FARM AND RANCH REVIEW

It is growing near the time when the first bale of cotton from the 1958 crop will be making its appearance on the bank corner in Stanton.

The first bale of the 1957 crop was grown by Eddie Cook on the Gordon Stone farm in Glascock County. It was ginned at the Farmers Co-op Gin in Stanton about August 22. The bale weighed 525 pounds. A week later it was put up at Chinese Auction and brought the grower \$950.

Elmer Kelton, agricultural editor of the San Angelo Standard-Times, has reported the first load of milo maize crop of Tom Green County, has arrived at the elevator in San Angelo. It tested 55 pounds to the bushel and the market price paid for maize on that day was \$1.65 per cwt.

Kelton elaborated on this year's maize crop in Tom Green County, declaring it to be the "biggest crop the San Angelo area has ever had."

The county agent of Tom Green County estimates there are between 65,000 and 75,000 acres in maize in the county. Kelton estimated the value of the crop to the county at \$2,000,000.

There have been many complimentary expressions coming from our local people on the excellent flavor and texture of the cantaloupes grown in the Pecos Valley of West Texas. Rightfully so has the Pecos melon been tagged with this reputation. The fine quality of this melon not only extends over the State of Texas, but has spread to the melon consumers in the East.

The writer is a consumer of the Pecos melon and the cantaloupe grown in the soil of Martin County. Were we blindfolded and handed a slice of Pecos cantaloupe and a slice of a Martin County melon to decide which was which, we'd be stumped.

Cantaloupe, home grown, bears the flavor and texture equal to any cantaloupe grown anywhere.

All the county needs to be in the number one class of other melon growing sections, is to go more extensively in producing them. Have a market established in advance of their harvest.

A co-operative growers association among cantaloupe growers will get the Martin County grown cantaloupe to equal any reputation borne by the finer cantaloupe countries.

An agreement on the wage scale of braceros between U. S. Labor Department and those who employ the Mexican labor in the United States has been reached. The minimum wage is 50 cents an hour and that goes for doing piece work, too.

The new formula will go into effect Sept. 1. It "specifies the wage rate received by the greatest number of domestic workers reported, providing it accounts for 40 per cent or more, will be considered the prevailing wage."

"It also specifies if no one wage rate accounts for as much as 40 per cent of the number of domestic workers reported the bottom of the prevailing wage range will be determined by starting from the lowest wage paid in the activity and proceeding upward until 51 per cent of the workers covered in the survey has been included. The highest wage paid to any worker, or group of workers, within the 51 per cent group, is the bottom of the prevailing wage rate."

Secretary of Labor Mitchell said the members of a growers subcommittee of the special farm labor committee have agreed to co-operate in helping solve problems in those places where the wages of United workers appear to be adversely affected by the use of Mexicans.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Section 24 and substitution of a new Section of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for annual Sessions of the Legislature; changing the compensation, per diem and traveling expenses of the Members of the Legislature; authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol; providing for an election; providing for the necessary proclamation and publication. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows: "Section 24. The Legislature shall meet on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January, 1959, and each succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the first thirty (30) days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations during the following sixty (60) days of the first Regular Session of each Legislature shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty (60) days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may upon a majority vote of four-fifths (4/5) of its membership. "During the Second Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January 1960, and each succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the Legislature shall be authorized to consider and act upon the following only: "a. Make annual appropriations for the general operation of the State government; which appropriations may be passed by a majority vote of each House.

WEST TEXAS PRESS COMMENTS

Claud Wells, editor of The Memphis Democrat, stated the stand he has taken in political campaigns during the many years he has been the County Democratic Chairman of Hall County. The part he played in local politics was to "keep his hands off" dabbling in the local campaigns. He gave this reason: "because the majority of the Hall County voters have always voted for the good of the Democratic party, we are willing to leave the selection of district and state nominees up to said voters."

The Coleman County Chronicle reported that the city manager of Coleman stated the city's finances were at the lowest ebb since he took office in 1950. As a result the City Council has increased the garbage collection in the residential district from \$1.25 a month to \$1.50. In the business area a minimum of \$3.00 and a maximum of \$20 will be established. The fees will be adjusted to fit

the type of service rendered. The Chronicle said, "Some businesses require more garbage collection than others and the fee will be tailored to fit the service."

Charges for water and sewer taps has been increased 50 per cent to citizens living outside the city limits.

Bob Weddell of the Menard Messenger has the "jenks" playing pranks on him prior to taking off on his vacation. First to happen Weddell had a page of his paper made up which he had to tear down to make room for a last-minute paid advertisement. Then the Linotype broke down and he had to wait until the part was received from Dallas. Anyhow, Weddell said, "We'll be back week after next."

A good soaking rain that moved into Coleman County during a two-day period gave the farmers and ranchers as much as three inches of moisture in some parts of the county. There was no damaging winds or hail accompanying the precipitation. The Democrat-Voice reported farmers and ranchers, all are carrying broad smiles on their faces.

The Ford County News last week said "We Goofed," and the editor of the News went on to remind that in the World War II days airmen in fighter planes coined the word "Gremlins" were responsible for whatever went wrong with their aircraft. The News charged Gremlins were responsible for the error made in the paper. In a write-up of a wedding the News had the wrong name of the bridegroom. This million barrel concrete tank was built in 1928 by the Shell Oil Company for storage purposes but was never used for what the tank was originally built.

A 350-gallon water well has been developed, and it is figured it will require 40 days, allowing for seepage and evaporation, to fill the gigantic tank.

The City Commission of Slaton has increased the city taxes 10 per cent. They found that until the present time the city has had sufficient revenue to take care of all its obligations from bond issues, in addition to operating expense of the city.

The Slaton Slatonite reported the city faced with 395 per cent increase in operating expenses over a period of 15 years, and an increase of 171 per cent in revenues, hence the tax increase voted.

This is the first tax increase the city of Slaton has had to make since 1946.

A \$65,000 bond issue for the improving of the water and sewer systems in Alpine was voted down last week, according to the Alpine Avalanche. The vote was 350 against to 175 for.

The mayor of Alpine said: "The tax paying voters of Alpine voted against the water system bonds in protest against recently increased tax, sewer and water rates and not, really, against the water system."

Jim Glasscock, editor-publisher of the Alpine Avalanche, is going around with a very attractive red feather in his hat. He wrote a story when Mrs. Clifford White was brought to Alpine from the Big Bend National Park following the death of her husband in a canyon.

The story brought to the Avalanche an award given by the Better Newspapers Contest sponsored by the National Editorial Association. There were 11 other Texas newspapers winning an award.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. HJR #36—Number Eight on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an amendment to Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-1; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance on behalf of persons eligible for Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Dependent Children as provided in Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such payments; providing that the payments for such medical care shall be in addition to the direct assistance to such recipients; providing that the amount paid out of State funds shall never exceed the payments out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-1, which shall read as follows: "Subsection 51a-1. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Law and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children as provided in Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas. The payments for such medical care on behalf of such recipients shall be in addition to the direct assistance to such recipients, and shall be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature; provided, however, that the amount paid out of State funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount paid out of Federal funds for such purposes. The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States, such financial aid on behalf of the needy aged, needy blind, needy children, and needy permanently and totally disabled persons as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children, or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance; and providing that the expenditure out of State funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds;" and "AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children, or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance; and providing that the expenditure out of State funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Texas.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas to require that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 28 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows: "Section 28. Vacancies in Offices of Judges of Superior Courts to Be Filled By the Governor. "Vacancies in the office of Judges of the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the District Courts shall be filled by the Governor until the next succeeding General Election; and vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next succeeding General Election."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."

### LEGAL NOTICE

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. SJR #8—Number Two on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, authorizing each county to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for appointive and elective officers and employees of the county or precinct, providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to the voters qualified to vote thereon, and providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

Section 1. That Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows: "(b) Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for the appointive and elective officers and employees of the county or precinct, provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7 1/2%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount due to become due each year out of said fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

"FOR the amendment of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct."

"AGAINST the amendment of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct."

"Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment, in counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment."

Sec. 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have notice of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas and laws of this state.
