Safety Check For Autos Is Outlined

Although the number of passenger cars in the United States has more than doubled since 1940—the total is now nearly 70 million — only 16 states and the District of Columbia require vehicle inspections at least once a year, according to Changing Times, the Kiplinger Magazine.

Results of last year's National Community Vehicle Safety-Check, reported in the current issue of the magazine, indicate that every fifth car a motorist meets on the highway is a potential menace. In fact, the motorist may himself be driving the one-in-every-five-cars that failed to pass the mechanical check-up.

Anticipating the increased traffic ahead during the vacation season, the editors of the magazine recommended the following list be checked the next time the car is lubricated (and again at least every six months):

Lights. Front, parking, rear, license plate, backing, stop — all should be checked. Check all bulbs, whether headlights work on both high and low beam, highlight focus, whether turn signals are operating.

Brakes. Is there at least a two-inch clearance between pedal and floor board when they are fully applied. Does the brake pedal sink under constant pressure? Do brakes fade or grab in a quick stop?

Tires. Are treads wearing thin? Do cracks and sidewalls have any patches or cuts? Are there any patches or "boots" — are they not safe at highway speeds.

Steering. Are there more than 2 or 3 inches of play when the steering wheel is turned? Are front tires worn unevenly? Does the car shimmy at any speed?

Exhaust system. Are there cracks

or holes in the muffler or exhaust pipe?

Windshield wipers. Is the rubber deteriorated or dried out?

Glass. Are there cracks or discoloration in the window glass, especially the windshield? Is the rear view mirror cloudy or cracked?

Checking the whole list takes about fifteen minutes, the article notes, and it holds at least one key to highway safety.
