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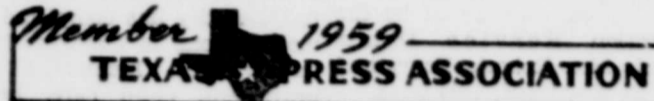

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**Highway Department Offers Good Advice To Texas Land Developers**

The Texas Highway Department today urged all individuals and corporations who are engaged in the development of lands to study their individual problems in relation to the traffic-handling problems of the Department.

Specifically, the Department cautioned that developers should contact local planning engineers before making commitments based on access from the through lanes of a controlled access highway.

"It will be impossible for the Department to comply with requests for entrances and exits to the main lanes to accommodate private developments. Entrance and exit accommodations will be provided solely for the accommodation of the traveling public for ingress and egress to other public facilities," State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said.

Greer explained that it is possible to develop an "at grade" intersection with adequate access to abutting properties. However, it is almost impossible to properly serve the abutting property where highway grades are separated, particularly where one or both intersecting highway is a controlled access facility.

In the intersection area, all on and off ramps must be used to accommodate traffic interchanging between the intersect-

ing highways. To provide additional entrances and exits into private properties would create congestion on the through lanes themselves and also a very unsafe condition would result. Greer added. Greer expressed the opinion of Highway Department engineers that, due to the Department's inability to provide access to abutting property within an intersection area, there will be a changed concept for the development of property in these areas where controlled access highways intersect.

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**4-H'ers Ready To Aid Census Taker With Farm Statistics**

When the census taker knocks on the door of a 4-H farm family this fall he can be pretty sure that the younger members of the household had a hand in rounding up the required information, stated Norman C. Mindrum, director, National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, Chicago, Illinois.

Answers will be needed to questions involving number of acres in crops or pasture; kind and number of livestock and poultry; inventory of farm equipment; kind and quantities of farm products produced and sold; cost of gasoline and oil; breakdown of man-hours spent on and off the farm.

Keeping accurate records in relation to 4-H project work is a "must" for club members, so they learn early how to go about gathering statistics relating to production, costs, sales and the like. As a matter of fact, the 4-H record book is an important item in judging annual 4-H award winners, Mr. Mindrum said.

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Most 4-H'ers throughout the county have had considerable experiences in keeping tabs on farm operation and personal activities while successfully fulfilling the requirement of 4-H programs in achievement, leadership, and community service, according to the Cooperative Extension Service which directs the work.

Members who do an outstanding job in these areas look forward to competing for one of several awards provided each year by leading business enterprises and public-spirited citizens. Awards for achievement are given by the Ford Motor Company; leadership by Edward Foss Wilson; community relations by the Wm. Wrigley Jr. Company, Mr. Mindrum announced.

College scholarships, expense-paid trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, medals and certificates of honor are the incentives offered to qualifying club members.

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**DPS Fingerprint File Contains 1 Million Cards**

A milestone in modern-day Texas criminology was reached today as the Texas Department of Public Safety filed its one-millionth criminal fingerprint record.

Fingerprint card number 1,600,000 was that of a 15-year old Dawson County negro boy who was arrested for theft and later released.

Veteran fingerprint expert J. H. Singletery of the DPS Division of Identification and Criminal Records performed the chore of stamping the historic, round number on the card.

Collection on criminal fingerprints began on August 10, 1935, with the establishment of the Bureau of Identification.

In attendance for the ceremony were Lt. Col. Joe S. Fletcher, Assistant DPS Director, who was one of the first Department fingerprint experts; and Joel Tisdale, Chief of the Division of Identification and Criminal Records.

In addition to the one-million cards representing subjects who have run afoul of the law across the state, there are more than a half-million "repeater" cards representing extra contacts. These cards are received from local law enforcement agencies at a rate of about 9,000 per month. All are kept on file for reference by local enforcement agencies.

This valuable storehouse of identification information is a vital part of the State and local criminal investigation machinery which is combatting daily the steadily-increasing rise in crime. During the first six months of this year, major crime increased more than six per cent, with a 20 per cent hike in both murder and rape.

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**Carr Feels "Obligation" To Seek Higher State Office**

With several months to go, before election time, the Texas political pot has started simmering early.

House Speaker Waggoner Carr, Lubbock, is on record as having said he felt he had an "obligation to run" for governor or attorney general next year.

Will Wilson, present attorney general, is almost a cinch to make the race for chief executive of the state. Wilson is a Dallas man, and married an East Texas girl from Sulphur Springs.

If Waggoner Carr gets in against Wilson it might be another real old-fashioned Texas political battle right down to the wire. There are a few other outstanding Texans who are reported willing to toss their hats into the ring too.

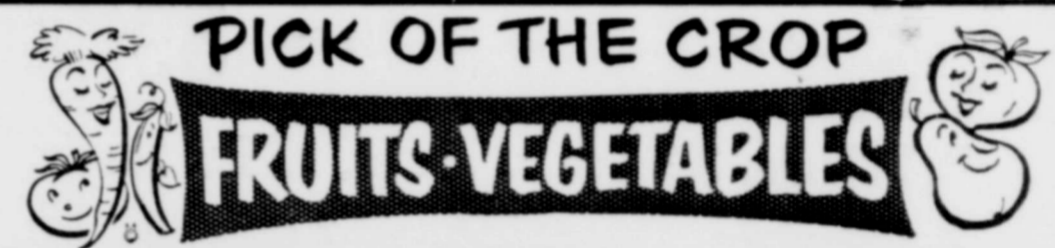

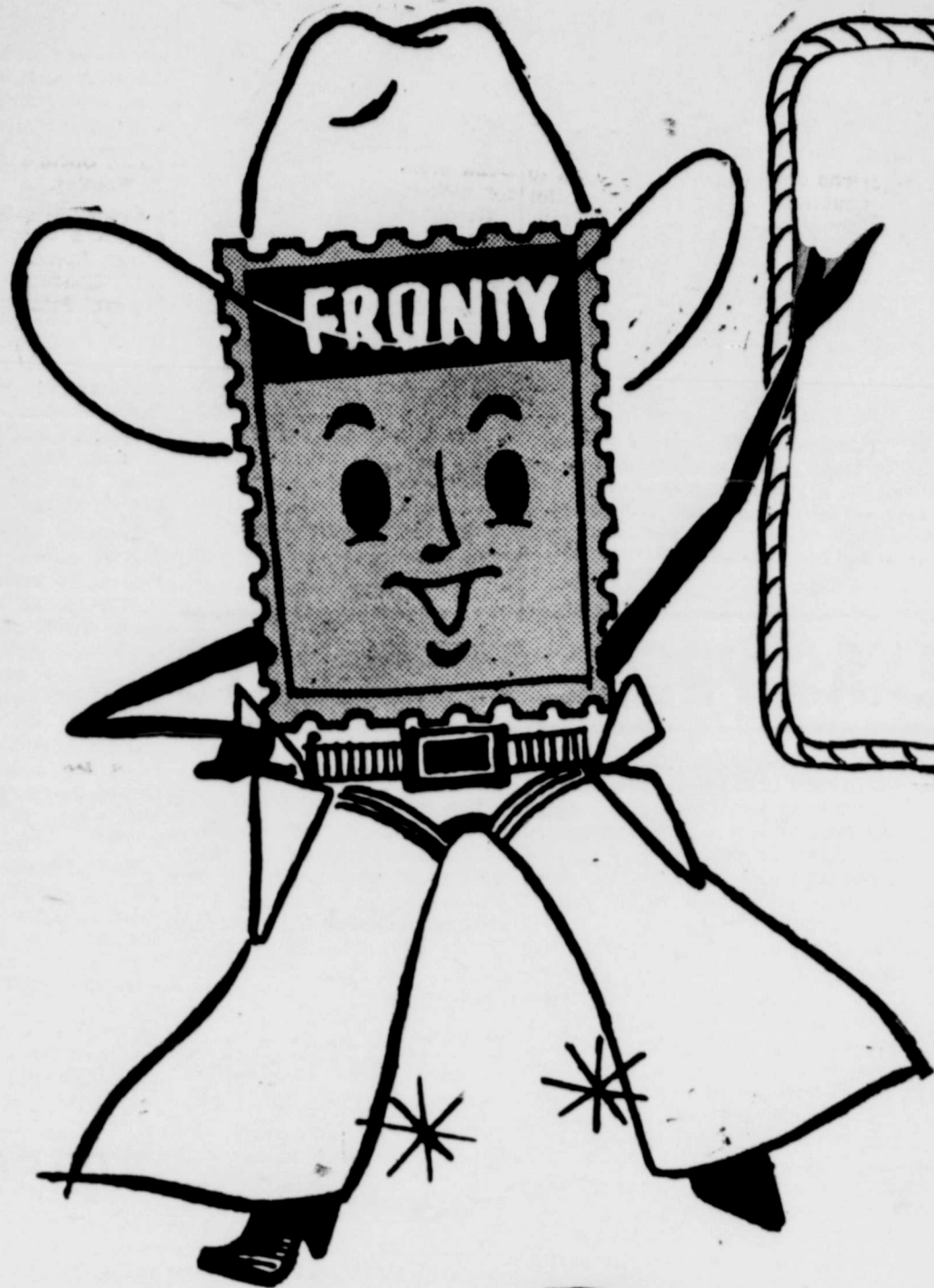
