

Bush continues to demonstrate support for Tower

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush joined John Tower at a security briefing at the Pentagon this morning in a show of support for Tower as the Senate prepared to continue debating the nomination of the embattled defense secretary designate.

The first day of debate produced its share of partisan sparks Thursday, with one key senator holding out the possibility of airing sensitive information in a closed-door session.

Bush traveled to the Pentagon by motorcade and was greeted there by Tower, Adm. William Crowe, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and national security adviser Brent Scowcroft.

They were briefed on a NATO exercise called Wintex-Cimex, conducted every two years from Feb. 24 to March 9. In addition, Bush and Tower were to meet with the Armed Forces Policy Council, an advisory panel to the

secretary of defense consisting of the joint chiefs and other top military officials.

"I don't suggest it and I want to avoid it, (but) it may be necessary to have a closed session," Armed Services Committee Chairman Sam Nunn said Thursday in the midst of a flare-up over material damaging to Tower that has been leaked from an FBI report.

Sen. Pete Wilson, R-Calif., said Tower had been "trashed" by material that was leaked, and said those responsible never mentioned exculpatory material that also appeared in the FBI report. "A closed session of the Senate would not repair the damage that's been done," he said.

Several senators called for releasing some of the FBI material in sanitized form to give the public a better idea of what it contains.

In Brief

Chicken pox

LAREDO, Texas (AP) — As if it's not bad enough to be in jail, more than 100 inmates in a barracks at the Webb County Law Enforcement Center are going to have to spend seven days in quarantine because of an outbreak of chicken pox, authorities say.

The one barracks was sealed off Thursday, officers said.

Lawmen said that the outbreak of the disease erupted in a barracks of inmates, most of whom had been transferred here from Immigration and Naturalization Service centers in Brownsville, which is currently plagued by an influx of aliens from Central America seeking political asylum.

Count soars

HOUSTON (AP) — Immigration officials in Houston are being swamped by applications for political asylum from Central American immigrants who are making Houston their city of choice for seeking refugee status.

Since December, political asylum applications have soared to 1,000 a month — up from the typical 85 monthly, according to Mike McMahon, deputy director of the Houston immigration office.

The increase reflects the flood of immigrants that inundated the Harlingen area earlier this year. Until Feb. 21, aliens were allowed to travel to their U.S. destinations after checking in at a border office. Since then, however, a special task force at the Harlingen district has been ruling on the applications the same day and the number of immigrants applying for asylum has plunged.

Run aground

HONOLULU (AP) — A tanker carrying 90,000 barrels of crude oil ran aground in stormy seas about 15 miles from Hawaii's most popular tourist area, possibly spilling as much as 8,400 gallons, officials said.

Coast Guard spokesman Keith Spangler said the 800-foot tanker Exxon Houston sent a distress call at 8:20 p.m. Thursday off the Hawaiian island of Oahu.

The captain of the tanker reported the ship was "hard aground" three-tenths of a mile northwest of Barbers Point on Oahu's southwest coast.

Colder locally...

Snow to the north is forecast Friday

The Snyder area appears to be in for another taste of winter from a storm system due to arrive here late Friday or early Saturday morning.

Saturday's high temperature is not predicted to rise above the upper 40s locally. No moisture is in the forecast, although the South Plains region to the north has an outlook for as much as 4 inches of snow.

A winter storm system is expected to roar out of the Rockies into the Panhandle and South Plains Friday night and Saturday, bringing with it the prediction for snow.

The storm was located in the Pacific Northwest early Friday and was expected to plunge southeastward into Northwest Texas by Friday night, bringing with it Arctic air, some brief freezing drizzle, freezing rain, snow and windy conditions.

The approaching storm prompted the National Weather Service to issue a winter storm watch for the Panhandle for Friday night and Saturday and for the South Plains for Saturday.

The exact track of the storm has not been determined, so forecasters say the amount of freezing precipitation could vary

from the current forecast. North to northeast winds of 15-25 mph will arrive early Friday night, dropping wind chill readings to below zero before midnight in the Panhandle.

Driving conditions will likely become hazardous by midnight forecasters said because some patchy freezing drizzle or freezing rain may move into the area ahead of the snowfall.

By Sunday, temperatures in the Snyder area are predicted to rise to around 50 degrees. A warming trend will see these daytime highs reach the 60s by Tuesday.

It is expected to be partly to mostly cloudy statewide through Saturday.

Widely scattered showers were reported early Friday over portions of the Panhandle and South Plains, the low rolling plains and over North Central Texas. Patchy fog and drizzle was reported over the eastern half of the state.

Early morning temperatures were mostly in the 50s, ranging from the 40s in the mountains of Southwest Texas to the 60s in South Texas. Extremes ranged from 48 at Guadalupe Pass and Sanderson to 67 at Brownsville and Corpus Christi.

Keeping tabs on our neighbors: The Wall Street Journal, admittedly, is one of the most conservative of the national news media. An editorial this week concerning the confirmation of John Tower as secretary of defense is worthy of repeating:

"No one knows how many Senate Democrats will vote to confirm John Tower, but if one guessed on the basis of past comments, he would win landslide confirmation.

"John Glenn, in December: 'I have no doubt he'd make a good Secretary of Defense. But you know, it's not up to me. That's up to George Bush.' Mr. Glenn's Armed Services colleague, Al Gore Jr., felt in December that Mr. Tower's performance (as START negotiator in Geneva) was exemplary in every way.

"At Senator Tower's departure from the Senate

in 1984, Democrats rose to praise him in terms seldom used for a member of the opposite party. Sen. Daniel Inouye said that John Tower's 'dedication... and attention to detail has been unsurpassed. None of us could have asked more of a chairman.' Edward Kennedy noted that Tower's 'knowledge of the myriad, complex defense issues facing the country is unsurpassed.' Sen. Dennis DeConcini, an undecided in the confirmation vote, told the Senate that John Tower 'has maintained a loyal, hard-working, responsible demeanor throughout his terms.'

"Finally, Sen. Sam Nunn himself rose to say, 'His talent, wisdom and experience are indeed national assets.' We lack space to publish similar remarks by Senators Byrd, Exon, Bentsen, Johnston...

Kim Pease, in the Rotan Advance, wisely said, "You can win more friends with your ears than with your mouth."

Astronomer discovers spies

BOSTON (AP) — A Harvard astronomer turned sleuth helped crack an international electronic spy ring in West Germany by tracking down the "hacker" who broke into his computer files.

For more than six months, finding the computer snooper was a lonely obsession for 38-year-old Clifford Stoll, who initially was unable to convince the FBI to investigate the computer break-in.

On Thursday, a West German official announced the arrests of three hackers who allegedly acquired sensitive military computer passwords and codes and sold them to the Soviets. The Pentagon has not determined the extent of the damage to U.S. security.

A West German television network said the passwords and other information came from key military and research computers in the United States, Western Europe and Japan.

"I would say (Stoll) was largely responsible for cracking the case," said Charles S. Hurley, former spokesman for the Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory in Berkeley, Calif., where Stoll once worked. "Over a period of many months, he tracked them."

It all started with a 75-cent accounting error that Stoll noticed

in the California laboratory's shared-time computer system accounts in August 1986.

"If it had been \$1,000 off, I wouldn't have thought anything of it," Stoll said in an interview Thursday. "It's like, if your house collapses, you just assume there's been an earthquake. But if you find a tiny termite hole, you think, 'Geez, I'd better investigate.' It's the little problems that are the most fascinating."

Stoll, a computer expert with a doctorate in astronomy from the University of Arizona, searched for clues for three days and discovered the error was caused by someone who had gained access to the computer through telephone lines.

"For four months, I did absolutely nothing but watch what he typed in," said the bushy-haired Stoll.

Stoll said it became apparent that the hacker was trying to use the Berkeley Laboratory's computer as a gateway to the so-called Milnet, a computer network linking defense plants, university labs and military installations.

"He was searching for key words like nuclear, ICBM, SDI, biological warfare, Norad. He was reading everything he could get his hands on, and then it turns out he was selling it to the Soviets," Stoll said.

He said he told the FBI about the hacker in the late summer of

1986, but there wasn't much of a response.

"They said, 'What have you lost?' I said, 'Well, all we've actually lost is 75 cents.' So the FBI said, 'Who cares, it's not important.'"

To be fair, Stoll added, "They're much more sensitive to computer break-ins now."

Charles Steinmetz, a spokesman for the FBI in Washington, said the bureau would not comment on the case.

Stoll said his girlfriend, tired of his electronic pager that would beep whenever the hacker got on to the system, was responsible for the big break in the case. She suggested that he lay a trap.

Atlanta minority contracting program overturned by court

ATLANTA (AP) — A city program considered a national model for steering contracts to minority businesses was overturned as too "intrusive" by the state Supreme Court, a ruling officials say could halt contracting

for months.

The court based Thursday's 7-0 decision on a U.S. Supreme Court ruling in January that overturned a similar program in Richmond, Va. It was the high court's first reversal of an affirmative action program after years of upholding them.

The state court said Atlanta failed to produce enough evidence of past discrimination to justify its program. It also said the program was too broadly drawn and that the city had not considered "less intrusive" methods of increasing minority participation in city contracts.

It was not immediately clear whether the ruling on behalf of the American Subcontractors Association effectively

dismantles the program.

City Attorney Marva Brooks said there will be no appeal but that the city will take action that will "lead to the survival of the program."

Rodney K. Strong, the city's contract compliance director, said it will take about three months to come up with a new program that satisfies the court and still addresses the city's affirmative action goals.

"During that time, we would suspend all bids, except in emergency situations," he said.

Mayor Andrew Young was expected to announce a bidding moratorium at a news conference today.

Institution for research said established

AMARILLO--Dr. Phillip Periman of Amarillo, medical director and president of the Dan and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center, recently announced that a Research Institute is in the initial stages of being established there. He is the nephew of Vera Holsinger of Snyder.

According to Periman, the cancer center receives an annually recurring grant from the Harrington Foundation that amounts to about 30 percent of the foundation's annual income. Of those monies, the board has authorized 70-80 percent to go to the institute.

The remaining funds will be used for research that has been going on since 1981. The institute will initially consist of four independent laboratories established in cooperation with High Plains Baptist Hospital, Northwest Texas Hospital, the Amarillo Veterans Administration Medical Center, Texas Tech and the cancer center.

Approximately 20,000 square feet of the existing laboratories in those facilities will be used for for start-up program and a facility of about 120,000 square feet may be required in the next five to 10 years.

Laboratory research will focus on the study of the blood, or hematology; the study of the body's methods of fighting disease, or immunology; and the study of cancerous cells or oncology.

A cytogenetics lab is planned where the structure of genes and the effects of various changes on human genes will be analyzed, according to Periman. Immunogenetics, or the study of inherited activities in the human immunological system, also will be researched.

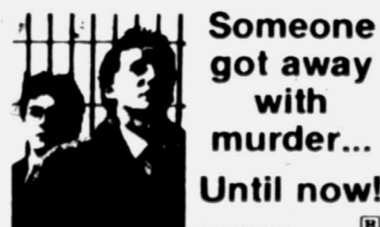

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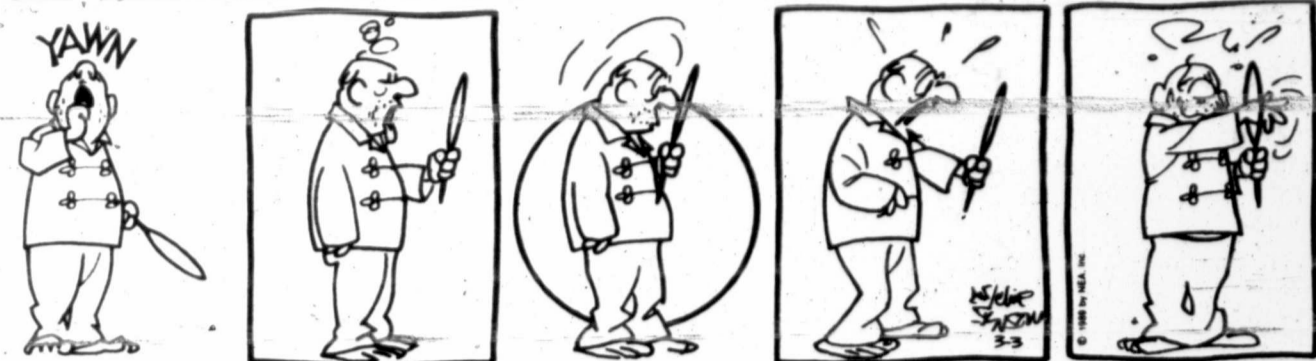

Dusters win regional crown 80-79

WACO--Valery Jackson scooped a loose ball and put it in the hole as time was running out here Thursday to lift Western Texas College to an 80-79 win over Odessa in the championship game of the Women's Region V basketball tournament.

The championship, WTC's second in three years and Coach Kelly Chadwick's fifth in 11, sends Western Texas, 25-8, to the NJCAA National Tournament in Tyler March 13-17. Led by tournament MVP Nicky Allen, who delighted the

crowd of more than 1,500 with 30 points and 10 rebounds, WTC took an early lead in the contest. The Dusters jumped ahead 26-17 when Allen, Tami Wilson, Jackson and Julie Roewe tallied consecutive baskets. Western kept a 10-point cushion through the rest of the first half and into the second. But with 12:27 left, Odessa began to rally. Angela Meadough slipped in two free throws. Lisa Dumas, Patricia Rivers and Cindy Hernandez added a field goal each before a hand-full of Lady Duster turnovers. The Lady Wranglers caught up

on a Janice Holliday jump shot with 7:24 left. The lead changed hands four times before Rhonda Henderson and Vicki Dean canned consecutive layups for Odessa. With less than four minutes left, Odessa held a 75-70 advantage. "Give Odessa credit for picking up their defense. They have such great athletes," said Chadwick. "And then, give our kids credit for never giving up. They were on the verge two times, but they never game up." At 1:10, Holliday went to the line. Her attempt bounced from the rim and into the arms of

Allen. The Dusters then dialed Jackson's number and she responded with a three-pointer, making the score 77-74. Back quickly on defense, the Dusters forced Odessa into a crucial walking violation. The offense then turned again to Jackson. After taking a short pass, she drove the baseline and was fouled with 12 seconds left. "Coach said to make sure I nailed the first three throw and try to make the second one if I could. I tried to make it," said Jackson, a 5-10 freshman from Morton. She made the first to bring WTC within a point, 79-78. The second charity shot hit the front of the rim and bounced outward. At least three Odessa players got

their hands on the ball, but Holliday came down with it. She lost control and when the ball rolled out of her grasp, Jackson grabbed it and went to the goal. "I just saw it and got it and put it in," grinned Jackson. "It was a natural reaction." The clock had seven seconds on it when Jackson scored the go-ahead points, but three ticked off before Odessa could call timeout. Odessa made a futile effort to win the game, but at first Wilson knocked the ball out of bounds, and then later, Allen stole it. Western shot a hot 37 of 61 from the field, led by Jackson's seven of nine. Jackson had 18 points and eight rebounds for the game. Wilson, an all-tournament selection along with Allen, scored 15

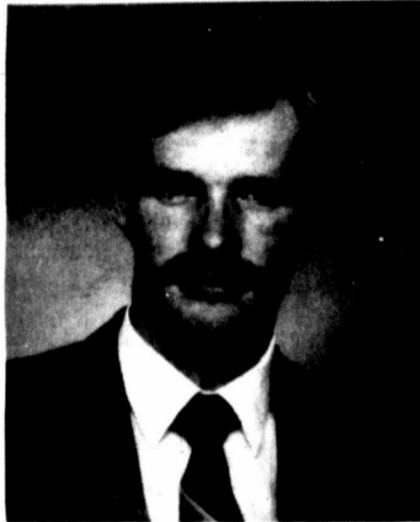
Solo bell ringer concert slated Monday

Location of bookcase leads to feud

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — One side argues the bookcase should be placed flat against the wall. The other side says the bookcase should stick out from the wall, perpendicular to it.

What sounds like an argument between college roommates is really symbolic of a feud between two El Paso County commissioners.

Orlando Fonseca wants the bookcase against the wall, while newcomer Martie Georges wants it to extend from the wall, dividing the room. When one leaves the room, the other changes the location of the bookcase.

The piece of furniture has been moved several times in the past two weeks.

County purchasing agent Piti Vasquez said he laughs every time he walks into the commissioners' office area and sees the bookcase in a different position.

"I call it the tortilla curtain," he said Wednesday.

It all started when Ms. Georges' secretary moved out of an enclosed office to make room for the new county architect. Fonseca said Ms. Georges' secretary had the bookcase moved sideways so she wouldn't have

to mix with other commissioners' assistants.

"She and her assistant will not talk to the others — like she's holier-than-thou," Fonseca said. "The way they want the bookcase divides the commission offices. It's also dangerous because it can tip over and fall on someone."

Ms. Georges said she doesn't understand what the problem is.

"I instructed my assistant to arrange the bookcase in a way that's most workable for her," she said. "I feel that if (Fonseca) and his assistant feel strongly

enough about it, they'll let me know."

But neither side has talked directly to the other.

The commissioners are deeply divided over personal and political conflicts and have resorted to name-calling in the press. Fonseca is allied with Charles Hooten against Ms. Georges and County Judge Luther Jones. The other commissioner, Rogelio Sanchez, usually sides with Fonseca and Hooten.

Jones seems to take delight in baiting Hooten and, to a lesser extent, Fonseca, in public

meetings. One time during a meeting, he displayed a chart attacking the Fonseca-Hooten plan for a new county courthouse, and Fonseca and Hooten defaced and tore up the chart in front of startled spectators.

Jones appointed Ms. Georges in January to succeed Mary Haynes, who resigned to run for El Paso mayor. Before she was appointed, the 24-year-old Ms. Georges was Jones' secretary. She has lived in El Paso two years since graduating from law school. The appointment angered fellow Democratic leaders and pleased Republicans who believe they will capture the seat in the next election.

The antics have prompted a columnist for one of El Paso's daily newspapers to write that the commissioners' actions should be void unless they vote while wearing red balls on their noses.

County Court-at-Law Judge Robert Galvan said the bookcase dispute could be settled like most domestic cases his court handles: locking Fonseca and Ms. Georges in a room and forcing them to talk.

"I would encourage them to see the fallacy and ridiculousness of their positions," he said.

Workers' comp issue stirs up controversy

AUSTIN (AP) — Opponents of a bill to reform the Texas workers' compensation system could force a special legislative session on the issue, despite quick action now by lawmakers, the bill's author says.

"There are people who are trying to kill the bill, to kill reform for special interests," said Rep. Richard Smith, R-Bryan. "In four weeks, we've managed to

file a bill and debate it in committee, and deal with it on the (House) floor, and the Senate will have 10 weeks. That's plenty of time."

But, the bill's opponents, including the Texas Trial Lawyers Association, are expected to wage a tougher fight in the Senate than in the House. There are three months left in the regular legislative session.
