

THIRTY, IN NEWSPAPER PARLANCANCE, meaning the end of a story written by the editor or a reporter, came last Friday night to W. W. (Uncle Billy) Aiken, editor-emeritus of the Crockett Courier-Democrat. It was an abrupt and tragic ending to a long and useful life spent in the harness of a newspaperman and printer.

His life was snuffed out on his 86th birthday.

It was raining and Aiken was on his way to his room for the night. While crossing a street he was struck down by a passing automobile. He died shortly after arrival at a hospital.

For 60 years Aiken was editor-owner of the Crockett Courier. A few months ago he sold his newspaper to a Lufkin newspaper, and the Courier was consolidated with the Democrat of that town. He became editor-emeritus of the Crockett Courier-Democrat, the position he held at the time of his untimely death.

Aiken was an old school newspaperman, earning his way up through the printing ranks from the devil in the back shop to the rank he occupied when death overtook him.

He was 86 years old and a bachelor, perhaps the oldest active newspaperman in Texas.

The writer's first acquaintance with "Uncle Billy" Aiken came while attending the West Texas Press convention in Midland, in (Continued on page 5)

## New Explorer Test Set For Martin Area

Pan American Petroleum Corporation No. 2-A Homer L. Shook is a new explorer in the North Breedlove (Devonian) area of Northwest Martin County. Contract calls for a 12,600 foot hole.

It is to be 860 feet from north and west lines of labor 9, league 259, Borden County School Land survey and 15 miles northwest of Tarzan.

David Fasken of Midland completed No. 1 David Fasken-Mrs. O. P. Buchanan, as a new gas-distillate producer in the north-east section of the Azalea (Devonian) area of Northeast Midland County.

On potential test it showed for a calculated absolute open flow of 2,000,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with a gas petroleum liquid ratio of 38,000-1.

## Veteran Crockett Editor, 86, Killed

A traffic accident at Crockett Friday night claimed the life of probably the oldest active newspaperman in Texas, W. W. (Uncle Billy) Aiken, in his 86th year.

Mr. Aiken was enjoying a cold drink at a drug store in Crockett just before bedtime Friday with friends. It was raining, he decided to call it a night and go home to bed. Somewhere between the drug store and his room, two blocks away, a motor vehicle struck him down.

Mr. Aiken owned and operated the Crockett Courier for many years until recently, when it was bought by the Lufkin paper and consolidated with the Crockett Democrat. Uncle Billy continued as editor emeritus of the paper, and was active to the end.

He was widely known and respected throughout Texas newspapers. Aiken was a member of all Texas Press Associations, including the West Texas Association. He seldom missed a press convention.

Aiken is survived by a brother, Robert E., of Abilene.

Funeral services were conducted for the East Texas editor in Crockett Sunday afternoon.

Editor Aiken was a long time friend of James E. Kelly, editor of the Stanton Reporter. Kelly and Aiken last attended a press association convention together in Midland about four years ago.

With the death of Mr. Aiken, the veteran Stanton Reporter editor, now possibly takes over claim to the title of oldest working newspaperman in Texas.

# Martin County Cheered Over '59 Crop Outlook

Agricultural experts in Martin County were practically agreed this week that the county has prospects for one of the best cotton crops in several years.

Practically all of the county's 22,000 acres of irrigated cotton is up to a good stand. Dryland cotton is all planted and also reported off to a good start from every community.

The county has received approximately four inches of moisture since May 1. The half-inch rain falling over the area Sunday morning was a considered timely and beneficial to cotton growers.

In the Lomax community, one of the best stands of cotton in the irrigated belt in years, is reported.
