Co., owner of the pipeline.

Almost two-thirds of the town's homes and businesses were left without gas for heating, hot water or cooking, and schools were closed for the day.

"Boy, was it cold," said Kenny Bragg, a janitor at the Cottle County Courthouse. "I don't think I would have made it without my electric blanket."

No injuries were reported either as a result of the break or the cold that crept into people's dwellings, said officials.

The pipeline, which carries about 490 pounds of gas per square inch, broke about 3 a.m. in an isolated area of ranchland, said LSG regional superintendent Bob Clark. The line comes from Childress, about 30 miles

warn residents, and he and other volunteers began rounding up electric space heaters to take to the elderly.

"I scared everbody to death blowing the whistle," he said. "But we needed to warn 'em."

Soon after the gas cut off, space heaters were taken to the Wood Convalescent Home, where 44 nursing home patients reside.

Nurses gathered ambulatory residents together in the hall in the wee hours of the morning and hung bedspreads over windows to help insulate the building, said nursing home director Gwynna Stofel.

"Luckily it never got below 68 in here," she said. "We used hot plates to serve a warm







Sheer Khan is mischievous, just like his house cat counterparts, Mrs. Murray said. And she admits that he has done his share of "tearing up furniture," but furniture can be repaired, she said.

Damage to date has occurred through roughhousing and playing in the house, but she said they are trying to break him from that habit. Playtime is now reserved for the backyard.

They consult with the breeders who sold them the tiger and they contact zoos. Mrs. Murray has a friend who works for the Los Angeles zoo and they have also consulted with experts at the Fort Worth Zoo.

"We never take just one person's opinion about what we should do or how we should handle a situation," Mrs. Murray said. "We seek out several opinions and then make the best judgement we can based on what we have been told."



While it's a scary disorder, in severe cases surgical techniques are available, and 85 percent of patients with Bell's Palsy begin recovery in 10 days to three weeks, with the proper therapy.



After North opened a cheesy hand, South got to four spades. Prospects were slight after the lead of the king of hearts. At first glance it seemed that the A-K of clubs would need to be in West's hand, but since West was silent during the auction, it was next to impossible for him to hold so much in high cards. From West's point of view, it seemed likely that declarer had a singleton heart, but West was not sure which minor suit he should switch to. So he tried trumps instead. That gave declarer an opportunity for chicanery.

He won the spade in dummy with the ace and immediately led the queen of hearts. East played the four and declarer discarded a deceptive five of diamonds. West fell into the trap nicely, winning the ace of hearts and switching smartly to the jack of diamonds. Declarer won the ace of diamonds, the king of spades and the king of diamonds, and led a spade to the jack in dummy to get rid of clubs on the jack of hearts and the queen of diamonds.

How could West know? In fact, when East followed to the second heart, his card should have shown which minor suit he preferred. When he played the four, the lower of his two remaining hearts, he was suggesting preference for clubs. With strong dia monds, he should have played the six of hearts. Alas, it is not the last time that a defender's correct suit-preference play will be ignored. And declarer should be given credit for brave


The product is a packet containing detergents and softeners that are designed to be placed directly in the washer tub and then go with the washed clothes powder detergents, instead work- machines.

The water eventually bubbles out of the dispenser and onto the floor, creating a mess and a safety hazard. To fix the machine, the inlet hose must be taken off the dispenser to get the packet out.

The detergent will not cause a problem if used correctly, but the instructions carry no specific warning about front loaders.

Chandrasekha "Shaker" Ivatury, a former computer systems analyst for LTV Corp., was charged Wednesday with solicitation of capital murder in connection with an alleged plot to kill an unidentified federal

The agent began investigating Ivatury in December after learning that he was an associate of two other Dallas-area men already charged with laundering money through a Yugoslavian bank and illegally exporting high-technology equipment, federal officials said Thursday.

Customs spokesman Charles Conroy of Dallas said investigators discovered on Monto hire a gunman to kill the associates were indicted in

to identify.

An undercover special agent was introduced to Ivatury as a hit man willing to carry out the killing, Conroy said.

Defense lawyer Denver Me-Carty of Dallas said the computer engineer may have made threats on the agent's life but never intended to carry them out.

McCarty told the Dallas Morning News Ivatury attended the meeting with an undercover customs official posing as the hit man just so he could call off the

The unemployed computer technician told the undercover agent that he feared being arrested any day because of the customs investigation and that he wanted the federal agent murdered to buy time so he could obtain a passport under an alias and flee the country, a Customs Service official said.

The men, Hubert Francis Cole, 44. of suburban Carrollton, Texas, and Vjekoslov Spanjol, 31, of nearby Plano, Texas, were arrested in December at Philadelphia International Airnort as they tried to ship \$9 million provided by undercover customs agents to Chicago. authorities said. There, the money was to be picked up by a Yugoslavian diplomatic official for shipment to his home country under diplomatic seal,

authorities said. When Ivatury learned that a customs investigator was asking about him, he called the Dallas office of the Customs Service and asked to meet the agent, authorities said.

McCarty said Ivatury suggested in a subsequent visit with the agent that he might know something about possible illegal export activity.

Federal officials' said they

used his computer access and knowledge to obtain unclassified but sensitive information regarding LTV's involvement in composite fabrication techniques used to make Stealth aircraft invisible to radar.

Jim Croolin, a spokesman fi LTV's aircraft products group, said that Ivatury was an information systems analyst with the company's aircraft division from September 1987 to January 1988.

Croslin said Ivatury did not have government security clearance necessary for access to classified information.

Ivatury is on probation for two 1988 convictions for carrying a concealed weapon. If convicted on the state charge of solicitation of capital murder, he faces a maximum sentence of life imprisonment and a \$10,000 fine.

He was being held today in lieu of \$1 million bail at Lew Sterrett Justice Center.

The \$18 million, helium-filled balloon, called an aerostat, has forced drug smugglers to either fly into the United States somewhere else along the border or to drive across the border - a much riskier proposition, U.S. Customs spokesman Charles Conroy said Thursday.

The Deming aerostat was deployed Dec. 3. It is the second of a planned network of six aerostats along the U.S.-Mexican border. The other aerostat is at Fort Huachuca, Ariz. The sophisticated radar

DEAR DR. GOTT: I had polio more than 30 years ago. Now I am experiencing fatigue, joint and muscle pain, and weakness. Is this post-polio

DEAR READER- A- WE ST uscles become weaker and more easily tired. The same holds true for polio victims. However, since polio itself causes muscle weakness, fatigue and loss of strength are more prominent as such patients grow older. Many experts believe that post-polio syndrome is actually an enhanced weakness that is age-related. Therefore, you are probably experiencing this syndrome. Ask your doctor's

DEAR DR. GOTT: My daughter is a grocery clerk who works with electronic scanners. After work her right hand is gray, flaky and dry. She has been cautioned not to look directly at the scanner. Is this radiation harming

DEAR READER: I do not believe that supermarket electronic scanners present a threat to health, either from low-dose radiation or from any other factor. Eyestrain can result from scanners and other equipment at checkout counters, but this is usually just a temporary nuisance.

I suggest that your daughter try a lubricating skin cream to alleviate skin dryness and scaling. If this is ineffective, she should check with her doctor for further advice.

DEAR DR. GOTT: A recent EKG showed a bundle branch block. I'm middle-aged and have been told not to worry. What could have caused this

DEAR READER: The tiny electrical impulses that cause heart muscle to contract are carried from the heart's natural pacemaker to cardiac muscle through two major electrical systems: the right and left bundles. These bundles are collections of nerves, similar to electric cables.

Under certain circumstances, short-circuiting or slowing of electrical charges will occur in the bundles. This is called bundle branch block.

Right bundle branch block, or RBBB, is a common and harmless abnormality that is often present in normal people, frequently from birth. It requires no treatment and is not associated with heart disea toms. RBBB is usually periodically disregarded.

On the other hand, left bundle branch block, or LBBB, can indicate developing arteriosclerotic heart disease. It is always considered abnormal until proven otherwise. Patients who develop LBBB need further cardiac investigation to determine if the block is due to heart damage or insufficient oxygen supply to cardiac

Judging from the comment you received from your doctor, I assume that you have RBBB. However, you should ask him about this because it does make a difference if you have

Let's be fair. Although doctors have a reputation for charging an arm and a leg, this reputation may not be based on fact. We live in a service-oriented society where, in many cases, the cost of non-medical services is escalating far faster than physicians'

For example, when I take my Volkswagen in for routine repairs, I am charged \$48 an hour for labor. Heaven knows what I'd pay to keep a luxury car on the road. To my knowledge, the Medicare authorities have no pending legislation to limit auto mechanics' charges, depending on what ails your car.

Last month my IBM typewriter went on the fritz. My secretary called the corporation service center for our area to request assistance. The company representative agreed to send out a repairperson — at a staggering \$158 per hour labor, including travel time, plus 25 cents a mile. After some backing and filling, we acceded to a service call when another client needed help, thereby sharing the cost of travel time. A week ago, the fix-it man came and replaced a \$4.50 drive belt that had broken. The belt was not guaranteed. I grudgingly paid the \$265.14 bill; It seemed like a lot of labor cost for the service I received. I think I was ripped off. IBM either needed my money to buy carpeting for its corporate executive suite or, more likely, the company is more interested in selling computers than fix-

Years ago, as an elderly colleague of mine was preparing to take down his shingle, he decided to separate the wheat from the chaff. He doubled his office fees to an astronomical figure - I think it was \$30 then - in the hope of attracting well-heeled patients to ease him into retirement. In those days, it was pretty well understood that you didn't seek assistance from doctors who charged more than you could afford. Patients of modest means were content to see the young doctor down the street (in this case. me) who was starting a practice and needed all the business he could get, whether it paid well or not.

Of the remaining \$50, about 30 percent is paid in taxes. So, on a good day, my take-home pay is about \$35 an hour. I'm not even paid for my time on-call, giving advice on the telephone, driving, researching difficult cases, filling out insurance forms, sitting alone thinking and planning, consulting with other doctors, teaching or carrying out out committee work at the hospital. I have no sick time or paid vacations. When I stop working even for a weekend - the income stops. I am not permitted to raise my ees for the elderly who are invariably more time-consuming than are younger patients. When I provide a late-night service or see sick people on holidays, I don't get time-and-ahalf; in fact the differential is ludicrous. I'm told by the government

So am I I'm not sharing this information with you to complain; I just think you ought to know the facts. I live comfortably, but I work a 100-hour week to do so. Altough some doctors are able to gouge the public, most practicing physicians in my generation are caught in the same bind as I am. We muddle along day by day, shaking

If I'm ever crazy enough to call IBM for repairs, I'll have to remember to ask the serviceman how he landed such a cushy


To start film

The film will also be shot partly at the field house of suburban Norwood High School. The moviemakers project an 18-day filming schedule, with shooting to start Saturday at the jail.


