of the whole world will celebrate the fourteenth anniversary of the end of the greatest catastres in the history of the world. When the order to cease firing was given at 11 o'clock in the morning on the eleventh day of November, 1918, there was hardly a human being on the face of the earth who did not join in the universal rejoicing. For there was no single human being in the world at that time and none who has been born since, whose life and whose future was not affected by the war.

We have called it the greatest catastrophe in the history of the world, and that is not an exaggeration. Who could have believed that the firing of a single shot in an obscure Serbian village eighteen years ago last August could have precipitated a tragedy that would involve the entire buman race, and from the effects of which we have not yet recovered? that the world-wide economic 5503 depression, the internal and in-

For size (he weighs in at around 153) Moffett is an outstanding performer.

Playing his last season with the Matadors, Speedy is coming from behind an early season handicap to show the stuff necessary to play on Coach Pete Cawthon's regular team. A good ball carrier and a good passer, Moffett's only handicap is punting. For that reason he had difficulty in holding his place as regular quarterback. His passing arm, the passing combination of Moffett to Crites, is one of the chief backfield threats on the Tech team.

Lubbock, Nov. 10 .- (Special) .-The Golden Bears of Baylor University provide Texas Tech's football opposition this week in one of the gala attractions of the season on the South Plains. The game, scheduled to start at 2:30 o'clock Friday afternoon, will feature the Armistice Day program and Texas Tech's annual Homecoming Day.


Tickets for the game are sellingfast, and fans are urged to place orders for reservations, early, Reserved seats in the grandstand are priced at \$1.65, and bleacher seats, also sold in advance at \$1.10, including government tax. Mail orders should be placed with the Tech athletic department. The largest crowd of the season is in prospect.

Baylor is the third team of the Southwest Conference to play Tech this season. The Matadors were defeated by a single touchdown in an early season upset at Amarillo by the Texas Aggies, and a week later defeated the Southern Methodist University Mustangs. The loss to A. & M., is the only one suffered by Tech thus far, and the Matadors have won eight football games, rolling up 317 points to 14 for nine opponents.

The Baylor team features a strong line, through which no team has been able to gain on ground plays this season. Although defeated by Texas and Arkansas, the Bears have been scored against on overhead plays and long end runs but not around the end protected by Frank James, considered the best wingman in the conference.


